Settlement Of Strike Looms

Government Proposal Is Being Put Before Western Coal Miners

No Official Statements Made Yet — Union Leader Suggests an Early Ironing Out of Difficulties.

OTTAWA, Nov. 5 (CP)—The Union delegation which has been in Ottawa to negotiate a settlement in the strike of 8,500 Alberta and British Columbia coal miners expects to leave tonight for the west to place a government proposal before the miners, union officials said today.

DESTROYER DAMAGED

Canadian Vessel Seriously Hit In Spanish Waters But Not Believed Sunk.

OTTAWA, Nov. 5 (CP)—The Navy disclosed today that a Canadian destroyer had been damaged in a recent attack by 20 German bombers off the Spanish coast.

Closing On Rome

Entire German Line in Central Italy Crumbling Following Capture of Isernia.

ALGIERS, Nov. 5 (CP)—British and Canadian troops yesterday captured Isernia, key mountain junction on the central Italian front, 90 miles from Rome.

LONDON, Nov. 5 (CP)—The Russians, slashing at the retreating Nazis were believed to be nearing the eastern outskirts of Kherson, Black Sea port at the mouth of the Dnieper River, yesterday a Moscow communique said that the Red Army had captured Bolshoi-Kapany, 21 miles east of Kherson.

ALIED headquarters announced today that Allied troops have smashed to the vicinity of the Garigliano River on the western end of the Italian battle line. Farther inland Allied forces, advancing on Venafro in the upper reaches of the Volturno River have crossed the Volturno on the Adriatic end of the line. British destroyers bombarded enemy positions in support of the offensive of the British Eighth Army in the San Salvo area.

Heroic Surgeon Awarded D.S.C.

LONDON, Nov. 5 (CP)—Award of the D.S.C. to Surgeon Lieut. Maurice John Hood, of the Royal Navy has disclosed the story of his heroism in leaping from the ice-covered decks of a destroyer to a convoy escort ship to attend 81 wounded men last winter.

He made the jump safely when the two ships were so close together as it was possible to bring them in the wild seas running at the time. A slip in taking off or landing meant instant death.

For 30 hours without a break after getting aboard the escort ship, Hood operated on the wounded men who had been picked up from the destroyer Achates. Using a seaman's mess-deck table as an operating table and supported by two ratings against the ship's rolling and pitching, Hood saved every one of the 81 wounded.

It was assumed that one of the government's requirements was that the men return to work before any definite wage concession is granted.

A special federal cabinet meeting was scheduled for this afternoon. Union officials were expected to confer with Minister of Labor Humphrey Mitchell before the cabinet meeting.

Following a session with the cabinet yesterday, a union official expressed satisfaction remarking that the strike "may be ironed out."

LOAN STILL GROWS HERE

Warning To Coast

Prime Minister Mackenzie King Suggests Possibility of Enemy Attack Here.

OTTAWA, Nov. 5 (CP)—Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King gave warning yesterday that there should be no relaxation of Air Raid Precaution organizations in British Columbia and they should be maintained intact and in state of constant readiness.

The Prime Minister's statement said that vigilance should be maintained because there is either definite risk of attack or possibility of attack.

Three Alarms In September

Three fire alarms turned in during October brought the number of calls answered by the fire department up to the end of the month to 102.

Two of October's calls were false alarms and the other was a fire in a cafe which was controlled with very little damage.

In September there were 17 fire alarms.

FORESTS RUINED OSLO, (CP)—Norwegian forests are being ravaged by the Nazi army of occupation to such an extent that the damage to Norway's chief industry may not be repaired for generations.

Turkey To Goto War

Is Trying to Save Throne

SOMEWHERE IN SOUTH-EASTERN ITALY, Nov. 5, (CP)—King Vittorio Emmanuel III today sought some means of saving his throne for himself in the face of demands by parties of the United Anti-Fascist Front that he abdicate before they join the government of Premier Marshal Pietro Badoglio.

YUGOSLAV PATRIOTS PROGRESS

LONDON, Nov. 5 (CP)—Yugoslav partisans have captured a stronghold from the Germans in Montenegro, the liberation army communique announced today. Partisan units also smashed Germans in battle near Kolasin. Yesterday in Yugoslavia it was announced that partisans under Tito had captured Priboj, railroad town in south central Yugoslavia, after inflicting heavy losses on German and Mihailovich forces.

PICTURES FOR NORWICH LONDON, (CP)—Russell Colman, Lord Lieutenant of Norfolk, has decided to bequeath to Norwich his collection of pictures by artists of the "Norwich School" worth a fortune and funds to erect and equip the buildings in which to house them.

Turkey To Goto War

Suggestion That Declaration Upon Germany May Follow Cairo Conference.

LONDON, Nov. 5 (CP)—A declaration of war by Turkey against Germany may result from the visit to Cairo of Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden of Great Britain and Secretary of State Cordell Hull.

Eden and Hull left Moscow after completing the tri-partite discussions, a Soviet radio broadcast announced yesterday, and there was a suggestion that they would stop off at Cairo to confer with the Turkish foreign minister, Numan Menemencioğlu, who had arrived there Wednesday night.

IS NEARING OBJECTIVE

Victory Loan Total to Date is \$1,127,000,000 With Two Days To Go.

OTTAWA, Nov. 5 (CP)—Thursday's Fifth Victory Loan subscriptions totalled \$76,000,000, bringing the cumulative aggregate to \$1,127,000,000 with two days to go, headquarters announced today.

On Wednesday sales of Victory Loan bonds climbed above average to slightly more than \$72,000,000, boosting the cumulative total to past the billion dollar mark, headquarters announced yesterday.

LOG SCALE MOUNTING

Timber Output for Year Was Considerable, in Excess Of Year Ago.

Log scaling in Prince Rupert forestry district during the month of October this year totalled 31,959,973 board feet as compared with 22,897,127 board feet in the same month last year, there being a notable increase in the record of spruce from 11,134,308 board feet in October last year to 18,560,252 board feet this year. So far this year the log scale for the district stands at 178,841,192 board feet compared with 196,511,754 board feet in the first ten months of 1942.

Forest Products

The output of poles and piling in the interior this October was light at 288,568 lineal feet—250,907 feet cedar, 11,831 hemlock and 5,836 miscellaneous—as compared with 636,778 lineal feet in the same month last year. The scale for the year to date is 1,361,512 lineal feet as against 636,778 lineal feet in the first ten months of 1942.

The tie count this October 28,218,192 pieces, all jackpine, as against 1,193 pieces last year in October.

This October 374 cords of wood were counted compared with 1,335 cords in October, 1942.

New Operations Superintendent of T. C. Air Lines

WINNIPEG, Nov. 5.—Walter W. Fowler, operations superintendent of TransCanada Air Lines, Moncton, has been appointed assistant operations manager at Winnipeg and Frank I. Young, at present chief pilot at Toronto, will succeed him at Moncton. The appointments will be effective on January 1, 1944, according to announcement today by R. F. George, operations manager.

Both men have been with TransCanada since its earliest days. Mr. Fowler was one of the first group of pilots, joining T.C.A. in November, 1937. Born at Sackville, N.B., in 1906, he began flying in 1928 and went to TransCanada from Canadian Airways. He became operations superintendent at Moncton in March, 1942. Mr. Young was born in Toronto in 1909. He began to fly in 1927 and served, as pilot and instructor, with Dominion Skyways, National Air Transport, the Brantford Aero Club and Century Airways. Joining T.C.A. in January, 1938, as pilot, he was promoted to chief pilot at Toronto a year ago.

Vandals Blitz Third Avenue Windows

Four Acts Downtown

During the early hours of this morning somebody with a juvenile urge to throw rocks through windows let himself go in a big way and, as a result, four Third Avenue business places are ventilated by holes in their plate glass show windows. They are the L. D. Cafe, the Union Steamship Office, Wallace's Limited and Bulger's Limited.

The destruction apparently began at the L. D. Cafe, where a rock, which smashed a front window, was let loose about 1:30. The next victim was Bulger's jewelry store, which was reportedly assaulted at 2:30. Two hours later a rock was reported hurled through the window of the Union Steamship office, and an hour later police received word of the smashing of a window in Wallace's.

That the vandals meant business was apparent from the size of the missiles they hurled. The chunks of rock, three of which now repose as exhibits at the city police station, weigh between two and three pounds each.

Police report that no attempt was made to steal anything from the damaged show fronts, and that as yet they have made no arrests in connection with the destruction.

WAR TRANSPORT IS DESCRIBED

Col. Thomas J. Weed Interesting Speaker at Weekly Luncheon Of Rotary Club.

The developments of ports of embarkation was the interesting subject of Col. Thomas J. Weed, port commander of the United States Army at Prince Rupert, in speaking before the Prince Rupert Club at luncheon yesterday. The speaker traced the stages of transport of troops and war supplies from point of origin to destinations abroad, explaining the vast organization involved thereby. He paid tribute to the merchant marine, mentioning some of the arduousities with which it had to contend. At present there was an all-out war effort in which service men and civilians alike must participate to the fullest extent of their power. Properly equipped and controlled, the personnel of transport, both service and civilian, could be relied to face all difficulties and dangers willingly.

Col. Weed told of the building up of a port of embarkation including such projects as docks and warehouses and the general services. He told how, at the commencement of the Spanish-American war, United States had no transport vessels. It was not overly supplied in the Great War but since then there had been great development.

President A. S. Nickerson was in the chair at the Rotary Club luncheon and guests of the day, besides Col. Weed, were Major Heise, U.S.A., A. D. Cameron, J. H. MacLeod, Dennis Taylor and S. C. Morrison.

WEAR A POPPY

Editor Daily News:
Tomorrow will be Poppy Day! Tomorrow we offer once again the mystic symbol of Remembrance—the Flanders Poppy—fashioned by the skillful fingers of wounded Servicemen of the last—and of this—Great War—a replica of the little red poppy which flourished amid the dead and dying in France and Flanders, which bravely flung its glowing red mantle over the scars and wounds of war—over the shell-holes and the beaten zone of No-man's land, as if to assure the beholder of life eternal even in the very jaws of death.

The Canadian Legion is calling to the people of the Dominion to observe more than ever Remembrance Day and asks that every man, woman and child wear a Poppy in memory both of those who laid down their lives in the first Great War and those who have made the supreme sacrifice in this present conflict.

This appeal is not made on behalf of the Legion itself or its members but on behalf of all ex-servicemen who are in need. The collection and administration of the Poppy Fund has been entrusted to the Canadian Legion. This, however, does not mean that the Poppy Fund is part of the funds of the Legion. It is kept entirely separate and it is considered a Trust Fund which the Legion administers for the benefit of all ex-servicemen. Any man who has served and who is in need has a claim on this fund. The poppies and wreaths which citizens are asked to buy are made by disabled ex-servicemen incapable of earning a living in any other way and who, but for this industry, would be a charge on public funds. If Poppy Day did nothing but keep these men self-supporting and self-respecting citizens, it would still be worth-while. So, please buy a Poppy on Poppy Day.

November 11 this year is the twenty-fifth anniversary of the 1918 Armistice and although we are again at war, we do not dare to say that the sacrifices of the men in that other War were in vain. In memory of them and our heroes of this War wear a Poppy on Remembrance Day.

SEAL COVE BASKETBALL

Basketball—both good and bad—was presented at Seal Cove last night, in the first scheduled games of the season when Fortress humiliated Ack-Ack 49 to 9 in the opener and Port Edward Americans beat Air Force Flyers 55 to 42 in the nightcap.

The Yanks and Flyers staged a quick-playing, fast-passing contest that didn't decrease its high-gear tempo for a minute. There was little to choose between either: five with the possible exception in the gunnery department of which Moline and Ketchmark of the Yanks were the chief exponents. Moline, a most deceptive forward, weaved and faked his way through for twenty-one points. Ketchmark, another accurate peger, was good for 17.

Vato and Zack, "sixty minute" men of Flyers' rear-guard, and Gerasimoff, sawed-off forward, toiled hard all night. Zack and Gerasimoff were their team's biggest scorers, getting an even dozen apiece. Smithers, lanky centre, was close behind with 9.

The turning point of the set-to came in the second quarter. The count was 16 to 13 for the Yanks at the five minute mark when Moline, with the aid of a couple of his teammates, raced around for four baskets and a single to bring their total to 28. All the Flyers could get in that quarter were six points to make it 17 all told. The Airmen just about held their own in the third, 15 to 13. In the final stanza each quintet made twelve points, the Flyers not being able to overcome that sudden flurry of Tank tasks in the second quarter that caused their defeat.

In the opener, Fortress was the complete master of the situation and Ack-Ack never had a show at any time. Taylor and Chapman walked through for 15 and 10 points, respectively, and MacMurchie, a nice play-maker, was good for 6.

The refereeing of Sanfilippo of the Americans, and Matsui of the Canadian Army, was of a high calibre. The league could use more men like these. It's not often that teams—both winning and losing—have words of praise for the refereeing as they did last night.

The Axis Totters . . .

With Mussolini out and Hitler tottering, we at long last venture to speculate that the war has reached a phase where final and decisive victory may soon crown our arms. Possibly the Moscow conference has been the real turning point.

Certainly there are authentic and definite signs of weakness within the Reich in addition to the disaffection which is spreading throughout satellite and subjugated territory.

Meantime, of course, the Russians are continuing their stunning military offensive, which, no doubt, is helping to weaken the fast weakening morale of the German people. The air assault based on the British Isles against western Europe and the Allied campaign northward through Italy are also causing grievous embarrassment for the enemy.

Victory over Germany is definitely in sight it appears. Soon we will be getting in real earnest at the serious business of concentrating upon Japan which may even at this time have ideas of sliding out gracefully as the Allies elate over the defeat of victory—something which we must guard against since Japan is guilty of much and must be irrevocably eliminated at this time as possibly the most dangerous menace of the Axis triumvirate. When the full force of Allied might comes to be applied to Japan the issue there should not take long to decide.
