CAMBRIDGE, Sept. 7 (CP)-Prime Minister Winston Churchill said on Monday that the United States, which could not escape responsibility in time of global conflict, would have equal responsibility in the peace that follows. Mr. Churchill addressed a special convocation of the faculty of Harvard University called to award him an honorary degree of Doctor of Laws. "The price of greatness is responsibility" declared the Prime Minister, who said that the gift of a common tongue was a priceless inheritance to British and American peoples "and it may well become the foundation of common citizenship."

## An Appeal for the Army . . .

Multitudinous have become the appeals for financial aid that the war has brought. The most of them are worthy and deserving of our support. Certainly among these worthy ones we may list the Salvation Army's Red Shield Home Front Appeal which will be coming on later this month. Here in Prince Rupert the campaign has been set to open on September 20 which is two weeks hence.

## Early End of War? . . .

Hitler will be eliminated before the year is over declares the foreign letter of the International Statistical Bureau.

While it is possible that the European war will continue until next spring, the chance that Germany will collapse this fall has been increased appreciably. We would increase the odds favoring Germany's early collapse from about 50-50 to about 60-40. The main reasons are the effects of Italian disintegration, bombing, and Russia's progress.

The Italian mainland (now invaded) will quickly be made the base for a drive into the Balkans. Simultaneous invasions elsewhere-in the North of Europe, in Denmark or Northern France - are

Although Russia will be anxious to maintain its strength for the final stages of the war, the weakening of Germany's entire military position plus continued Russian pressure will result in further German defeats on this front.

Japan will have to revise its strategy quickly in view of Italy's collapse and the prospect that the European war will end soon. Further Japanese offensives will be limited to China, with the purpose of eliminating bases from which United States flyers can bomb Tokyo.







## Extension of Compulsory Employment Transfers.

To Employers and Employees:

THE 6th Compulsory Employment Transfer Order, issued under authority of National Selective Service Civilian Regulations, requires compliance not later than September 8th, 1943. After that date no employer may continue to employ any man covered by this Order, unless under special permit.

The first five Compulsory Transfer Orders listed occupations, and required compliance by all male employees in those occupations if (a) in an age and marital class designated under the Military Call-up, or if (b) 16, 17 or 18 years of age. The Sixth Order repeats all occupations given in the five earlier Orders, and requires all other men from 16 to 40 years of age (both ages inclusive) to become available for transfer to higher priority jobs, by registering at the nearest Employment and Selective Service Office.

Details of the Sixth Order were advertised in daily newspapers at the end of August. Copies of the Order may be secured from any Employment and Selective Service Office.

If in doubt as to the coverage of this Order, or the procedure under it, ask your nearest Employment and Selective Service Office.

> All men, married or single, employed in designated occupations, aged 16 to 40, are now covered by the Orders. To avoid penalties, those who have not yet registered must do so by September 8th, 1943.




