Nazis In Violent Retreat

Fifth and Eighth Armies Making Headway—Air Attacks Face—German Ships Sunk
ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, Oct. 20 (AP)—The American Fifth Army forced the Germans into violent retreat today to a line stretched from Venafro in the mountains, eighty-three miles south of Rome, to the Mediterranean village of Mondragone, twenty miles south of Rome. The Allies captured three German divisions, Pignataro and Caserta.
The British ranged far up the Italian coast and knocked out the enemy railroad between Anagni and Cassara. Four bridges were destroyed in half an hour by unopposed American fliers.
Dozens of grounded enemy aircraft were knocked out on airfields at Viterbo and Tarquinia. Allied planes were lost.
Official dispatches from Fifth Army headquarters said the Germans were burning houses, driving civilians, destroying tracks, tearing up railroads, demolishing roads and firing tanks to provide smoke screens to cover the retreat.
The Royal Navy destroyed two German-maned Italian steamers in the Adriatic Sea off the Dalmatian coast Saturday, captured one and sank another, it was disclosed today.

WORST TO COME YET

Bloodiest Battles of War Lie Ahead Says Field Marshal Smuts.
LONDON, Oct. 20 (AP)—Field Marshal Jan C. Smuts, prime minister of the Union of South Africa, Gen. Sir Pierre Van Ryneveld and the prime minister's younger son, Jannie, are visiting Britain.
The prime minister inspected the South African 6th Division on the way and told them they had to wipe from their minds any illusion that the war was near its end. He said he was convinced that the hardest and bloodiest battles of the war ahead, that the war had rolled back into Europe where the final victorious blows would be struck. South African troops would be there at the end as they had at the beginning.
"We are standing at the turning point of the war, not at its end," the prime minister said. "You must return not only with victory, but also with peace."
Premier Smuts added that it had been South Africa's ambition for two years to have an armored division in the field. Already their infantry had made a great name for themselves and now as tankmen they would do even more than in the past.
On his arrival in London the prime minister was invited to attend the war cabinet as a member and has attended several meetings. There is a possibility he may visit the United States and Canada.

PUT UP FOR VICTORY LOAN

Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen Make \$10,000 Subscription
WINNIPEG, Man., Oct. 20 (AP)—The Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen of the Canadian National Railways, western region, are solidly behind the Victory Loan and back up this statement with a subscription for \$10,000 in bonds, according to a joint announcement made today by Frank Rasmussen, general chairman and H. H. Jell, secretary treasurer.
"The subscription is made from the accumulated funds of the general grievance committee of the order," stated Mr. Rasmussen. "We are subscribing on this block of Victory Bonds because of our thorough belief in Canada and because we as an organization wish to play our individual part in carrying Canada's war effort to a successful conclusion. Every member of our organization has a personal interest in this subscription."
On the opening day of the loan all officers and employees of the C.N.R. western region received a personal train order from W. R. Devenish, vice-president and general manager. It is numbered "V-5" and timed 2401K. The order reads: "Fifth Victory Loan special, engine split of victory, engine-man V. L. Bonds, conductor W. W. E. Canadians, operates at unlimited speed from October 18 to November 6, 1943. All concerned report to fellow employee canvasser promptly. W. R. Devenish."

Say Herriot Dead in Paris

LONDON, Oct. 20 (AP)—A Madrid dispatch to the London Daily Mail today quoted a Vichy announcement that Edouard Herriot, former president of the French Chamber of Deputies, died Sunday in a Paris sanatorium where he had been confined by the Germans.

Raid Is Hit Again

Another Allied Raid Proves Costly to Japanese—Australian Reverse on New Guinea.
ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN SOUTHWEST PACIFIC, Oct. 20 (AP)—In a new raid on Rabaul, Japan's stronghold on New Britain, which took a 350-ton bombing assault on October 12 with loss of more than one hundred ships and 177 aircraft shot down, Allied planes have destroyed sixty more aircraft and inflicted new shipping damage. A destroyer, a gunboat and a 5,000-ton medium cargo vessel were sunk in the new raid and another cargo ship and a corvette were hit and damaged.
In New Guinea land fighting the Australians have suffered a reverse near Finschhafen which they recently captured.

Nazis Are Desperate

Russians Threaten German Positions Leaving Only One Line Of Escape.
MOSCOW, Oct. 20 (AP)—The whole German position inside the Dnieper River elbow was threatened today as harassed Nazi commanders hurled fresh divisions of men, tanks and artillery into the fight in an attempt to halt the Russian flanking drive on the west of the river. The Russian major breakthrough southwest of Kremenchug has swept into 130 settlements and the railway junction of Pyatikhatka to outflank Dneprodzerzhinsk, 40 miles to the east, and Dneproprostrovsk, 70 miles to the east. The capture of Pyatikhatka leaves the Germans with but one line to evacuate the whole Dnieper bend.

Return With Record Catch

American Seal Hunters Back From Pribiloff Islands With Over 173,000 Pelts.
ST. LOUIS, Mo., Oct. 20 (AP)—Two months behind schedule but with a 73-year record for the number of seal skins taken from under the noses of the Japanese, 40 St. Louisians are returned home yesterday from an expedition to the Pribiloff Islands, more than 200 miles north of Dutch Harbor, Alaska. They arrived in Seattle on Friday with 117,164 seal skins.

Repairs to Road To Floats Sought

The deplorable condition of the roadway leading eastward from the dry dock to the fishermen's floats was under discussion at the meeting of the city council Monday and it was left to the co-ordinating committee to deal further with the matter. The road actually comes under Canadian National Railways jurisdiction but it was felt that, since the navy had been responsible for putting the road in disrepair owing to using it for heavy traffic, repairs might be forthcoming from that quarter.

British Coal Strike Ended

LONDON, Oct. 20 (AP)—A new British coal mine strike, with 2,000 miners walking out in Yorkshire for higher wages, broke yesterday after a dispute which had affected 13 Welsh mines was virtually settled.

TO EVACUATE ROME
BERNE—According to reports reaching here from Italy, the Germans plan to evacuate Rome by the end of the month.

WHEAT TO RUSSIA
OTTAWA—Large shipments of Canadian wheat will be made to Russia from Canada under the new lease-lend agreement which for the first time includes this Dominion.

AIRMEN ARRIVE
LONDON—Another large group of Royal Canadian Air Force personnel—air and ground crew—has safely arrived in Britain.

INVASION OF GREECE
BERLIN—The German radio predicts that the Allies will soon essay an invasion of the Balkans by way of Salonika in Greece.

STRIKE SITUATION
BIRMINGHAM, Alabama—Mayor Cooper Green of Birmingham describes the coal mine strike situation as "critical." Only 22 of 80 mines are now working and there is danger of the miners' strike spreading to gas workers.

INDIAN GOVERNMENT?
TOKYO—A provisional government for India has been set up under Japanese auspices with headquarters in Singapore, it was announced today by the Japanese radio. It will soon declare war on Great Britain and the United States.

OLD MAESTRO DIES
HOLLYWOOD—Ben Bernie, the "old maestro" of stage and screen, died today. He had suffered from heart trouble since an attack of pneumonia last spring.

OVERCOME RESISTANCE
ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN ITALY—Despite strong German resistance, the Allied forces advanced up to eleven miles north of the Volturno River yesterday. The battle of the Volturno is now over, all Germans being cleared from the valley. There are indications that the Nazis are planning a general retirement, their resistance flagging after fierce fighting. The Eighth and Fifth Armies have captured new towns. The Allied Air Force from North Africa is steadily pounding the whole Italian line.

Interior Flier Awarded D.F.C.

Pilot Officer E. Robin of Hazelton, son of Mr. A. E. Robin of Pacific and former agent telegrapher of Canadian National Railways, has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for service overseas with the Royal Air Force. Pilot Officer Robin, who is a navigator, served first with the coastal command and more recently has been in India as captain of a flying boat.

Midnight Show To Go On Here

Commenting on the recent press story that Famous Players Canadian Corporation was discontinuing midnight shows as a matter of co-operation with the director of coal conservation, Manager D. G. Borland of the local Famous Players Capitol Theatre, states that his weekly Sunday midnight show policy will not be affected.
These Sunday midnight shows, he states, were instituted in the interests of the armed services and war workers of this community and as a means of recreation are highly appreciated.

LONDON IS ATTACKED

Some Casualties as Metropolis Has Fourth Night Alert—Not Much Allied Activity

LONDON, Oct. 20 (AP)—A small force of German raiders dropped bombs at widely separated places in eastern England last night, touched off the fourth successive night alert in London and caused some casualties. Four persons were killed by a bomb which dropped in one suburb.
The Royal Air Force had a quiet night, there being no report of any large scale action. American heavy bombers attacked targets in western Germany today.

CANADIANS EXCHANGED

First Group of 5,000 Disabled Empire's and U.S. Prisoners Of War Leaves Sweden Today

LONDON, Oct. 20 (AP)—The return of British, Canadian and United States disabled prisoners of war from Germany under an exchange agreement is under way, the Foreign Office announced yesterday, and the first parties are being embarked at Goteborg, Sweden, for the voyage home. At Ottawa the Department of External Affairs announced that 50 Canadian soldiers and airmen are included in the 5,000 Empire and United States troops under exchange.

Would Clear Up Loggers' Strike

Situation in Logging Industry On Queen Charlottes Receives Attention of Council.

The Queen Charlotte Island loggers' strike situation was brought up at Monday night's meeting of the city council by Ald. J. S. Black whose motion that representations be made to have the matter cleared up.
Ald. Black said that several years ago legislation had been enacted providing for the arbitration of labor disputes. This was fair enough but the point was that findings were not binding on the parties concerned and they did not have to be accepted. There had been many cases where employers had failed to accept findings which might be adverse to them. Such was the situation on the Queen Charlotte Islands. The alderman contended that there should be compulsory acceptance of arbitration board findings. Otherwise the arbitration act might as well be scrapped. At a time like this, it was unfortunate that such a condition as now existed on the Islands should have arisen.

Relieve Traffic Congestion Near Borden-Taylor

In view of the routing of traffic by the United States forces of traffic over Taylor Street to Fifth Avenue congestion has been caused for pedestrians and the city council is asking the Americans to remove a rock ledge at that point and furnish lumber and material necessary to place sidewalks on either side of the street. The matter came before the city council at its meeting Monday night and, at the suggestion of the mayor, was left in the hands of the board of works which already is dealing with it.
The city engineer has been instructed to proceed with the widening of Borden Street at Taylor Street, keeping the sidewalk on the south side of the street ten feet from the property line and on the north side immediately south of the pole

Mussolini Wants Off

Graziani is Slated as Successor; Grandi in Portugal?
STOCKHOLM, Oct. 20 (AP)—A Budapest dispatch to Dagnes Nyheter newspaper reported today that Benito Mussolini would resign as head of the puppet Italian "Republican Fascist" government and withdraw from public life because of poor health. Marshal Rodolfo Graziani is reported slated to succeed Mussolini who has not been active since he was "rescued" in Italy and taken to Germany for refuge.
Count Dino Grandi, former Italian foreign minister, is reported to be in refuge in the country in Portugal.

Allies Supreme In Italian Air

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN ALGIERS, Oct. 20 (AP)—The North African air force maintains battle supremacy over the front in Italy.
The biggest air news yesterday was made by bomber fleets which blasted the railroad yards at Skopje in Yugoslavia on the only railway line running from Belgrade to Albania.

Herbert Marshall Visits Vancouver

VANCOUVER, Oct. 20 (AP)—Herbert Marshall, popular British stage and screen star and veteran of the last war, arrived in Vancouver last night for a two-day visit in connection with the Victory Loan campaign. He visited the shipyard workers today. Mrs. Marshall is with him.

Japan Crossing Solween River

NEW DELHI, Oct. 20 (AP)—The Japanese crossed the Solween River yesterday into China, it is announced here. The enemy had been stalled there for 18 months.

Japan Landing Attempt Fails

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN SOUTH PACIFIC, Oct. 20 (AP)—A Japanese attempt to effect a landing at Finchhafen, which was recently captured by the Australians, failed. Two of three landing barges were sunk and the third disappeared.

Record of U.S. Subs

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20 (AP)—American submarines, carrying the war into Japanese home waters, have sunk 460 Japanese vessels since the war began, the Navy announced yesterday. The figures included 148 enemy ships not previously listed. The Navy's total showed 319 ships sunk, 33 probably sunk and 105 damaged.

ONE-QUARTER MARK IS REACHED IN TWO DAYS — CANVASSERS REPORT GOOD RECEPTION — SOME INTERESTING INCIDENTS.

The response to the Fifth Victory Loan campaign in Prince Rupert continues to far outstrip that of its predecessors. For the first two days of the campaign the total subscriptions are \$178,900 as compared with \$85,250 in the first two days of the Fourth Victory Loan. Yesterday's subscriptions amounted to \$80,500. The quarter way mark has now been reached.
Victory bond purchasers are being encouraged by Victory Loan headquarters to display their honor certificates in conspicuous places in the windows of their business places and homes. The purpose of these illuminated acknowledgements, signed by the Minister of Finance, they emphasize, is not only to be a token of recognition of a Victory bond purchase, but also, by their prevalence, to act as an encouragement for others to buy.
Victory Loan salespeople report that about 80 per cent of the people they have so far interviewed have been courteous and receptive in their response. One woman appeared to be glad to buy a bond as a backlog of savings for her 19-month old child. Another offered as the reason for her purchase the fact that if she didn't buy, she would feel that she was "letting the boys down."
People should not feel that on the strength of Monday's high record of sales they can relax in their purchases. It was pointed out that the bulk of the bonds credited to the first day of the campaign were large individual sales to individuals and firms, some of which were arranged as early as last Friday. Loan Rising; Armed Forces Setting Pace

OTTAWA, Oct. 20 (AP)—Subscriptions on Tuesday to the Fifth Victory Loan totalled \$58,857,700, raising to \$126,587,150 the value of bonds sold in the first two days of the campaign. National headquarters announced Wednesday. The armed forces continue to lead the way in volume of subscriptions.

Parleys On Both Sides

Hitler Meets His Aides in Berlin — Looking for Escape—Moscow Conference Continues.
LONDON, Oct. 20 (AP)—Adolf Hitler held a second grand strategy parley in two weeks in Berlin, presumably to explore avenues of escape from the consequences of total defeat as representatives of Germany's three strongest enemies gathered in Moscow to plot the liquidation of his Empire.
Hitler met with his military and political leaders whom he addressed. Field Marshal Wilhelm Kitel, chief of staff, presided.
Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden of Great Britain, Secretary of State Cordell Hull of United States and Foreign Commissar Molotov of Russia, who had an opening 2 1/4 hour session at the Kremlin in Moscow last night, were meeting for a second conversation today.

Wavell Sworn in As India Viceroy

NEW DELHI, Oct. 20 (AP)—Field Marshal Viscount Archibald Wavell was formally sworn in Wednesday as Viceroy of India, succeeding Lord Linlithgow.

Nomination by C.C.F....

The nomination of a young airman as candidate of the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation for Skeena riding in the next federal election is the first definite move in the campaign in this constituency. It is the signal for the C.C.F. to intensify its vote-seeking activities locally — to concentrate on the campaign which the C.C.F. keeps up steadily in season and out as far as elections are concerned. It is this steady campaigning that, no doubt, has been largely responsible for the success the socialist party has been having of late in general provincial elections and in federal by-elections.

The election date has not yet been announced and until the date is named, there will not be general campaigning although the new leader of the Conservative Progressive party has been active.

The government party has been distinctly inactive insofar as preparing for another election is concerned. It should not be too complacent about the situation. There have been events that distinctly look like handwriting on the wall.

Situation Deteriorating...

The state of order in downtown Prince Rupert by night is beginning to deteriorate again. The fact was taken cognizance of by the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce at a recent meeting which passed a resolution on the matter.

We well remember what the situation in this regard was in Prince Rupert about a year and a half ago. We also remember the means that were taken to rectify it. We do not wish to appear as kill-joys but, if the granting of certain privileges and the relaxation of restrictions means we are to return to the old conditions of law and order, then we must advocate a restoration of the restrictions which were proven to have been so effective. There is no intention of spoiling anybody's good time providing the good time does not take the form of hoodlumism and disorder which becomes obviously objectionable. If some people, be they civilians or soldiers, are not able to take care of themselves without becoming objectionable when they are granted some privileges, they are the ones really to blame and, on account of them, the privileges of all may be removed.

We do not want Prince Rupert to slip back into the old way and, judging from the way things have been going lately, it is about time now to do something about it again. The authorities concerned are, doubtless, keeping the situation under close check.

AIR FORCE WINS GAME

Even's Up Game Count With Ontario Regiment in Pre-season Basketball.

Air Force Flyers decisively defeated Ontario Regiment by a 56 to 36 score in their second pre-scheduled basketball warm-up at Seal Cove last night. The Regiment had won the first encounter 55 to 49.

Although the play-making was smoother and the passing more accurate than in the first exhibition, there was still an almost total lack of defensive work with the possible exception of Zack who is no slouch either when it comes to shooting.

Lindsay, a local boy and one of last year's top scorers, donned the Air Force blue for the first time this season to hit the hoop for seven baskets. He played a rushing game and did a considerable amount of the pegging for the Flyers. Blore was close behind with six successful tries.

Kutner and Hunt slaved away for the Regiment, the former bagging 14 points and the latter nine. The Army boys were outshot two to one on the evening's play and at no time were they out in front.

The game broke slowly with Air Force doing most of what shooting there was and missing from close in. They finally got the range and ran up a 12 to 4 count at the end of the first quarter.

In the second semester five-foot-five Gerasimof, smallest man on the floor, decided to make himself heard from and, after some nice ball handling, sailed through for two baskets and a buckshee toss on behalf of the Air Force. The Regiment was hemmed in its back court most of the time and negotiated only two baskets to make it ten all told against the Flyers' 23 at the half, but they cut loose a little in the third.

After Honeyman opened up with three points for the Flyers, Kutner nullified it with a similar effort and Hunt followed with two baskets and a free toss. At this point, both sides paid little thought to rear-guard action, went all out and were caught flat-footed time and time again.

It was 36 to 20 going into the

final quarter when the game began to roughen up. With but five minutes to go the score was 45 to 28 and, although Kutner and Hunt combined for ten more points, the Flyers dropped a couple more through the target to win going away.

Prisoners Are Treated Better

LONDON, Oct. 20 (P)—Magnanimous treatment of some British prisoners of war in Germany led to an unofficial statement here that Nazi authorities are looking ahead to their ultimate defeat and wish to create a favorable impression.

According to a letter home from Trooper John Hazel, groups of prisoners have been taken on tours of points of interest, have enjoyed first-class food and even beer. The treatment is not isolated to any one camp. Hazel is a prisoner at Stalag VIII.

(Despite reports of such treatment, however, there has been no official indication that shackles have been removed from Canadian and other prisoners taken at Dieppe.)

BATH, England, Oct. 20 (P)—The home which sheltered Emperor Haile Selassie during his exile from Ethiopia will become a refuge for babies who were bombed out by Nazi aerial attacks.

Selassie moved into the \$12,000 residence in 1938 and lived in it most of the time until 1940, when he returned to his native land in the wake of British armies and completed the restoration of his empire.

The place will be converted to philanthropic purposes as soon as the last members of the royal family leave England. The Emperor's daughter, the widowed Princess Tenagework, plans to go home shortly, as will Haile Selassie's third son who has been studying at Bristol University.

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

Young Airman Buys First Stewart Bond

STEWART, Oct. 20—The Fifth Victory Loan campaign got off to a flying start in the Stewart and Premier district early, on Monday morning, one of the younger members of the community again taking the lead. The first purchaser on this occasion was AC2 John Bouzek of the Royal Canadian Air Force who is now stationed in the Edmonton district. His application was sent by mail to the local chairman of the Na-

tional War Finance Committee, in order to have it included in the Stewart and Premier district quota. "Jackie," as he is popularly known, was reared in Stewart and is the youngest lad from this community to join the R.C.A.F. His two brothers also wear the same uniform, one overseas, and the other is now serving in Canada after seeing considerable service in England. His parents are now residing in Prince Rupert where his father is employed at the local dry dock. Since the start of the war his mother has been an ardent worker for the Portland Canal War Fund, the local ladies' society for providing warm garments and comforts to

IN FEBRUARY, 1942, Bill Cowie was sweating in the stokehold of the Canadian corvette "Barrie". Off Iceland, the convoy they were escorting ran into a U-boat pack. The escorts fought it off, only to encounter another, and then another.

"It was a running battle for a week and a half," says Cowie. "Two merchant ships and a Free French corvette were torpedoed. Thirty-five of the corvette's crew were lost. The "Barrie" and another ship brought the rest — almost three dozen ships — safely to port. As revenge, on the way back we tackled a sub — and we think we 'got' her."

Bill Cowie had a close shave when a depth charge exploded alongside his corvette, smashing surface pumps and cracking boiler seams. While he was aboard the corvette "Buctouche", they sank a U-boat not far off Nova Scotia. Earlier, his ship, a British armed merchant cruiser, helped a convoy of 30 tankers elude a Nazi surface raider.

This man knows the thrill of action against Hitler's water wolves. He knows what it is like to see fighting comrades go to their deaths. He has seen the look in the eyes of torpedoed merchant seamen snatched from expected death.

"There's a big job to be done yet," says Bill Cowie, "and it can't be done unless folks at home back us up. We'll do the dirty work — gladly. All you have to do is lend your money. If you could spend just one minute in action out on the Atlantic, you wouldn't hesitate about buying bonds."

STOKER Petty Officer W. H. Cowie is a short, wiry, bespectacled sailor, 41 years of age. For 31 months he toiled in the stokeholds of corvettes and armed merchantmen on Atlantic convoy routes. In that time, his convoys lost only three ships. To even the score, the escort ships on which he served scored one submarine sunk, and two probables.

A year ago he was mentioned in dispatches. "I can't figure out," he says, "just what for. I haven't done anything special. It was just my job."

A few weeks ago, Bill Cowie was transferred to shore duty. But he is not happy. "I want to go back to sea again," he says, "because that's where I can really do my part to beat the U-boats."

Petty Officer Cowie receives \$2.65 a day in the Navy. His wife gets \$36.40 a month dependent's allowance. He and his wife are putting every cent they can save into Victory Bonds.

St. John Ambulance Group Outline Future Policy at Meeting Last Night

A vigorous program of first aid and industrial first aid training was outlined for the near future at a meeting of the local branch of the St. John Ambulance Association last night.

The proposed extension of the activities of the association is made possible by the fact that arrangements are now completed for a new permanent headquarters and training centre in a part of the building which houses the Public Health Unit on Second Avenue. The new quarters are expected to be ready about the end of the month.

As well as first aid courses, which will be supervised by Angus MacDonald as instructor, training classes for women in home nursing will also be held in which the Ambulance Association and the Health Unit authorities will co-operate closely. Miss Hardy of Victoria, a fully qualified instructor of first aid and home nursing, will have charge of the ladies' classes with the co-operation of Mr. Armstrong.

"Our general progressive policy, which will become active early in November, offers every facility for those wishing advantage of first aid training," said Robert Reid, Association secretary.

The meeting, which was under the chairmanship of W. L. Armstrong, president of the local branch, was featured by a presentation of proficiency certificates to a large number of members.

 Alcoholism Seen by Evangelist As Greatest Menace to Western Powers.

True temperance teaches us to dispense entirely with everything hurtful and to use in moderation that which is healthful declared Evangelist Balmer in his lecture Sunday evening in the Oddfellows' Hall. Continuing, he said: "It is almost unbelievable that an enlightened people would permit the rationing of evil things at anytime. The greatest menace that confronts the western powers today is alcoholism. Although its sale is restricted yet the resulting evils are legion. Nations of antiquity passed into oblivion because of it."

The Evangelist quoted a noted Frenchman who said that, if France did not wish to die, she must begin by burning out alcoholism. The warning went unheeded. The sinister fifth columnist—liquor—contributed largely to her defeat in the present war and said the speaker, unless further drastic measures were taken to curb the consumption of alcoholic liquors in the armed forces and among civilians of allied countries victory would be delayed.

The speaker urged upon his audience to exert every influence to bring about total prohibition of alcoholic liquors which has been proved infinitely superior to the present system.

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TENDERS FOR CEDAR POLE TIMBER ON KITSUMKALUM INDIAN RESERVE NO 1, SKEENA DISTRICT, B.C.

Sealed tenders addressed to the undersigned and marked on the face of the envelope "Tender for Kitsumkalum Timber" will be received until 3:00 p.m. on Monday, the 15th day of November, 1943, for the purchase of all cedar poles on the Indian Reserve known as Kitsumkalum No. 1, Skeena District, Province of British Columbia.

This reserve contains an area of 1124 acres, more or less, and is reported to contain a stand of approximately 150,000 lineal feet of cedar poles, which is offered for sale at an upset price for cedar poles 20 feet and under, of three cents per lineal foot, and for cedar poles over 20 feet, of 3 1/2 cents per lineal foot.

Three years will be allowed in which to complete the cutting and removal of the timber under the provisions of the Indian Timber Regulations. The Indians of the Kitsumkalum Band shall be given the preference by way of employment in the work of cutting and removing the timber, and as far as the disposal of slash and debris is concerned the operator will be required to satisfy the Provincial Forest Service.

Tenders must submit their offer on the form of tender provided for that purpose, the bids indicating the price offered per lineal foot for poles under 20 feet, 21 to 30 feet, 31 to 40 feet and 41 feet or over in length; for railway ties and fence posts per piece, and shingle bolts per cord, and each tender must be accompanied by an accepted cheque on any Canadian chartered bank, for a sum representing a deposit of \$500.00, together with an annual ground rental of \$224.00 and first year's licence fee of \$50.00, such cheque to be made payable to the Receiver General of Canada and to be returnable to the unsuccessful tenderer; the highest or any tender not necessarily accepted.

Should a tender be accepted, the deposit will be held by the Department until the undertaking is completed to the satisfaction of the Minister of the Department of Mines and Resources.
