YugoSlav Patriots are Further Extending Their Activities Against Nazi Oppressors.

LONDON, Oct. 30 (CP)—YugoSlav guerrillas crossed into Hungary today in widening battles against German and satellite groups, a communique broadcast by the YugoSlav liberation army announced. The patriots also announced extensive operations along the Dalmatian coast in which a German column was defeated. Twenty Allied planes assisted in the Dalmatian operation, bombing enemy columns near Ston, Metkovic, Split and other localities near Klin.

Hazelton Road Advocates Are Coming to City

A delegation consisting of Walter Wilson and Verne Taylor, both of Burns Lake, will arrive in the city this week-end from the interior in connection with a campaign which is being instituted on behalf of the Hazelton route northward for an Alaska Highway. Mr. Wilson recently prepared a brief in support of the Hazelton route which has received general endorsement along the line of the Canadian National Railways tributary to Prince Rupert including the senior and junior chambers of commerce of this city. Mr. Wilson and Mr. Taylor will appear before the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce at its regular monthly meeting on Monday evening next.

Blackout Relief Security Matter

LONDON, Oct. 30 (CP)—The question of lifting Britain's blackout regulations depends entirely on "military security," says Home Secretary Herbert Morrison. "All my bias is in favor of lifting restrictions," he said recently, "and when I can do so I will lift them, but military security is the paramount consideration."

Battle For Great City

MOSCOW, Oct. 30 (CP)—Russian tank forces drove to Krivoirog Friday, second day of the battle for strategic iron and rail center. German High Command communique, said the battle was still in progress and claimed that 115 Russian tanks had been destroyed. South of the Dnieper loop the Russians were plugging across the steppes of the southern Ukraine less than sixty miles from Perekop, the last escape door for Nazi Crimean garrisons. The Russians took another one hundred towns in the Dnieper Bend area of southern Russia yesterday and swept ahead fifteen miles in the Zaporoshev sector. The greatest tank battle in history is reported going on there. Nazi resistance is decreasing with the enemy abandoning their heavy guns and other arms in large numbers. The Russians are now 40 miles from Perikop, key to the Crimean Peninsula.

Victory Loan Coupons Are Due Monday

Interest coupons on Third and Fourth Victory Loan Bonds are payable Monday, November 1. The Third Loan bonds will mature on November 1, 1956, and the Fourth Loan bonds on May 1, 1957. Bonds of both issues carry interest at 3 percent. Officials of the National War Finance Committee suggest that holders keep their money fighting by cashing their coupons at their banks or investment dealers, and re-investing the money in Fifth Victory bonds or in War Savings Stamps or certificates.

VICTORIA, Oct. 30 (CP)—Premier John Hart was advised Saturday by Major General G. R. Pearkes, general officer commanding, Pacific Command, that the dimout on the Pacific Coast will end Sunday at midnight. Blackout regulations may be enforced at any time an emergency situation arises.

Los Angeles to Cairo Air Line

WASHINGTON, D.C., October 30—Application has been filed for the operation of a commercial air service from Los Angeles to Cairo by way of the Azores Islands. More than 1,600 Poles have married English and Scottish girls since the fall of France when the Polish army and air force came to Britain.

Nearly Six Million in Bond Sales

MONTREAL, Oct. 30 (CP)—Approaching the six million dollar mark for subscriptions to the Fifth Victory Loan employees of the Canadian National Railways and affiliated companies now have their feet set firmly on the path leading towards their plan of setting a new high record in bond purchases to aid Canada's war effort. An official compilation of figures furnished by the three operating regions and relayed by telegraph to Montreal has established that 59,567 men and women workers of the National system have purchased bonds to a total value of \$5,825,700. These figures cover the period for the first nine days of the current campaign, exactly half of the number of working days allotted to the sale of bonds for the Fifth Loan canvass.

French Guerilla Army is Active

STOCKHOLM, Oct. 30 (CP)—A well equipped French army of 80,000 men is now making guerilla forays against the Germans from the mountains of southeast France, the Goteborg Handels- och Sjoftartstidning said in an article written by a former Vichy correspondent.

Loss of Jap Vessels In Western Waters Is Gradually Increasing

Col. Knox Reveals Great Improvement in U-boat Position in Atlantic — Change in Shipbuilding Policy.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 30 (CP)—American submarines, cruising the Pacific, have sunk ten enemy vessels and damaged four others. Figures contained in a communique issued at Navy Secretary Frank Knox's press conference yesterday brought to 474 the number of Japanese ships sunk, probably sunk or damaged in the Pacific war to date. Owing to the improvement in the Atlantic situation, Col. Knox said that plans for the construction of 420 anti-submarine ships had been cancelled and, instead, amphibious landing craft would be built. New warship construction will be transferred from the Pacific to the Atlantic coast, the west coast yards to be used for repair and conversion purposes.

Assail Nazi Strong Line

Fifth and Eighth Armies Continue Their Advances in Italy

ALGIERS, Oct. 30 (CP)—Britons of the Fifth Army, storming across Regia Canal, have occupied the seaside town of Mondragone to ram squarely against lofty Mount Massico, the western anchor of the new German line in Italy, it was announced today. Farther inland the Americans developed a flanking threat against Massica, capturing Pietravairano which dominates both the upper Volturno valley and the main Capua-Rome highway. The British Eighth Army continues its advance, capturing Montemiro on the Trigno River fourteen miles inland from a bridgehead in the Sansalvo area where the heaviest fighting on the Italian front still rages. Some fifteen towns were captured by the Allies.

Moscow Talks "Great Success"

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 30 (CP)—President Roosevelt said yesterday that the Moscow conference has been a great success and he indicated that the conference is in its final stages where formal documents of agreement are being drafted.

Passed Away This Morning

Death came unexpectedly this morning to Arthur Nolan, fisherman and pioneer resident of the district, in his sixty-fifth year. Apparently in normal health, Mr. Nolan had arisen this morning and gone about his activities in his usual way and then, complaining that he was not feeling well, he had gone to his cabin which he shared with Ben Johnson on Smith Island and, while lying on his bed, passed away. Deceased, who came to the Prince Rupert district prior to 1907, was a fisherman for the greater part of his life and lately had operated a chicken ranch on Smith Island, across the Skeena from the Northern Pacific Cannery. He came to Canada from Finland, where, it is believed, he had a wife and family. He had no known relatives in Canada.

**Mirrors Necessary For Quick Photos**

**Novel Method Adopted to Get Pictures from Fighter Planes**

LONDON, Oct. 30 (C)—Fighter planes which swoop on enemy positions and come back with photographs in great detail do it with mirrors. That was one of several facts disclosed by Air Commodore J. L. Vachell in the magazine Aeroplane.

Normal photographs, he explained, are difficult to obtain because at a height of only 50 feet the speed of the plane causes the picture to be blurred with even the fastest shutter.

To overcome this difficulty a mirror is fitted to the lens at an angle of 45 degrees so that a picture of the target just attacked is taken backward under the tail.

Night photography has made the greatest development, Vachell wrote. A complete set of pictures is taken by our night bombers and the attacks can be checked in every detail.

"We know exactly where the bombs have been dropped and often the actual bomb burst can be seen," he added.

He revealed, too, that a mobile unit has been established to speed delivery of army reconnaissance photographs to the leading troops. Film magazines are dropped to it by parachute and the prints are turned out as quickly as at the home base.

**CORNFLAKE CRANBERRY PUFFS**

Other jams than cranberry are delicious also in these little cup desserts — marmalade too, when you feel inclined to use it for this purpose! Serve the puffs very hot, with sauce or cream.

1 1/2 cups pastry flour  
 2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder  
 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 4 tablespoons shortening  
 3 tablespoons sugar  
 1 egg  
 1/2 cup milk  
 1/2 teaspoon vanilla  
 1 cup corn flakes  
 Cranberry jam

Sift the flour once before measuring. Add baking powder and salt and sift again. Combine the shortening and sugar, heating well together. Beat and add the egg. Add dry ingredients alternately with the milk, making three additions of dry, two of liquid, and combining after each. Add vanilla and corn flakes. Use to two-thirds fill greased medium-sized muffin pans. Top each with a spoonful of jam. Bake in moderately hot oven, 375 degrees, about 20 minutes. Makes eight "puffs."
