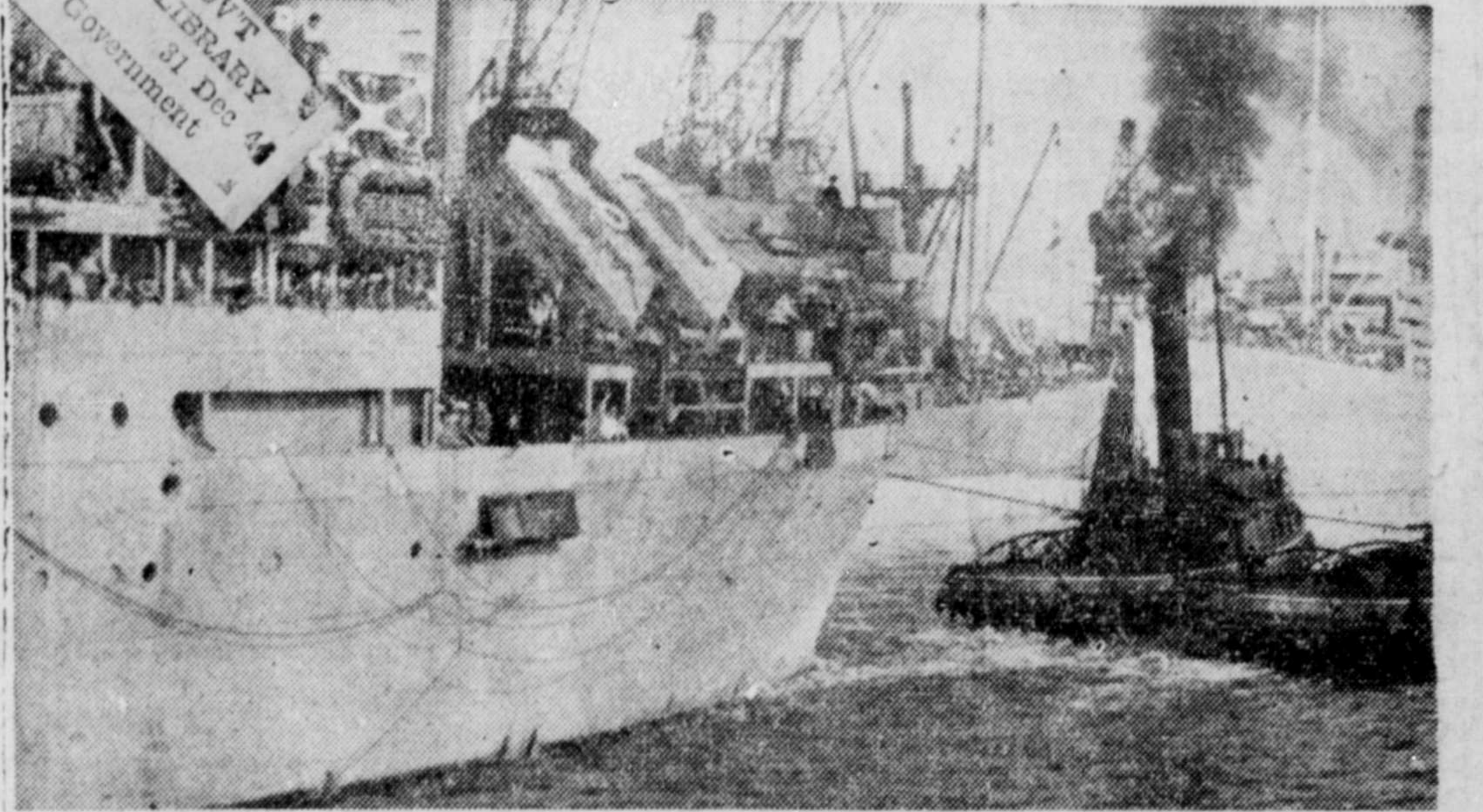

A Good Day's Bag . . .

Catania, Orel, Belgorod, Munda — a good day's bag for the Allies in the global war, further indication of the growing tide in our favor—those are serious losses for the enemy, no matter how they may try to minimize them. We are doing well in the war these days and we are justified in assuming new confidence that, if there is no flagging of our effort, total victory will surely be ours. We need not longer feel skeptical or doubtful about our chances. It is evidently no longer a question of how we shall win but when. We can say, in answer to that, that the measure of required time for victory may be largely determined by the intensity of our sustained effort. Even though the tide may be running better for us, it is no time to rest on our oars.

Width of Skeena Road . . .

It is an interesting suggestion by Mr. Anscomb, the provincial minister of public works, that it would be better to be building our Skeena River highway to a width of thirty instead of twenty feet. Mr. Anscomb is looking forward to the day when it will not be merely a military road but a great artery for tourist traffic which it will no doubt be after the war is over. However, even the twenty feet road will be very good to have and it is satisfactory to have Mr. Anscomb say that an excellent job is being done.

Leadership and Action . . .

The federal government, under authority of the War Measures Act, has increased the old-age pension from \$20 to \$25 monthly applicable where the provinces will pay their usual portion of 25 per cent. British Columbia already pays the whole of a \$5 monthly increase.

This belated action at Ottawa brings and deserves no thanks from the people. It is too little and too late for any appreciation. Only trifling publicity has been given to what otherwise would have been important news had it been granted a year ago or had it been introduced even this session as an amendment to the Old Age Pensions Act and not as a war measure by order-in-council.

The government at Ottawa appears so weighted down with the burdens of the war, a job it is doing creditably well, it seems out of touch with the yearnings of the people for bold action on domestic measures of social reform and for post-war reconstruction.

Governments are being appraised by what they do now and by the definite plans—showing how, when and where they can and shall be effected—for post-war requirements.

No longer will it be possible to postpone action until just before an election and succeed. Nor will the customary retort of old-time politicians to their own more aggressive supporters, "that they are too impatient and troublesome" carry any weight or cause any fear. Political leaders no longer control their followers by threats. Only sincerity of conviction, high purpose and bold action reflect leadership and induce loyal support today.

Procrastination is not only a thief of time. It will steal away the golden opportunities for grand measures of progress that would not only be of enduring benefit to the people but, by their prompt enactment, would ensure the survival of the governments and parties initiating them.

Japs Retreating . . .

The Allies are learning they can wage a new type of aerial warfare in the south Pacific. Up until recently it had been thought Japan could not be approached step by step because of the great power of her land-based planes when defending against carrier-based Allied planes. Today the Allies have teamed up their own land-based planes and their straight-shooting ships to drive the Japs out of the middle Solomons and the prospect is that soon the Japs will have left the Solomons completely. The Americans and Aussies thus seize airbases the Japs had built to use against the Allies, and turn them back against Mr. Jap, as seems to be the aim at Munda.

It takes control of the air to do this, but the Allies have that.

And to accomplish another task of outshooting the enemy's ships, the Yanks have been training long and hard in gunnery.

The Japs thought they had slammed the door in our faces and bolted it shut. Already it is being pried open again and the retreat to Japan seems to have begun.

The Experts Say - - -

HOSIERY HELPS—Hang your hose; don't pin them on the clothes line. Squeeze them out of the rinse water; don't wring them. Dry them in a warm place; NOT in direct sunlight or over a radiator. Those are a few suggestions from the Price Board's consumer branch on stocking preservation. On the basis of a recent survey, the branch said that office workers are washing their hose out at night and putting them on again the next morning. This, says the branch, is fatal to their life-span, for damp rayon hosiery is 50 per cent weaker than when absolutely dry. The branch advises a 36-hour drying period.

SPOTTING THE SPOT—There is many a time when a dress gets a trip to cleaners because it's spotted. It may have been worn just once, but the spots spoil the spic and span appearance, so off it goes. Now, to relieve their over-taxed establishments, dry-cleaning men across the Dominion are offering to identify spots and tell how to remove them. The consumer branch suggests housewives avail themselves of this service, and try a job of home cleaning.

BLUEBERRY DOUGHBOYS—Plump blueberries are one of our most attractive native fruits. And from Laura Pepper, chief of the Agriculture Department's consumer section, comes a recipe for blueberry doughboys—a sumptuous, easily prepared dessert. Here it is: Put two cups of blueberries, 1-3 cup of sugar and 3-4 cup of water in a saucepan. Bring to boiling point and simmer five minutes. Meanwhile, mix and sift two cups all-purpose flour with two table-spoons sugar, 1-4 teaspoon salt and four teaspoons baking powder. Put in three table-spoons shortening and add 2-3 cup milk to make a soft dough. Drop this mixture by spoonfuls into the simmering blueberries, as you would dumplings, cover the saucepan and cook 15 minutes. Serve hot with the blueberries over the top.

KITCHEN SHORT-CUT—Eliminate the potato-peeling chore from your kitchen routine and your potatoes will make a really valuable contribution to the family meal—in Vitamin C and iron. Marion Harlow of the Health Department's nutrition services tells us that the skin of the potato acts as a sort of waterproof jacket, keeping the goodness where it belongs.

LIVING ALONE ON THE RATION—There have been suggestions that ration coupons, especially those for meat, be perforated so that rationed commodities could be purchased in smaller quantities by those who have small families or live alone. Prices Board officials have a word of explanation, pointing out that as it stands, the public, the banks and the ration administration share the burden of responsibility. If coupons were perforated, it would complicate the process of coupon flow-back. They also remind us that certain rationed meats may be bought at the rate of one-half pound per coupon, which should simplify the problem for those who don't want to buy too much at one time.

The Stokesby, a torpedoed British 7,000-ton steamer, has been reclaimed and is on active service again after lying at the bottom of the sea for 16 months.

Lord Clifford, 84, of Chudleigh, England, a radiology authority who made the colors of the Infra-red and ultra violet rays visible, is dead.

Nearly 200,000 women of 60 and over are working in Britain, Ernest Brown, minister of health, disclosed in a parliamentary report.

Patrick Young Alexander, credited with making the first parachute jump from a balloon over Britain in 1896 is dead at 85.

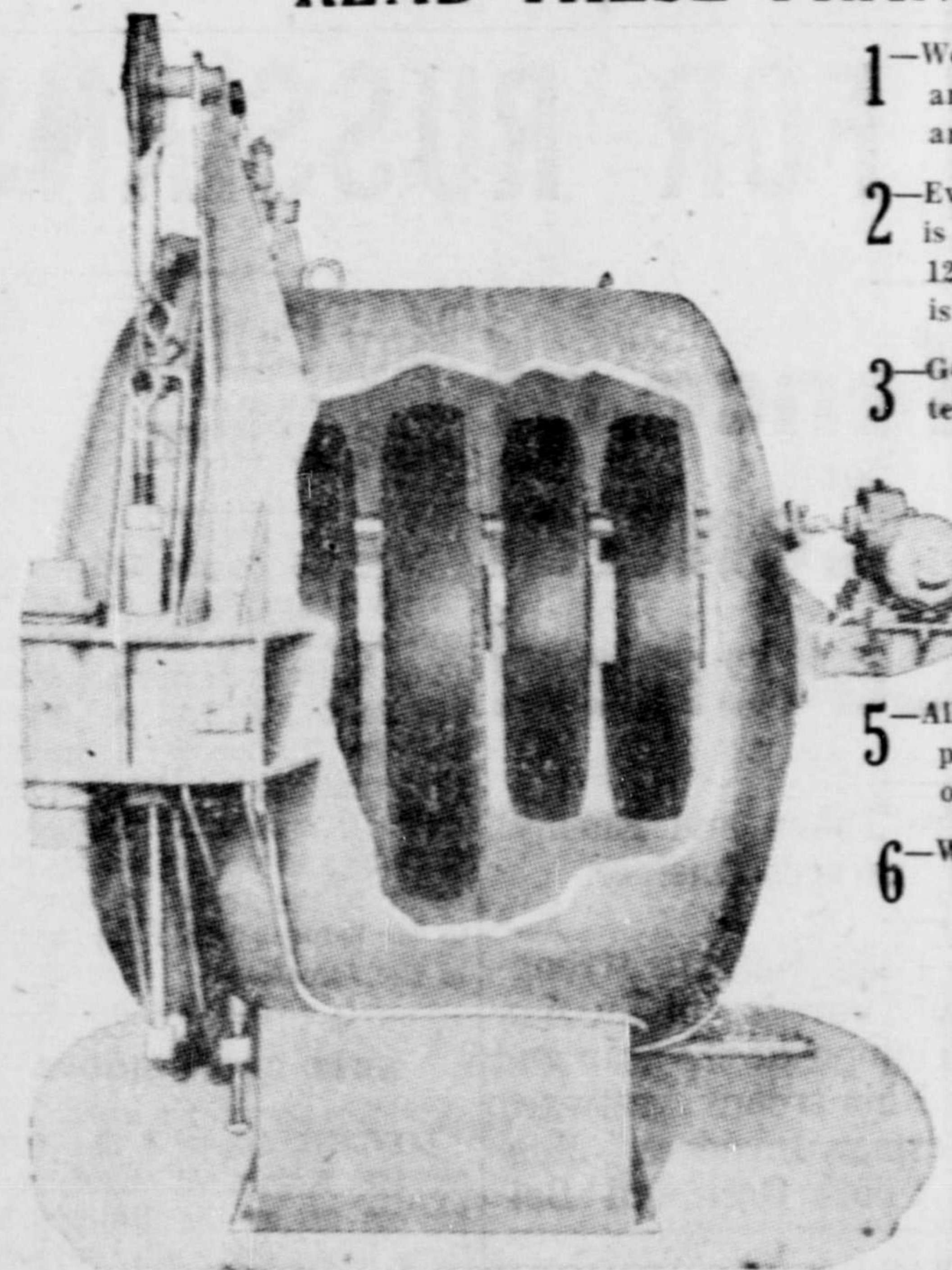

It's good to be able to tell cricket fans that the game's No. 1 box office attraction, Dennis Compton, is in rare form in Britain, despite a recent operation for varicose veins. He played for Army against the R.A.F. at Lords and treated a crowd of 21,000 to a display of all his best strokes, good for 83 hits, and ran neatly all the 159 runs scored in his two hours' stay at the wicket. Compton played with his legs padded with cotton wool and adhesive tape but it didn't seem to slow him up appreciably. His team declared at 284 for six wickets and when stumps were drawn the R.A.F. had lost seven wickets for 169.

Sydney Wooderson raced a mile in 4:17.4 at London's White City track and won his race handily. Two hours later he was running again but he was 15 miles away and travelling a three-quarter mile stretch in 3:12 after a fast rash by automobile and train from White City.

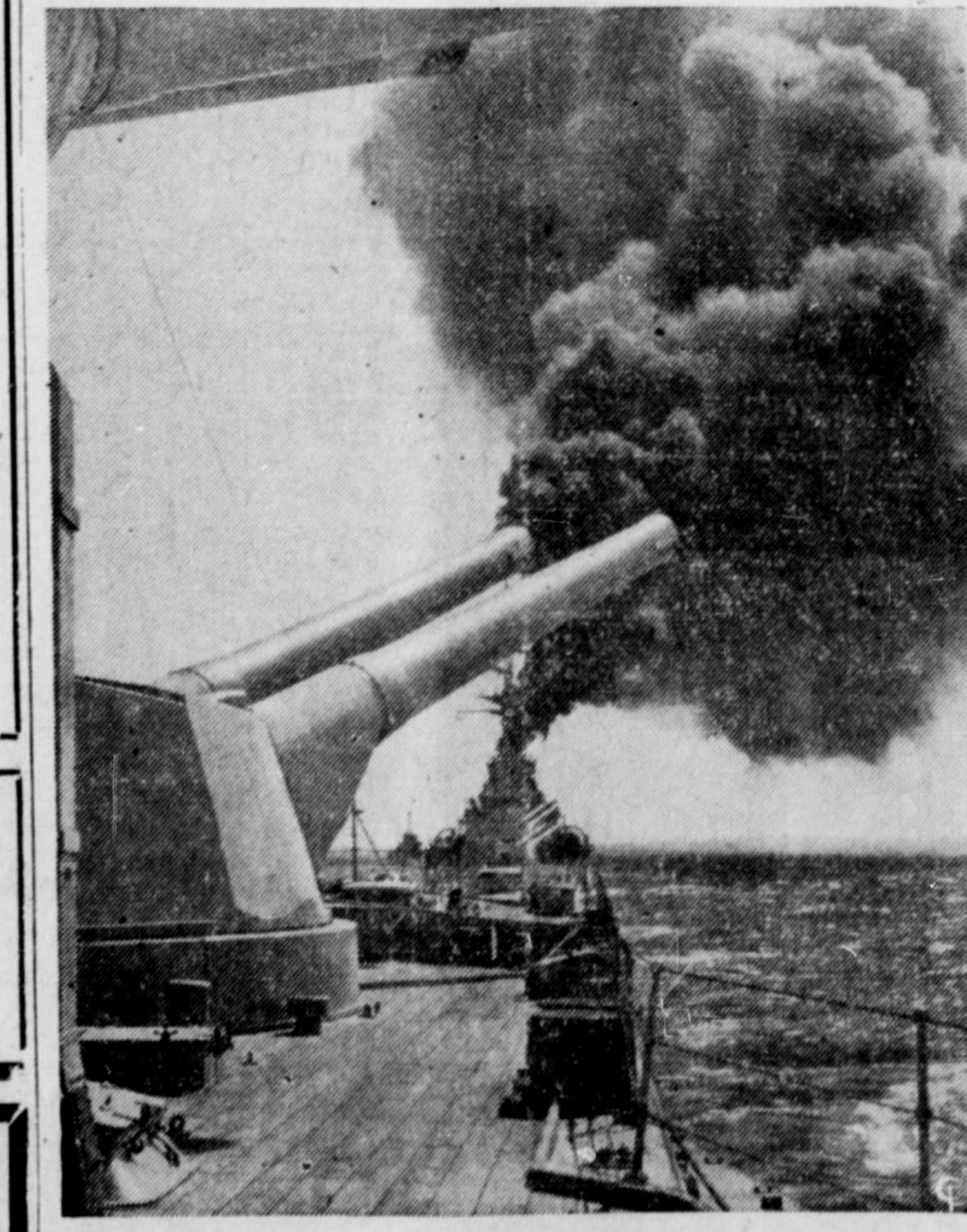
A sales agency for Eire greyhounds, formed with the sanction of the Irish Coursing Club, hopes to extend the export trade to Canada, the United States and France. Its first objective will be an attempt to improve Irish-bred stock. Then it will go after the export business.

There's talk about in Britain that steeplechasing, banned last winter for the first time since the war began, may be revived during the coming season. It is dependent on the transport situation, the ban having been made effective as a means of cutting down pleasure travel at a time when the nation's railways were concentrated on movement of troops and supplies for the invasion forces.

Main of Carstairs, Alta.; Cpl. F. B. Mean of Edmonton and D. A. Griffin of Nelson, B.C. Runnersup included Gdsm. C. H. Watson of Cornwall, Ont., and Gdsm. J. Jones, C. England, T. Grandille, J. Mooney, R. O. Vantassil, all of Montreal.
