## Dictators Are Now Facing Disaster

### YANKS ON OFFENSIVE

Allies Still Seem to Have Upper Hand in Southwest Pacific Fighting

WASHINGTON, D.C., Jan. 25 (AP)—American forces, on a general offensive in the Solomons, were reported today to have won seven important positions from the enemy on Guadalcanal, killing two hundred Japanese soldiers and almost wiping out an enemy island base 190 miles to the northwest by sea and air attack.

There were further heavy Allied air attacks on Rabaul, Le. Gasmata and other Japanese bases in the southwest Pacific during the week-end.

### WORKED IN HOSPITALS

Sick Visiting Committee of Red Cross Was Busy During Past Year

Reporting for the sick visiting committee of which she is chairman, Mrs. J. B. Gibson has advised the local branch of the Canadian Red Cross that seventeen ladies take their turn in visiting the local military hospital, distributing magazines weekly or oftener and in summer taking large bunches of garden flowers to beautify the wards. Seven ladies do likewise for the Royal Canadian Air Force Hospital and six Lutheran ladies endeavour to visit the United States Army hospital twice weekly. During 1942 approximately 2,580 visits were paid.

Fifteen members of the sick visiting committee are now engaged in sewing for the military hospital. Some 614 articles passed through the hands of these ladies last year including bags for Christmas Cheer and 159 tins painted by Mrs. Borland for use as vases and ash trays at the military and air force hospitals.

A request for Christmas gifts for the patients resulted in the making and filling of 223 bags, each containing eight articles and a Red Cross card. These were sent to all service hospitals in the city.

MRS. ROOSEVELT BOOSTS CANADIAN AID TO RUSSIA FUND

## Bulletins

### CANADIAN SINKS U-BOAT

Allied Headquarters in North Africa announced in a communique today that the Canadian corvette Ville de Quebec has destroyed a German submarine in the western Mediterranean.

### TORONTO TRAGEDY

The bodies of Donald Macaskill, 65, former vice-president and general manager of the International Nickel Co. of Canada Ltd., and his wife, Jane, 57, were found in the bedroom of their Toronto home. Police described the double fatality as murder and suicide. Macaskill retired in December. He had been in ill-health for some time.

### ROMMEL STILL FLEES

The victorious British Eighth Army, supported by air and naval fire, is now advancing beyond Tripoli which was captured yesterday and over which the Union Jack now flies. The British are hot in pursuit of General Erwin Rommel's Afrika Korps with the rearguard of which contact has been made today within Tunisia. It is considered Rommel will attempt to make a stand in Tunisia, using fortifications which had been originally built by the French. In an air battle in Tunisia the Axis lost 21 planes and the Allies, seven.

### REDS DRIVING FORWARD

The Red Army offensive has made further gains on six fronts in the Russo-German war, important new positions having been captured from the Nazis. The position of encircled Axis forces in the Stalingrad area is getting worse.

### RAID LORIENT, RUHR

Royal Air Force bombers over the week-end heavily raided the German submarine base of Lorient on the occupied French coast. The British night raid followed daylight attacks by United States flying fortresses. Huge fires were started. The Royal Air Force also raided the industrial Ruhr Saturday and Sunday night. Three of the British planes failed to return.

### U. S. MINISTER DIES

Jay Pierrepont Moffatt, United States minister to Canada, died suddenly in Ottawa at the age of forty-six. Last summer Mr. Moffatt paid a visit to Prince Rupert in the course of a trip to Alaska.

### BIG AXIS LOSSES

LONDON—One million tons of Axis shipping has been sunk in the Mediterranean by British submarines, Admiral Sir Henry Harwood says, describing it as an 'amazing feat.'

## City Takes Steps To Improve Water Supply In Crisis

Steps taken by the city during the recent cold snap to keep up the city's water supply, pressure of which reached a critical stage, included the opening up of a steam power plant in the city in order to close down Shawatians Lake plant and thus throw all Woodworth Lake water in the city's lines. The city engineer is also checking up on all water wastage.

Now that milder weather has arrived, it is expected there will be an early improvement in the water situation.

## WAS BOY PIONEER

"Billy" Murray, Who Went to School Here in Very Early Days, Victim of Hunting Accident

George William Murray, son of John Murray, veteran pioneer of Prince Rupert, who now makes his home at New Westminster, was killed recently in a hunting accident in the Clearwater district of the Kamloops country, according to word reaching local friends in the city. Deceased had attended school for a year or so in the very early days around 1909 and 1910 and then went to live with his uncle at Louis Creek for several years. More recently he had resided with his father at New Westminster. He was forty-eight years of age.

"Bill" Murray met his fate when his rifle discharged as he was dragging a deer which he had shot over a deadfall. The assumption is that he must have put the gun over a log first, but end down and it discharged, the bullet entering the left side of his face. The body of the man and the deer were on one side of the windfall and the rifle on the other.

The body was taken to Kamloops where interment was made.

### CANADIAN STEEL STRIKE

OTTAWA—Steel workers at Sydney and Sault Ste. Marie are voting today on a new proposal for strike settlement. Trenton, Nova Scotia, workers turned down the plan yesterday. Prime Minister Mackenzie King today made public correspondence between himself and C. H. Miller, national director of the United Steel Workers of America.

Russian Army Moving Relentlessly Forward as Berlin Prepares Reich for Shocking News—Axis Forces in Tunisia Being Trapped

LONDON, Jan. 25 (CP)—Adolf Hitler, who has lost his return bout with Russian winter, and Benito Mussolini, who has lost his African Empire, have the prospect of further unmeasured reverses today as the Red Army rolls relentlessly westward on a 500-mile front and merging Allied armies squeeze Axis troops into a vise in Tunisia.

The Russians, reported to be closing in steadily upon the key German bases of Rostov and Khar'kov, announced that the whole of the eastern and central Caucasus have been cleared of the invaders and that they have captured three more towns in thrusts threatening to flank the Maikop oil fields and cut the Germans' road of retreat. The German High Command announces that the German army has abandoned Votonezh on the upper Don. The Russians had never conceded that the Germans occupied this city.

In North Africa the British Eighth Army sweeps on beyond captured Tripoli, its vanguards perhaps already across the Tunisian border as Anglo-American forces hurled a weight of tanks, guns and planes into the fight from the west to bolster up the hard-pressed French middle front.

Berlin dispatches to Stockholm indicate that the Nazi press is preparing the German people for news of a great defeat on the Russian front. Editorials sought to stiffen morale with reminders that "weakness on the home front forced Germany to capitulate in 1918" with the grim comment that "a lost war is a lost future."

Meanwhile Fighting French forces under Brigadier General LeClerc are reported operating west of Tripoli with only fifty miles to go to reach the Mediterranean, this according to an announcement today.

French police have arrested several civilians in Marseilles and have ordered exavuation of the entire civilian population.

Arrangements for the funeral are in the hands of the B.C. Undertakers and will be announced later.

Author Dies

NEW YORK—Alexander Woolcott, 56, well known author, actor and commentator, died on Saturday from a heart attack.

## EDITORIAL

### Generous for Russia . . .

Prince Rupert people, always generous in good causes, have reached the initial objective again in one of these. This time it is the Canadian aid to Russia Fund. The quota of \$3,500 was surpassed at the end of the week and still the subscriptions are coming in fast. The confident hope of the local committee now is that \$5,000 will be reached.

Because the objective is reached does not mean that every dollar that can be possibly raised will not be put to good use in relieving the sufferings of our brave allies.

Those who have not yet made subscriptions should not hesitate now because the first local quota has been attained.

It might be well to again remind intending subscribers that there is no regular canvassing campaign and the sure way to get the money in is to take or send it to one of the authorized collecting agencies which include the banks and the newspapers.

### This Year's Offensive . . .

A co-ordinated triangular offensive, that will stagger the imagination, in the east from Russia, in the south from Africa, in the west against Norway and the French coast, will be launched next spring against Germany, according to Max Werner, outstanding military analyst, writing in the forthcoming issue of the new magazine, "Predictions of Things to Come."

"By the spring," writes Mr. Werner, "the Allies will be able to count on considerable arms superiority, brought about chiefly by the upswing in American arms production. The German Wehrmacht is no longer able to replace its arms losses. The German army has had much fewer offensive weapons, tanks and planes on the Russian front in 1942 than it had in 1941. The German troops are perpetually exhausted, by over-exertion and losses as well as by psychological depression. The new American weapons and the fresh American forces will thus have all the more weight. They will confront an enemy whose war machine is worn out, and whose soldiers are weary and have lost the belief in victory."

Three new factors will have determined to a large extent the military situation next spring, declares Mr. Werner: the strategic positions held by the Anglo-American forces in North Africa, the Italian crisis and the present winter campaign in Russia.

### Mr. Pattullo at Seventy . . .

The Vancouver Province, which has not always been so considerate of him, speaks kindly on the occasion of T. D. Pattullo reaching his seventieth birthday. It says:

"T. D. Pattullo, for many years premier of this province, and now, he says himself, the only real Liberal in the Legislature, has been celebrating his seventieth birthday.

"It is not easy to believe that Duff Pattullo is 70. It seems only yesterday that he came out of the North, natty and confident and full of ideas to help Honest John Oliver run his government.

"He was a young man then. He is a young man still, in spite of the bludgeonings of the years, which have made his hair white but do not appear to have affected him much in other ways.

"Mr. Pattullo has had an active and interesting and successful life, and though that fickle jade, Politics, has turned her back upon him, he still has a host of friends in British Columbia. These will all hope that he will have 70 more birthdays as happy as the 70 he has already counted."

### Town Response Slow . . .

The newly formed Prince Rupert Machine Gun Regiment, local reserve unit, is divided into three companies—one to large extent consisting of dry dock workers, another men on local war contracting work and the third including men of the town generally.

Oddly enough, the town company is so far the smallest in numerical strength, although its nucleus is already making a fine showing.

Since the reserve is primarily formed for the defence of Prince Rupert itself, it would have been expected that the men of the town would have been the strongest in joining up.

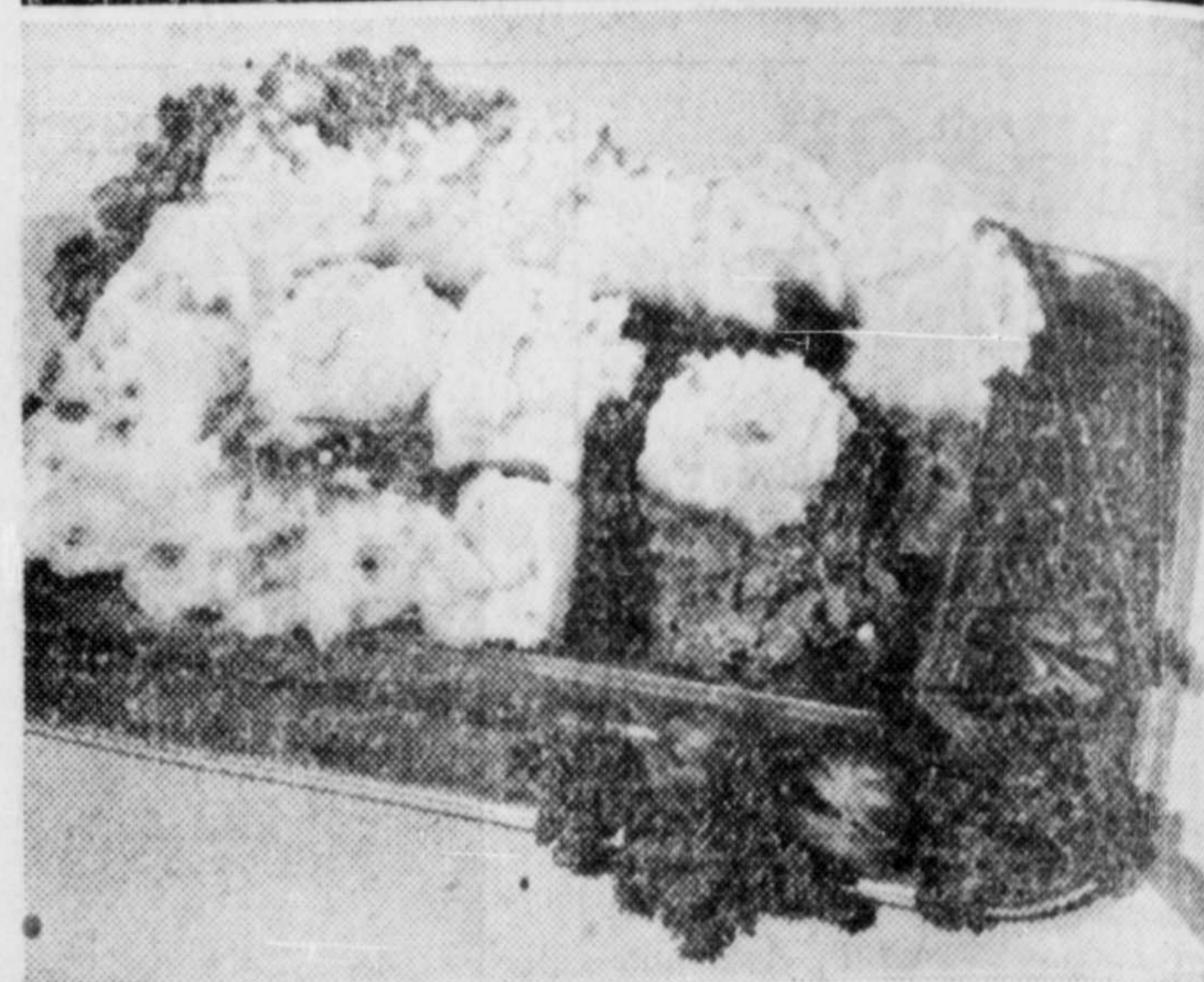

## Savoury Shepherd's Pie

**CHAPLAIN IS HEARD**

Head Padre of Eighth Division Preaches in First Presbyterian Church

The preacher in First Presbyterian Church Sunday evening was Major C. K. Nicoll, chaplain of the Eighth Division of the Canadian Army, who, before the war was pastor of Oakville Presbyterian Church near Toronto and a former moderator of the Toronto Presbytery. Major Nicoll went overseas in the fall of 1939 soon after the outbreak of war and only last October returned to Canada from Britain. He was in the Old Country during the

great blitz and the stirring early days of the war. His duties as chief chaplain of the Eighth Division include this area and he spent the week-end here, arriving on Friday night's train and leaving this evening on his return to the interior.

Major Nicoll, in his sermon last night, found his text in the Twenty-Fourth Psalm and his subject was "The Demands of True Worship." It was a brief but forceful sermon and was much appreciated by a good-sized congregation, which included a considerable number of service men. Man was essentially a religious being, Major Nicoll asserted. Who should enter the Kingdom of God, he asked. In replying to this question, he developed the answer of the Twenty-Fourth Psalm — he with clean hands, not from honest toil but free from sin; he that had a pure heart, purity of thought and action, the individual in whom there was absence of pride, and he in whom there was absence of deceit.

"Too often we try to deceive ourselves, our neighbor and even God," asserted the visiting pastor. Unless Britain and the British Empire play the game of life," Major Nicoll asserted at another point, "we shall go down like Rome and Greece."

The choir sang an acceptable anthem and there was a solo by J. A. Teng.

Following the service there was the usual Sunday evening social hour which a goodly number stayed to enjoy.

Women's civilian defence garments — Sweaters, 167; pullovers, 6; coat and skirt outfits, 26; coats, 74; socks, 28 pair; dresses, 181; combinations, 97; nightgowns, 139; shirts, 5; slips, 99; pajamas, 250; singlets, 9; slacks, 50.

Infants' garments — Shirts 57; jacket sets, 22; soakers, 31; nightgowns, 99; rompers, 61; sleepers, 73; panties, 10; quilts, 60; diapers, 803.
