



On and after October 1st, 1943 the City Police Department has been instructed to enforce the provisions of the Curfew By-law. This By-law provides that no child under the age of fourteen years shall be on the streets of the City after the hour of 8:30 p.m. from October 1st to March 31st inclusive, and after the hour of 10 p.m. from April 1st to September 30th inclusive, unaccompanied by their parents or other proper guardians unless for some unavoidable cause. Arrangements have been made for the Fire Bell to be tolled at the curfew hour.
