COLOGNE POUNDED HEAVILY

Great German Industrial City Again Objective of R.A.F.—Other Targets Also Hit
LONDON, July 5—British and Canadian bombers raided Cologne again Saturday night. It was the 118th raid on the great German Rhineland industrial city. An official announcement said the attack was "in great strength" and "well concentrated."

BLOWING UP OWN PORTS

Italians Take Drastic Action in View of Nervousness Over Invasion
LONDON, July 5—Reports reach here through neutral sources that port installations are being blown up by the Italians themselves on Sicily so that they may not be used by the Allies in the event of an invasion. Docks at Trapani have been demolished.

ATTACKS ON ITALY

Heavy Raids Directed Against Sardinia and Sicily
ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, July 5—New attacks have been made against the Axis in the Mediterranean area. Nine raids have been directed against Sardinia and Sicily. Five thousand feet of decks at Trapani in Sicily have been destroyed, rendering the installations there practically useless. Four enemy air fields in Sardinia and three in Sicily were attacked. Nine Allied planes were lost but at least ten enemy planes were shot down during the attacks. Further raids have been carried out on points close to Rome.

WAR NEWS

POUND ENEMY TARGETS
LONDON—Following up smashing Royal Air Force-Royal Canadian Air Force attacks against Cologne, American bombers rounded out the week-end Sunday by dumping bombs on an airplane factory at Le Mans, France, and U-boats works at Nantes and La Pallice. The Cologne attack was the biggest of the week-end with bombers making side excursions to Hamburg and other targets in the Ruhr.
SICILY HEAVILY ATTACKED
ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA—With air supremacy over Sicily at stake, Allied squadrons attacked five of the island's major landing fields yesterday and shot down forty-three Axis fighters, it was announced today. Despite heaviest opposition from German and Italian fliers since the height of the Tunisian campaign, all but thirteen of the Allied planes returned from these missions and other attacks Saturday night.
ON RUSSIAN FRONT
MOSCOW—With artillery barrages and light land operations, fighting on the Russo-German front continues to be of small scale nature although German sources persist in predicting that Russia is about to launch a great offensive.
FIGHTING IN BURMA
NEW DELHI—An enemy bridge near Mandatay was badly damaged by Royal Air Force bombers. One span and an approach were blasted out. There were also air attacks on other points in Burma.
BIG GUNS EXCHANGE
DOVER—There was another exchange of big gun firing across the Straits of Dover today.
TROUBLE IN MARSEILLES
MOSCOW—French patriots blew up a Nazi barracks at Marseilles, killing or wounding some 80 soldiers.
MUSSOLINI'S EXHORTATION
ROME—Premier Mussolini has told Italians that honor demands they resist to the end.
TO CALL ON CANADA
OTTAWA—Canada will be called upon during the next year to deliver smashing blows against Germany, Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King declared yesterday.

New Defence For Germany

STOCKHOLM, July 5—A Berlin dispatch to the newspaper Aftonbladet, reported Sunday that a new German "General Service" military branch, headed by Grand Admiral Erich Raeder, had been created, apparently to combat any Allied invasion. Raeder was head of the German navy for the last 15 years.

POLAND'S PREMIER IS DEAD

General Sikorski is Victim of Airplane Crash After Gibraltar Take-off
LONDON, July 15 (CP)—General Wladyslaw Sikorski, Premier of the Polish government in London and commander of its armed forces, was killed last night when a plane in which he was travelling crashed shortly after taking off from Gibraltar. Sikorski, six other passengers and all members of the plane's crew except one were killed. The victims included Sikorski's daughter, Mrs. Sophia Lenowski, liaison officer between London headquarters of the Polish Auxiliary territory service (women's forces) and the Middle East.

Illness of Two Nazi Chieftains Has Been Denied

BERLIN, July 5—Illness of both Chancellor Adolf Hitler and Vice Chancellor Herman Goerring is denied. There has been rumors that they were suffering from nervous breakdowns.

NEW BISHOP OF CARIBOO

Rev. Frederic Stanfoord of Wells Is Elevated
KAMLOOPS, July 5—Rev. Frederic Stanfoord of Wells-Barcelon has been elected Anglican Bishop of Cariboo succeeding the late Bishop S. Pollinger who died recently. Other candidates for the bishopric were Archdeacon A. E. de L. Munns of Victoria, Canon J. Thompson of North Vancouver and Archdeacon B. A. Resker, formerly of Williams Lake and now in the Kootenay.

Halibut Landings For May 1943

American and Canadian halibut fleets landed 3,418,000 pounds of halibut at Prince Rupert during the month of May this year, of which 1,799,500 were from American boats and 1,618,500 from Canadian boats. Last year for May 4,813,650 pounds were landed at this port, of which 1,730,350 were Canadian and 3,083,300 were American.

Former Premier Of Nova Scotia Dies in Halifax

HALIFAX, July 5—Hon. Gordon Harrington, former Conservative Premier of Nova Scotia, died on Sunday after a lengthy illness.

Air Fields on Nazi Occupied Island Of Greece Are Attacked

Operations Were Successful With Number of Aircraft Destroyed on Ground—All Return Safely

CAIRO, July 5 (CP)—A special Middle East communique announced today that "small British land forces carried out raids on air fields in Crete last night." The communique said that operations were successful with a number of aircraft destroyed on the ground. All patrols withdrew safely.

KISKA ID. HIT AGAIN

Nine More Raids Effectively Carried Out Against Japs in Aleutians

WASHINGTON, July 5—United States bombers on Friday and Saturday made nine more raids on Kiska Island in the Aleutians. Japanese anti-aircraft installations at Gertrude Cove were attacked as well as camp areas. Considerable damage was done.

Madame Chiang Is Home Again

CHUNGKING, July 5—Madame Chiang Kai-Shek is back home in China following her visit to the United States and Canada. She returned by air and the 15,000 mile trip took less than a week.

ATLANTIC CROSSING BY GLIDER

Canadians Play Prominent Part in Latest Feat of Trans-Oceanic Aviation

LONDON, July 5—Another notable feat has been accomplished in trans-Atlantic aviation with the 3,500-mile crossing of the ocean of a glider in two of a twin-engined Douglas transport. The flight from United States to Britain by way of Newfoundland and Labrador was carried out in 28 hours flying time. The longest single hop was 812 miles, setting up a record. The plane had a load of one ton and half including vaccine and other medical supplies for Russia and radio and plane motor parts for Britain. Squadron Leader S. L. Gobeil of Montreal was co-pilot of the glider and Flight Lieutenant W. S. Longhurst of Toronto was pilot of the towing plane.

WILL LAND IN GREECE

King George II Drops Hint in Broadcast to His People

CAIRO, July 5—In a broadcast yesterday, King George II hinted at the early possibility of an Allied invasion of Greece. He urged his people to co-operate with an Allied landing. Democratic government would be restored to Greece as soon as possible after military operations.

Glorious Fourth Is Celebrated

WASHINGTON, D.C., July 5—Independence Day greetings were received from all parts of the world by President Franklin D. Roosevelt yesterday as the United States celebrated the 167th anniversary of the nation's birth.

Police Court Well Attended

Five names were on the list of alcoholic celebrants who came before Magistrate W. D. Vance in Police Court this morning to answer for their riotous conduct. Elmer Duffy, Raymond George, Walter Parnell, Conny Lantz and Annie Woodhouse were found guilty of being intoxicated and fined \$25 or seven days in jail. Thomas Barrett, a seaman, was fined \$25 for breaking a window and was assessed \$3 damages as well.

Better Mail Service . . .

Very satisfactory is the announcement that a full daily mail service is to be inaugurated on the local line of the Canadian National Railways between Edmonton and Prince Rupert. Instead of three trains a week carrying full mail cars, henceforth there will be the full mail car service six times a week in each direction. As well as Prince Rupert, Prince George and other intermediate points will benefit from the new service. In some cases, there will be a twenty-four hour advance in the delivery of mail from the East and similarly a saving of time on outgoing mail.

So far so good in the improvement of the local mail service. Now that the railway service is extended as far as the mail is concerned, it is to be hoped that there will be speedy handling in the local post-office so that the public will get the full benefit.

The genial Col. R. J. Manion, former Conservative leader and federal cabinet minister, whose death occurred at the week-end, was no stranger in Prince Rupert. He visited here on more than one occasion and his genial personality will be remembered by all those who met him. Dr. Manion, it is well known, was badly disappointed at the way the last federal election went for the Conservative party under his leadership. He did not need to have felt personally so badly about it. The party was in decline and beyond the stage where even a man of the talents and attributes of "Bob" Manion could have saved it.

Self Sealing Cloth Found

MANCHESTER, England, July 5 — Discovery of a method of water-proofing cloth without the use of rubber or other materials was announced here, and the "self-sealing" fabric now is being extensively supplied to the civilian market, but a big future is predicted for it.

The method was evolved by Dr. F. T. Price of the British Cotton Industry Research Association's Shirley Institute. The self-sealing cloth resulted from the realization that if the fibre of cotton could seal with moisture, it would block up the interstices and make fabric water-holding without waterproofing.



Summer Salads

Provided we watch our protein and vitamin intake, salads make a pleasant hot weather main dish

CHEESE SALAD MEDLEY
1 cup cooked peas
1 cup shredded carrots
Crisp lettuce
1 cup diced cheese
Cooked lima beans
French dressing

Cheese, eggs and beans are all delicious in salads and to a certain extent contain the same food elements as meat, so why not try one of these tempting arrangements for summer meals.

Mix cheese, vegetables and cooked lima beans. Stir in French dressing. Chill and serve on crisp lettuce.

Each of these salads is a useful addition to the one serving of meat we should, each of us, eat every day. Use them when you're short of meat and have to spread it a little thin at another meal. Don't forget that each member of your family also needs potatoes, one other green leafy or yellow vegetable, tomato or citrus juice, one other fruit, Canada Approved bread and milk each day.

DEVILLED EGGS AND CABBAGE SALAD

4 hard cooked eggs
2 teaspoons prepared mustard
2 teaspoons grated cheese
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 cups shredded cabbage
1 cup chopped celery
1/2 head lettuce
Mayonnaise or French dressing
Paprika

Halve the eggs. Extract the yolks, mash with cheese, mustard and salt. Replace in hollowed whites. Make individual portions with cabbage, celery and dressing, well mixed, on crisp lettuce. . . two stuffed egg halves on top. Garnish with paprika.

1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon sugar
2 tablespoons vinegar
1/4 teaspoon dry mustard
1/4 teaspoon paprika
4 tablespoons salad oil

C. for 50,000 extra hospital supplies "over and above" the regular quotas. War knows no holidays. It is being waged more fiercely than ever this summer. Our men are willing to pay the supreme sacrifice of their lives on the fighting fronts. We must not fall them on the home front. We must answer the appeal of Canadian Red Cross. Do not stop Red Cross work until emergency has been answered.

Booths Profitable
Saturday night booths in central location are proving good Red Cross money-makers for Merritt and Oliver branches. Merritt netted \$54.87 from its opening night and Oliver has been averaging approximately between \$20.00 and \$30.00 per night, this being the third summer for the latter branch. Every kind of article is sold from home-cooking, vegetables, fruit, flowers, dairy products to the odd gift of furniture.

For Maimed Prisoners
Every British prisoner-of-war in Germany who has lost a leg or an arm will soon be supplied with perfectly fitting and permanent artificial limb. A team of Swiss experts has been set up to make and fit them, according to the report of the International Red Cross Carthopedic Commission, which visited the prison camps. The temporary limbs supplied by the Germans were found to be badly fitting and for a time the Red Cross tried to solve the problem by sending limbs to measurements, which was not very successful. The Commission found that, despite the fact initial treatment had not been well applied, most of the men had completely recovered from the shock of their wounds.

Chocolate Bars
No one will mind doing without bars when they know that 796 tons are enclosed in the 100,000 parcels packed each week by volunteer workers of the Canadian Red Cross Society for prisoners of war.

Donate Film
Through the generosity of the British Film colony of Hollywood, a motion picture entitled "Forever and a Day" has been given to the Canadian Red Cross and the St. John Ambulance Association.

If all the letters posted each day in London were salvaged, enough paper could be obtained to make 300,000 ammunition boxes, said C. U. Peat, Joint Parliamentary Secretary to the Ministry of Supply.

Girls of every class dine and dance in fashionable hotels and restaurants attired in every type of garb — slacks, jumpers, suits or anything that at least provides covering. And many will be barelegged.

Some, perhaps, have not stockings. Others, husbanding their few remaining coupons, may have a pair of silk or near silk stockings and prefer to save them for some more special time.

don't like the edict, but all they can do about it is to try to soften up the powers that be. Sometimes they win, but not always. For instance, women employees at a big London store went into a huddle and decided to settle the matter their way. About 300 gathered, planned their attack and called in the owner. They told him they wanted to talk about the stockings-at-work problem. There had been a lot of bother about it. Two girls had been sent home with a warning because they disobeyed the rule. They wanted the right to dress as they pleased.

For and Against

Doris Balcome, in green printed frock and wearing stockings, championed those who pleaded for "no stockings at work." She accused the firm of red tape. She was supported by a slip of a girl 15-year-old Pat Waters, dark-haired, short-skirted and bare legged. She argued that most of her 48 clothing coupons were needed for every day clothes which she couldn't get because she had to keep herself supplied with stockings for work.

The boss listened patiently, made notes, thought a moment and then tossed the girls a fire-cracker. They didn't like the way it exploded. "This question of stockings is not a trivial matter," he said. "Efficiency cannot be maintained without some uniformity and this business must have a standard of uniformity. We must not have slovenliness."

His reply, in effect, put the girls right back where they started. They can go to work with bare legs, but all will be to do so—or vice versa. It wasn't the goal they had achieved. They wanted the right to wear stockings if they liked that way, or bare their legs if suited the mood.

Soviet Red Cross Making Contacts

LONDON, July 5 (P)—Prof. A. Sarkisov, representing the Soviet Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies, is establishing contact in Britain with the British Red Cross and scientists. The object of his visit is to exchange experiences in the medical treatment of wounded and sick soldiers and in assistance to civilians who have suffered as a result of the war.
