Remembrance Day . . .

It will be twenty-five years ago tomorrow since that glad day on November 11, 1918, when armistice ended the First Great War. Therefore, we observe tomorrow as Remembrance Day. We honor the memory of our brave young men of a quarter of a century ago who gave their lives in the "war to end war." Their comrades, now old or middle-aged, many gray and grizzled, parade and otherwise pay their annual homage. The rest of us join in tribute.

Today we have another crop of war dead to honor—young men of this generation who likewise heard the call and have made the supreme sacrifice. More poignant, therefore, becomes the day. Time may have softened the bereavements of 1914-1918 but the anguish of those of 1939 to date are still unassuaged.

As we observe the anniversary of the termination of one great war we face a year which Prime Minister Churchill said may be climactic but will probably be the most severe and costly in lives of any so far in this conflict. But, withal, there is some reason, it would appear, to hope that, ere another November 11 comes around, there will have been another armistice and we will have started upon the great task of building a real lasting and perfect peace—not a mockery like the last turned out to be.

Getting and spending, we lay waste our powers. Little we see in Nature that is ours."
