

SHIP LOSSES ARE LIGHTER

Three Hundred Nazi Submarines Sunk in Six Months.

LONDON, Dec. 10 (P) - Allie merchant ship losses in Novem ber were the lowest of any month since May, 1940, a joint statement by Prime Minister Winston Churchill of Great Britain and President Franklin D. Roosevelt of the United States announced Thursday.

The number of U-boats destroyed exceeded the number of ships lost as was the case in. the three preceding months. Probably three hundred Nazi submarines were sunk from March to November.






