

### Production of 1943 in Surface and Aircraft to be Greater Than Whole Before

INDIANAPOLIS, April 10 - More new fighting ships will have been completed for the United States in 1943 than there were in all in the fleet in 1942, Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox asserted in an address here last night. The tonnage of the fighting fleet will have been increased by 66 2-3 percent in the vear.

Aircraft carrier strength will have been multiplied many times by 1943 production and destroyer escorts completed in 1943 will total more than there were in all at the end of 1942.

The war in the Pacific had demonstrated the importance of aircraft carriers, Col. Knox said.

Destroyer escorts were more than ever required to deal with the ing. schools of enemy submarines which infested the seas.

The Secretary of the Navy referred to the great increase in striking power of naval armament which would be further developed in 1943.

Naval auxiliary vessels were also being increased by one hundred percent this year.
