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After Russia, What? . . .

After the Russians reach the German borders and have liberated their own land, which they now bid fair to do ere long, what? That is the question which many people, now that the Russian campaign is going so well, are pondering. Some appear to be quite repudiated about it. Many of us would like to see Russia fight on against the Nazis, driving into the enemy's own land after they have been driven from Soviet soil. Whether the Red Armies will do this, however, remains to be seen. There is a question if, in the long run, it would be the strategic thing to do for the time being at least. Conceivably the Russians might do better for the common cause than by expending their materials and their men in a large scale direct counter-invasion against a bristling Reich.

It is reasonable for us to rest assured that at the recent Moscow conference there was agreement reached on what the next course of action will be after the very important task of liberating Russia itself has been accomplished. That Russia should not carry on the fight is inconceivable now although there might have been some uncertainty on that score a while back. Quite possibly the Russians, once they have rid their own land of the enemy, may turn to driving the aggressors out of other occupied territory rather than essaying just yet to fight them on their own ground.

There is plenty of good and effective fighting ground in Europe besides Germany although, of course, the popular idea for us all is carry the fighting into the Reich itself and that with a minimum of delay.

We must also remember that, while Russia was calling upon us for a second front in western Europe, we had our own ideas on that matter and acted accordingly. Subsequent events are beginning to indicate that we were right, too.

So what Stalin and his men shall do after Russia is cleared of the enemy is something for them in their good wisdom to decide. Meanwhile, we may be right in assuring ourselves that whatever is done will be further in the way of an effort to bring about the victory on terms satisfactory to the world as speedily as possible.

The Ambulance Question . . .

Possibly there is a little too much argument as to who should operate the ambulance—the hospital or the city. Both disclaim the direct responsibility although both, no doubt, are willing to bend every effort towards arriving at some arrangement that will provide a really satisfactory service.

It should not be forgotten that we still have no ambulance so, while discussing how it should be run, we might also do what we can for the campaign that is being conducted to raise the funds to buy the ambulance. Possibly, it might seem a little incongruous that it should be necessary to go about begging for funds for such a necessary public utility. It all goes back to the question as to who should be responsible for the providing of the ambulance service.

We would suggest that the campaign go on as speedily as possible, even to the point where it would be possible to offer the ambulance to the city or the hospital board or both and challenge them with the operating and maintaining of the service. No doubt, they would find some satisfactory arrangement. We feel that they could well be trusted to do so.

C.C.F. OR LABOR PROGRESSIVE

Editor, Daily News:

I read your editorial on Tim Buck, in Thursday's issue, with much interest. May I point out the dangers of accepting Mr. Buck at his own valuation and say so?

Naturally he was neither radical nor revolutionary as it was part of his mission to be mild in selling himself and his Labor Progressive party to the unwary in the business element and all those ignorant of Communist policy, program and tactics.

Have they forgotten, under the charm of his banquet table talk that he was for years the leader of the Communist Party of Canada, that after supporting an all out war against fascism for three weeks they suddenly switched to opposition to what they now termed a capitalist, imperialist, war and demanded a negotiated peace with the butcher Hitler and his murderous crew? Could Judas do worse?

By underground agitation they aided the enemy while that enemy ravaged and overran Europe and outwitted and enslaved its peoples. British Commonwealth men, women and children, bled and died while London and other British cities were smashed and gutted. This lasted for twenty two months until Soviet land was attacked. Not once had they cried out for a "second front" although all of Europe was under Hitler's heel and the British Commonwealth was fighting with back to the wall and alone.

But when Germany attacked Russia and his Communist motherland had to defend herself and was now, regardless of the past, our ally—did Mr. Buck come out of hiding and offered to do all in his power to forward our war efforts which now were bent on aiding Soviet land in every way in our power? No.

Instead, on June 22 1941 Mr. Buck issued a four page manifesto calling for an immediate Communist revolution in Canada, the overthrow of British institutions, and the setting up of a Canadian Soviet Republic. A nice local act, wasn't it?

My authority for this is a booklet by Dr. Watson Kirkconnell of Winnipeg—entitled "Our Ukrainian Loyalists" published by "Ukrainian Canadian Committee" of Winnipeg. But Mr. Buck is super loyalist now—a rebel no more! So he, and his new party, would have us believe!

However—I would warn all those who desire the best for Canadians now and after the war to guard well, and use wisely, our hard bought freedom of liberty of speech and thought and not let Mr. Buck fool them. A leopard can't change its spots nor will a Communist change so completely without some deep underlying motive.

Mr. Buck and the Communists of the old brigade, have taken a new name; Presto! They have a new aim, so they say. They've adopted the C.C.F. program and the parliamentary way.

Instead of being anti-parliamentarians, advocates of force, seizure of power, a proletarian dictatorship, confiscation, and anti-religion, they now deny having advocated the use of force, abolition of parliament, parties etc. and affirm they always believed in law abiding methods.—Well! we shall see.

On October 31st at his Capitol Theatre meeting in answer to this question: "The Communist Party, which you led in the past, advocated the use of force instead of the ballot, the seizure of power by the workers, and a dictatorship of the proletariat which meant a minority in Canada, as well as anti-religion. Do you now repudiate this stand and sincerely admit you were wrong in opposing the C.C.F. program and tactics?" Mr. Buck said: "The Communist Party never advocated the use of force in taking over power in any country!"

I challenged him to let me come to the platform and I would prove the statement untrue from "The Program of the Communist International" which I held in my hand, but he knew it was dynamite that would blow his plan for fooling the people sky high, and didn't permit me. Then too I was challenged by the ushers.

The shouts of—shut up! throw him out! you ought to be ashamed; etc. followed the usual line of clamor of Communist Party supporters when they don't want an audience to

hear the other side. Quite different from the C.C.F. who invite and welcome questions from any source, written or verbal, and comments thereon. Mr. Buck in explaining, admitted there were some passages in the program referred to which might be so interpreted but tried to make out these referred only to a time when a legally elected government of Communists might have to use force against objecting capitalists and their supporters. Force would then be legal he told the judge!

However—I need not question Mr. Buck's specious statement, or his veracity. I will quote but a few passages from "The Program of the Communist International" which give the lie to him and his deluded supporters.

Near the top of page 34 it states: "The characteristic features of this transition period as a whole are the ruthless suppression of the resistance of the exploiters". At the bottom of the page and on 35, it states: (note well)

"The conquest of power by the proletariat does not mean peacefully capturing the ready made bourgeoisie State machinery by means of a parliamentary majority. The bourgeoisie resorts to every means of violence and terror to safeguard and strengthen its predatory property, and its political domination—hence the violence of the bourgeoisie can be suppressed only by the stern violence of the proletariat. The conquest of power by the proletariat is the violent overthrow of bourgeois power, the destruction of the capitalist State apparatus (bourgeoisie armies, police, etc.) and the substitution in its place of new organs of proletarian power, to serve primarily as instruments for the suppression of the exploiters."

Business men, and others who are ignorant of Communist duplicity—note well—the terms used "suppression of the exploiters", violent overthrow, "destruction of armies", "Police" and especially of "Parliaments" and Tim Buck—whom you eulogize in your editorial—led the Canadian branch of the party which advocated the above. Is it any wonder that he and his troop didn't want me to read this from the platform? Speaking of the "Dictatorship of the proletariat and its Soviet form" it states on page 37: "The Soviet State completely disarms the bourgeoisie and concentrates

all arms in the hands of the proletariat: It is the armed proletarian State." (peaceful means?)

On page 82, near the top, it describes mass action in preparation for seizing power quote "This mass action includes strikes; a combination of strikes and demonstrations, and finally the general strike, conjointly with armed insurrection against the State powers of the bourgeoisie. The latter form of struggle, which is the supreme form must be conducted according to the rules of war. It presupposes a plan of campaign; offensive fighting operations, and unbounded devotion and heroism on the part of the proletariat."

On page 38, it tells of the Dictatorship of the proletariat and expropriation and confiscation of industry, transportation, and communication services.

On page 47 it states "The dictatorship of the proletariat is a stubborn fight—bloody and bloodless, violent and peaceful, military and economic, pedagogical and administrative—against the forces and traditions of the old society"

At the bottom of the page it names all those who remain loyal to the bourgeoisie and landlords quote "Against whom ruthless war must be waged"

But strangely enough though Mr. Buck accused the C.C.F. of being "non socialist" and "reformist" because some of its members pointed out the possibility that during an internum period, while larger changes were being made, small business might be left in private hands. On page 49 it states "The petty urban bourgeoisie (small business men) must likewise be neutralized and, as far as possible, won over to the side of the proletariat. This can be achieved by leaving to them their small property and permitting a certain measure of free trade, by releasing them from the bondage of usurious credit and by the proletariat helping them in all sorts of ways, in the struggle against all and every form of capitalist oppression." Mr. Buck, take note! Do the labor Progressives subscribe to this?

Just one quotation on religion and I am finished: on page 53 it states: "One of the most important tasks of the cultured revolution affecting the wide masses is the task of systematically and unswervingly combatting religion—the opinion of the people" and on page 54 same paragraph, it states "At

the same time, the proletarian State, while granting liberty of worship and abolishing the privileged position of the formerly dominant religion, carries on anti-religious propaganda with all the means at its command and reconstructs the whole of its educational work on the basis of scientific materialism.

There are many more questions along the same lines that can be given which prove Mr. Buck dishonest and untruthful in his statements from the public platform.

If he had been honest and admitted what every older communist and C.C.F. adherent knows to be true we could have felt he and his followers were sincere in striving to work by peaceful means for a new order but his actions and statements leave a very strong suspicion in many minds especially when he forms a new party which can only result in withdrawing support from the C.C.F. and splitting the farmer labor vote

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ACTIVITIES OF Y.M.C.A. AND Y.W.C.A.

The sum of \$25 was raised toward the children's gifts. All children of people in the services, 12 or under, should be registered.

Art Peacock, who recently took a trip to Alaska, has written down his experiences and impressions for us. He says:

"The 'Holiday' slipped her moorings on Tuesday, Alaska bound, with 22 passengers and a crew of nine aboard. The trip to Ketchikan was scenic but uneventful. As we had a two hour stop I had a hurried visit at the USO. From there to Juneau the going was very rough due to bad weather and seasickness. "Towards the middle of the second day we ran into numerous schools of porpoises who played tag with our ship for miles on end, circling the boat, leaping high in the water and deliberately clowning for the amusement of those on board. We sighted two whales near the famous Taku Glacier. Although the sun was not shining when we saw the Glacier the ice field on it was absolutely dazzling near the cloud line. The valley into which it disappeared was a kaleidoscope of color, as though viewed through a rainbow screen.

"We skirted Juneau, following a channel bordered with glaciers and arrived in Skagway Thursday morning in a downpour ('Prince Rupert take note'). I spent the day visiting the USO, American Red Cross and Special Services getting soaked by the increasing intensity of the rain. I learned that this was the start of the terrific flood they had up there recently.

"The White Pass and Yukon Railway (known locally as 'Wait Patiently and You'll Ride') left Friday morning. We ascended the Pass along the most thrilling and awe-inspiring chasm, the bottom of which was hundreds

of feet below, with nothing visible between the coach window and it. Ma' Warren, an old timer of the Klondike era, sat behind me and showed us where the famous Trail of '98 came over the mountains and followed the Pass for miles along the route we were travelling.

"We reached the top of the Pass at the head of Bennett Lake about noon and stopped for a look at the old foot bridge where it was estimated 40,000 prospectors in the gold rush days had crossed. We saw the old graveyard, the shipyards where they built their barges, and the long church, faced with smaller logs in mosaic design. The snow-laden mountains and lakes through this particular part of the Yukon Territory are something to behold and long remember.

"At Carcross (an abbreviation for Caribou Crossing) we saw the salvaging of the plane in which a number of people had lost their lives only the week before. As the sun set early and we were travelling in day coaches (and brothers literally) we sat in the dark until we reached Whitehorse late in the evening. I visited a Hallowe'en carnival and dance at the American Red Cross in their brand new two story log cabin. These Americans know how to look after their boys' away from home, the further, the better seemingly. That night and the next day were spent with our YMCA supervisor, Alex Hall who used to be in the Prince Rupert area. Sunday morning I was called to catch an American army plane for Fairbanks. It was a grand trip over mountain tops with the rising sun flooding the whole panorama with varying hues of red and orange. It was a little on the cool side as we found it was 25 degrees below zero when we landed so it must have been much colder flying at 10,500 feet.

"While at Fairbanks I picked up an unusual souvenir a piece of prehistoric mastodon ivory. Whole tusks were found in the
