If has been said of Roberts that he was deficient in his delineation of human nature; yet no more poignant and simple poems exist in Canada than "Epitaph for a Sailor Buried Ashore," and "Epitaph" for a Husbandman." All through his work there is evidence, implicit if not explicit, that he




