Returned School Teacher  
Tells of Conditions In  
Norway Under Nazi Hee.

CAMROSE, Alta., Dec. 14—John Westby, returned from Norway and Sweden, Norway early in 1939, tells how the invasion came upon the Norwegian people like a bolt from the blue." He, himself, thought Norway "the safest place anyone could go," and it was not until the night of April 8, 1940, when authorities in Oslo ordered a radio that no lights should be shown in the lighthouses, that people of his little home village, Nybergund in Trysil district, 100 miles northeast of the capital sensed that something was amiss. Everyone went to bed feeling very nervous and uneasy.

They did not know what danger threatened. Mr. Westby said that the people would have known any other country as quickly as Germany had they been asked if they knew from which country invasion was coming because such an idea was remote from their minds. There had been no indication of any kind of the Nazi plans, and Mr. Westby said the people of the capital were fully as surprised as those of the outlying centres. The invasion began on the ninth of April.

The little village of Nybergund, "about the size of Tofield," was bombed three times when Germans found the King of Norway, the cabinet and some members of parliament had made their way by car to that place. The third time the bombardment was very heavy. Mr. Westby did not say if there was any loss of life but remarked that people scattered to the surrounding woods because they were defenceless.

## Nazis Ruthless

Asked about the concentration camps, Mr. Westby said all the stories that had been told of the ruthlessness of the Nazis in his respect were true. People from all classes who were suspected of resistance to the invaders were thrown into these prisons. Grini is the most widely known of these concentration centres and is a symbol of the terrorist methods adopted. The Nazis adopted a "sleek" way of getting foodstuffs and anything of value from the Norwegian people by supplying the German soldiers with Norwegian money which became valueless because soon there was little left in which to spend it.

Asked if the report that the Germans had taken all the woollen blankets away from the Norway homes was true, Mr. Westby said large numbers of blankets were taken in southern Norway, through the Norwegian civil authorities. In the country districts he believed the citizens have not been badly off but there has been great hardship in the cities where so far as his knowledge went the people were undernourished.

During his conversation with the Canadian, Mr. Westby paid glowing tribute to the Red Cross, especially the Swedish Red Cross which he declared has been doing wonderful work. He has been asked to speak on a number of occasions since returning to the Bardo community, north of Kamrose, and says he makes a special point of giving the Red Cross the highest possible praise.

Mr. Westby was educated in the Trysil community and on coming to Alberta farmed for ten years. He then decided to go back home, and following the Nazi invasion secured a permit to teach on the island of Tromso, north of Narvik, where they had a "little Norway" all to themselves, and were not troubled by the Nazis. He was required to report to the sheriff's office at Gryllefjord, a fishing town, once a week. At the end of two years, in July, 1942, he returned to his home district, and then made his way to Sweden, a comparatively short distance. He went to the British consulate and asked to serve in any capacity, with the result that he was engaged for a year in the Press Reading Bureau from which dispatches went out to other countries.

## Swedes Sympathetic

The Swedish government intends to stay neutral. Mr. Westby believes although their sympathies are with the Allies. In his opinion the Swedish people are a little suspicious of Russia "without any real cause," and are very suspicious of Germany. There are shortages of various essentials in Sweden but his observations were that up to the time he left there was no acute hardship. While in Stockholm he saw many well known world figures, and lesser figures because capital is a centre of great diplomatic activity.

He believes that Hitler is "just playing for time in order to get good peace terms as possible, because he knows the game is lost." The war in Europe he thinks will conclude next summer.

Mr. Westby came by plane from Stockholm to Britain in six hours and from the Old Country by boat in a large convoy to St. John's. He was most happy to feel Canadian soil beneath his feet. He and Mrs. Westby are leaving in a few days to reside at the west coast.

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It is a twenty-year pact and could be joined by Poland or other nations bordering on Germany and feeling the effects of Nazi aggression.

— He Power of the Press . . .

Among the many different kinds of publications regularly off printing presses in Canada is a particular type of newspaper that caters to those who like their news well savoured with gossip and sex. One of the most lusty of these journals happens to be a product of Toronto, though the good citizens of the community argue that "it is just printed here; it is read elsewhere." Recently that paper turned its guns on the rural weekly press by way of diversion. The attack was based upon an item published by one small-town editor in which an apology was extended for something previously printed, presumably an error. The scandal paper ranted about the sins of weakness and of being willing to forgive and forget and seemed to be in favor of editors being "feared for the power they hold in their hands."

The power of the press is a very real thing, but it is a rare editor, in this country at least, who considers his power as a weapon with which to inspire fear. Rather it is a power built upon faithful presentation of the news, a power founded on justice and devoted to furthering justice. Any deviation from this principle automatically weakens that power. This is no doubt what that particular rural editor had in mind when he apologized for his error. By making the correction, he maintained his reputation for truth, and strengthened his power.

## War Christmas . . .

The ingenuity of Santa Claus has been sadly taxed this year. He has done his best to turn out tanks and guns made of wood and cardboard, but there are no clockwork mechanisms. Wooden trains lack the mobility of the streamlined electrics of a few Christmases ago. Even dolls this year are so economically constructed as to force the conclusion that many of Santa's elves and gnomes have been caught by a compulsory transfer order.

It's rather tough on parents, whose imaginations are no longer equal to creating a land of make-believe without the elaborate props of pre-war Christmases. One can hardly spend an afternoon demonstrating to little Johnny the proper method of running a wooden tractor.

For little Johnny and his friends, the situation is not too serious. One young lady of our acquaintance, forbidden the use of her skipping-rope indoors, because of possible damage to mantel-piece ornaments, still skips happily in the living-room, swinging an imaginary rope. Almost any evening after school is out one can observe sanguinary engagements waged against Japs and Germans with weapons that an unsympathetic observer might mistake for broomsticks and garden tools. A battered express-wagon is easily converted into a tank, a naval gun or a dive-bomber.

And Santa Claus has given the parents one break. This year the after-dinner nap will not be interrupted by the notes of a tin trumpet.

Red Cross Nurse  
Honored by King

Aided Captain on Ship attacked  
By German Armed Raider

LONDON, Dec. 14 — A gentle, grey-haired Red Cross nurse—Mrs. Edith Bennett McLean—who has braved gunfire and undergone imprisonment in a German prison ship and concentration camp has been cited by the King for her courage.

Mrs. McLean was aboard a British passenger ship in the Indian Ocean when it was attacked by a German armed Raider and its captain mortally wounded.

The nurse, who saw service in the last war, dashed to the ship's bridge and took up her post at the captain's side. While shells exploded around her she applied a tourniquet to his shattered legs. Just before the captain died in a lifeboat, he instructed her to tear up his secret papers, which she did, in defiance of their Nazi captors.

With the rest of the ship's company who survived the attack she spent nearly three months as prisoners on a tanker which was tender to a German pocket battleship, believed to be the Admiral Scheer. Later they were transferred via Bordeaux to a German prison camp, and repatriated this spring.

## The Experts Say . . .

OTTAWA, Dec. 14 — Macaroons require no butter and little sugar. Need we say more? If you are making shortbread for the holiday season you'll like to have this good companion receipt for cherry macaroons. The shortbread will take an egg yolk and the macaroons will use the white in delicious way. This receipt is one tested in the consumer section of the Department of Agriculture.

Add a pinch of salt to one egg white and beat until stiff; gradually beat in  $\frac{1}{4}$  cup sugar then fold in  $\frac{1}{2}$  cups of wheat or corn flakes and  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup candied or maraschino cherries, cut in small pieces. Drop with a teaspoon onto a greased baking sheet and bake in a slow oven, 325 degrees Fahrenheit, for 30 minutes. This makes one dozen small macaroons.

**MEAT STRETCHER:** Besides being a coupon saver, rolled oats or rolled wheat used as meat extenders will step up the family's calcium supply and their intake of vitamin B complex. Dr. E. B. Pett, Director of Nutrition Services, says the same

of whole grain bread and cereal can supply as much as six per cent of the day's requirement of calcium.

**PRACTICAL GIFTS:** This year more than ever before Christmas gifts should be practical, the Prices Board Consumer Branch emphasizes. Besides being out of place in the wartime scheme of things, needless expense and frivolity are not fashionable. There's no reason why duplicate or ill-fitting gifts should go to waste either because they can be exchanged at any time as long as it coincides with the retailer's merchandising policy of making exchanges.

**SUGAR SAVER:** Having coffee with a dietitian from the Agricultural Department's Consumer Service testing kitchen, we noted that she tested her coffee before adding sugar. Half the usual amount of sugar serves as sweetening if one tastes before sugaring she says. It works, too.

**WASTE LINE:** Using the same dish for cooking and serving, or

serving plates in the kitchen eliminates the waste when food is transferred from cooking dish to serving dish. It eliminates a lot of dish washing.

**FISH LOAF:** Fish is one of the most valuable forms of food, since it contains the same constituents as meat but in more digestible form. Nutrition Services says, and the Fisheries Department contributes the recipe for a delicious fish loaf:

Melt one tablespoon of butter, add one tablespoon of flour, mix and cook for one minute; then add one cup of hot milk gradually, stirring constantly; season. Add to that sauce two cups of cooked fish, two beaten eggs, one cup of soft bread crumbs, one chopped hard-boiled egg, two chopped pickles, three tablespoons of chopped parsley. Pour the mixture into a greased baking dish or mould. Place in a pan of boiling water and cook for one hour in a moderate oven. Unmould and serve sliced either hot or cold.

BERKHAMSTED, Eng. Ⓛ — Brig. Gen. John Ernest Bush, 84, who served in the British Army 63 years is dead in this Hertfordshire town.

Stylists over here say that although wartime stockings may not do anything for a girl's legs, they are actually longer wearing and of better quality than peacetime legwear.

### Victories Cause Savings Drop

LONDON, Dec. 14 (UPI)—British military successes have resulted in a "disturbing" drop in small savings in the last four months, from £15,500,000 (\$69,750,000) to £11,500,000, says Lord Kindersley, chairman of the National Savings Committee.





single R.C.N. sinking in the war to date.

Other losses during the year were the corvettes Louisburg and Weyburn, two of 17 ships of the class which took part in the Mediterranean operations. Three other corvettes of the group, Regina, Ville de Quebec and Port Arthur evened the score by sinking submarines.

**FURTHER ADDITIONS**

Besides the new tribals the Navy acquired four used destroyers from Britain and renamed them in the "river" class — H.M.C.S. Ottawa, Gatineau, Kootenay and Saskatchewan. An undisclosed number of new corvettes and frigates, built in Canada, joined the submarine-hunting force.

With no limit set to its expansion the navy pushed ahead with recruiting and training and opened a giant new training establishment at Deep Brook, N.S., a veritable university of the sea.

By latest available count the navy, which started the war with 15 ships and 1,700 men, has more than 600 ships and more than 73,000 men and women.

Along with the busy destroyers, frigates, corvettes, corvettes, and fairmiles, minesweepers got a spell of action this year when the Germans laid mines in the approaches to Halifax harbor. They were gathered up without loss of a life.
