Secretary of War Frank Knox Makes Statement-Tokyo Prepares Japs

WASHINGTON, May 22 ()-The United States Navy reported yesterday that operations on Attu Island were continuing with latest reports indicating the Japanese are making a last stand in defensive high ground on the island's northeastern extremity. Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox said last night that operations on Attu Island can now be considered as successful." It is stated by Navy Department officials that it is only a matter of time before the Japs on the island are overwhelmed.

American forces on Attu Island have slashed the remaining Japanese troops there into three groups, the Navy Department reported today, and the final phase of the campaign to restore the island to American control is now under way. Commander Alex Mitchell, the commanding officer, the Corps has carried on and is carrying on in spite of strenuous and sometimes trying conditions. They are to be congratulated upon the success of the undertaking. The appreciation of the boys, their parents and the public at large and the knowledge of a good job well done is about their only reward. It may not be very tangible but they can at least be satisfied that this feeling exists in good measure.

We are glad to receive the favor of our American friends in the repair of our streets. It is difficult, however, to repress the thought that it was something that our own Canadian authorities might have carried out had they had the will and dispatch to have done it.

### A Great Leader . . .

To have a leader who is not only dynamic, but articulate as well, is one of the great good fortunes of the British people in this war. A man at the helm who is a doer is a prime necessity at such a time but one who is also a showman is a favor of Providence. Drabness, that traditional element in peacetime politics, loses its sober virtue then and colorful leadership becomes a thing beyond price.

Mr. Churchill is nothing if not being articulate which, by the way, is a thing beyond mere eloquence for it integrates as well as portrays. He has praised some men in words that achieved the eminence of classicism the moment they were uttered and damned the deceit of one in particular in words so trenchant that in one analogy he defiled all jackals forever. Nor can it be said that out of deference for his position the choicest morsels of revelation have been saved for his utterance. He sometimes says what other men have been saying for months and somehow achieves the effect of being the first one to

say it.

His latest action in this regard is a psychological triumph. At a time when the Allies have just pushed the Axis out of Africa, at a time when the next move is seemingly the invasion of Europe, a thing which the Germans in their propaganda seem to be begging the Allies to try, at this time Mr. Churchill flies to Washington and, turning his back on the desperate arrogance of the masters of Europe, he reiterates a pledge given officially before that Britain will partake fully in the war against Japan, thus in effect re-bestowing on the Japanese a doubtful honor which most of us thought belonged unconditionally in Berlin, that of being the world's worst menace. This must be insufferable to the Nazi pride. To be masters of a continent yet at the same time at the disposal of a single opponent must be a great morale reducer than many tons of bombs.



# Freedom's Fires Must Be Fed Our COAL!

SERVICE

YANADIANS must dig and deliver coal that we may sail convoys, power vital war plants, keep our railroads rolling, preserve the nation's health!

The coal mining industry—miners and management alike have done wonders to provide coal, but they need help. More workers must be provided, or we falter-possibly fail—in this grim hour. Nature has been generous but we must help ourselves. Our mines are rich, but undermanned.

By Proclamation, His Excellency the Governor General in Council has declared that labour supply for coal mines ranks as a national emergency. Further, in order to provide manpower for coal, the Governor in Council has issued an Order in Council aimed at swelling the flow of coal from mine to firepot.

This Order is of vital interest to everyone in Canada. Every Canadian should read and study its provisions, to see whether it demands any action on his part:

- EVERY EMPLOYER, REGARDLESS OF HIS INDUS-TRY, must advise his employees of these Regulations, and he must assist in discovering whether any of his employees have had previous experience as coal mine workers.
- EVERY EMPLOYEE, REGARDLESS OF HIS INDUS-Z TRY, who has had previous experience as a coal mine worker, must report that fact to his employer not later than Tuesday, May 25th, 1943.
- A "COAL MINE WORKER" FOR THESE PURPOSES is anyone who, since January 1st, 1935, has worked under provincial certificate or license in or around a coal mine, or who, since the same date, has been employed for a total of at least 24 months in the production of coal (except at office work).
- EVERY EMPLOYER, NOT A COAL MINE OPER-4 ATOR, must report in writing to a Selective Service Officer not later than Tuesday, June 1st, 1943; full details on any of his employees who are ex-coal mine workers.
- SELECTIVE SERVICE OFFICERS ARE AUTHOR-IZED to require ex-coal mine workers to report for interview and to accept work at a coal mine.
- SELECTIVE SERVICE OFFICERS MAY REQUIRE any man in any employment, if subject to Mobilization Regulations but rejected for Military Training, and certain others excused from Military Training, to accept employment at a coal mine.
- NO COAL MINE OPERATOR may terminate the services of any coal mine worker without written permission from a Selective Service Officer.

- B NO COAL MINE WORKER may leave employment at a coal mine without written permission from a Selective Service Officer.
- EVERY EX-COAL MINE WORKER, returning to the industry under these Regulations, will be paid wages at the established rate for the job at which he is placed; and the Government will pay wages of 40 cents an hour, 8 hours a day and 48 hours a week, to any ex-coal mine worker required to leave his present employment under these provisions, but not placed immediately at coal mining.
- A BOARD ALLOWANCE of not more than \$7.50 a week may be paid an ex-coal mine worker now returning to a coal mine, if required to live away from the residence of his dependents.
- PRESENT AND FUTURE COAL MINE WORKERS will be granted postponement from Military Training to February 1st, 1944, by virtue of their occupation; and no coal mine worker will be accepted for voluntary enlistment in the Armed Forces of Canada, prior to February 1st, 1944, except under permit to enlist from a Selective Service Officer.
- NO EMPLOYER IN CANADA, EXCEPT A COAL MINE OPERATOR, may solicit for employment or hire any ex-coal mine worker.
- REGARDLESS OF ANY DOMINION OR PROVIN-CIAL LAW, male persons at least 16 years old may be employed as coal mine workers, and female persons at least 18 years old may be employed as surface coal mine workers.
- WAR EMERGENCY TRAINING CLASSES will be available for training men as coal mine workers.

Such is the substance of the new regulations. Full details may be had at any Employment and Selective Service Office. If these provisions require action on your part, you are urged in the national interest to act immediately. Severe penalties are provided for non-compliance, but the Government relies on the co-operation of the citizens of Canada to make prosecution unnecessary by prompt action as required. This is a grave emergency. Assist if you can.

Eire's citizens feel that the coal and gasoline shortages are unduly feet between 1851 and 1940. severe. Food and clothing rations seem to the Irish a greater hardship today, when there is less danger of their being dragged into the war, than they would have been had rationing been introduced at the height of Germany's forward march.

Dublin stores today have far less to offer, it is true, than a year ago, but rationing is more limited than in Britain. Moreover, the fnest English woolens and other materials not available in Britain because produced only for the export market, can be obtained in Dublin. Scotch whisky, sherry, port, lemons and oranges—all of which are becoming dim memories to the British, are to be found in Erie.

But to the average Dubliner, or cottager in provincial Eire, life seems very hard because living costs have risen. The small tea ration, and the lack of kerosene for lamps in millions of unelectricfied homes, cause the greatest hardship.




