Ship Casualties in Pacific Storm

Axis Su- Heavy Air Losses Tunisian War; Biggest Bag In One Day

Naples Raided Again With One Hundred Plane Assault Leaving Many Fires—Palermo in Sicily Also Hit

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, April 6 (CP)—Thirty-one enemy planes, eighteen of them big transports believed to have been bearing gasoline and supplies to the Axis Tunisian army, were sent crashing into the sea by fighters yesterday during one of the greatest air battles in this theatre. In the course of the battle, which began with an Allied attack on a sea convoy, an enemy destroyer was blown up and several other ships were hit and set ablaze, a communique announced.

IN SOUTH PACIFIC

Ten Separate Raids Made on Enemy Bases Yesterday

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN SOUTH PACIFIC, April 6 (CP)—Ten separate air raids were made yesterday on enemy bases in the southwest Pacific. The most important was on the Solomon Islands although there were also attacks on objectives in New Guinea and New Britain.

HALIBUT IS DISCUSSED

Chamber of Commerce Sees Possibility of Chaotic Marketing Conditions

The halibut situation in the light of price ceiling proposals which have been made in for some discussion at last night's meeting of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce but, there being no information as to a final decision having been made by the authorities, no action was taken. The fear was expressed, however, that, under certain circumstances, a condition of chaos might very easily arise.

Speaking on the subject at the request of the chair, Col. J. W. Nicholls observed that a price ceiling equal in Prince Rupert, Vancouver and Seattle would probably result in a glut of fish here. The distributors took the view that it was a producers' problem. He had seen a telegram in which it was said that Vancouver and Prince Rupert fishing vessel owners had agreed upon a principle that one cent less be paid at Prince Rupert than at Vancouver and that there be a subsidy of two cents a pound. It was also proposed that minimum as well as maximum prices be set. The companies would take fish in proportion to what they had bought in the last five years. Col. Nicholls did not believe the government would grant a bonus. He (Col. Nicholls) feared there might be chaos unless something was done such as the government stepping in and taking over control of production and distribution. His company would be satisfied if the government did this. Col. Nicholls believed that this was a time when there should be co-operation and a sinking of opinions and interests in the common good.

While land activities consisted of intense patrol operations with no major engagements developing, the air war continued at a fiery pace and resulted in the shooting down of forty-eight German and Italian planes, the biggest bag the Allies have scored in a single day in the Tunisian campaign. The Allies lost twelve aircraft.

A Cairo communique announced that Royal Air Force bombers raided Naples at dusk Sunday, rekindling fires left after a 100-plane assault earlier in the day by American heavy bombers. Other heavy bombers made a night attack on Palermo, Sicily. All planes returned safely from both attacks.

Regrets of Both Commerce Board And City Council

Both the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce and the City Council last night passed resolutions of regret and sympathy in the death of the late John Dybhavn, prominent pioneer citizen and former president of the Chamber of Commerce as well as ex-alderman.

The motion of sympathy of the Chamber of Commerce was proposed by Arnold Flaten who referred to the loss in Mr. Dybhavn's death of an esteemed and valuable citizen. Col. J. W. Nicholls, who seconded the motion, described Mr. Dybhavn as one of the finest citizens Prince Rupert had ever had. He had always given of his best to the board as well as to the city and citizens generally. His passing constituted a deep and serious loss. The resolution was passed by standing vote.

The resolution of the city council was on motion of Ald. Robert MacKay and Ald. H. M. Daggett.

Both messages of sympathy are being conveyed to the widow and the bereaved family.

Point Plan In Meat Rations

TORONTO, April 6 (CP)—The forthcoming meat rationing system in Canada will be on the point basis something similar to the system in the United States, Wartime Prices and Trade Board Donald Gordon announced.

Fuel Situation Being Gone Into

Special Committee Set Up by City Council at Recommendation of Utilities Committee

The fuel situation has been discussed by the utilities committee which decided that the committee recommend to the council that a special committee of two aldermen be set up to thoroughly investigate the situation. This report was adopted at last night's council meeting.

Public Rest Room Project Dropped

No Provision Made to Cover Expenditure of \$2,500

The proposal of converting the former reading room into a rest room and public convenience has been dropped.

The matter was discussed by the utilities committee and it was estimated that the proposed charges would cost approximately \$2,500. As no provision is made in the estimates for the item this year, it was decided to recommend to the council that no action be taken at this time.

BLACKOUT IN EFFECT

Precautionary Signal Sounded at 2:05 This Afternoon

The precautionary blackout signal sounded in Prince Rupert at 2:05 this afternoon and A.R.P. wardens went to their posts. Royal Canadian Air Force headquarters had no announcement to make other than that the blackout would continue in effect until further notice.

On recommendation of the finance committee, the city council last night rejected offers of M. Mc Stephens of \$250 for lot 4, block 6, section 1, and of C. G. Johnson of \$100 for lot 32, block 29, section 1. Both offers were below the assessed valuations.

LOSSES IN ATLANTIC INCREASE

As Expected, Nazi U-boat Campaign is Becoming More Intensive, Col. Knox Says

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 6 (CP)—Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox said today that Allied ship losses in the Atlantic were considerably worse in March than in February due to intensified operations of German submarines.

Col. Knox gave no estimate of the number of u-boats the Nazis had thrown into the spring offensive but he said "just as we expected there are more German submarines out there."

OBJECTION IS TAKEN

Danger Seen in Premier's Undertaking to Give Financial Assistance to Municipal Power Schemes.

The Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce will seek more information in regard to a statement which Premier John Hart is purported to have made declaring that, if Vancouver and Victoria wished to engage in the public utilities business by taking over the British Columbia Electric, the government would co-operate financially.

The matter was brought up by Col. J. W. Nicholls who said that it meant the whole of the province would be underwriting investments of the southern municipalities with the possibility of running into heavy losses which would have to be taken care of.

The Chamber will seek further information from Mr. Hart and the matter will also be taken up with the local member, T. D. Pattullo.

BOMBS FOR NAZI SHIPS

Germany and Occupied Europe, However, Given Respite by Royal Air Force

LONDON, April 6 (CP)—Royal Air Force fighters and Royal Navy planes attacked enemy shipping off the French coast last night, damaging three merchant vessels and two small escorting craft, the Air Ministry announced, but Germany and occupied Europe, apparently, were given respite after seventy-two hours of terrific pounding by Allied airmen.

Japs Starve Chinese Out

CHUNGKING, April 6 (CP)—Serious famine is developing for the Chinese people in Honan Province, five million being affected. The Japanese have been taking the rice they want and burning the rest.

REDS ARE MOVING ON

Several Populated Places Near Novorissk Taken—Nazis Are Turned Back Near Smolensk

LONDON, April 6 (CP)—Russians, driving against the Nazi base at Novorissk, have captured several populated places in two days of hand to hand fighting in the Caucasus and in the Iyrum area of the Donets Valley have turned back new enemy attempts to cross the river, Moscow announced.

The Russians consolidated their position in the ring around Smolensk.

A communique said that the Germans made a major attempt to raid Leningrad but only isolated planes managed to penetrate the city defences and drop bombs after air battles in which forty-two German bombers were destroyed. The Russians reported the loss of seven planes.

REVISION OF RENTS

New Deal for Owners Sought With Adoption of Report of Chamber of Commerce Committee

That there should be a revision of the rentals structure in Prince Rupert with a view to establishing rentals that would bring a fair measure of return to the owners was accepted by the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce last night in adopting a report from a special committee which had been delegated to deal with the subject of rentals.

The committee recommended that representations for rental revision here be submitted to the rentals commission on the grounds that the present rental basis was set on rentals existing at the depth of the depression, repair and maintenance costs had increased, janitor services were more costly and that fuel costs had gone up.

It was stated that the Vancouver Associated Property Owners' organization was working along similar lines and it was expected there would be some relaxation in the interests of the owners.

One Hundred Seventeen Persons Rescued; Three Are Numbered as Dead

Spectacular Rescues Are Effected in Vicious Winter Elements—Captain of One of Russian Ships Perishes

SEATTLE, April 6 (CP)—Dramatic and hazardous rescues of 117 persons from two grounded ships in the North Pacific with loss of three lives were disclosed while the Navy Department announced in Washington that a third ship had run aground. Two of the three were identified as Russians. In one spectacular rescue 1,200-foot line and breeches buoys were strung out to bring sixty-four persons to the isolated shore after the freighter had been grounded thirty-eight days in a vicious winter storm.

The captain of the vessel and one member of the salvage crew were lost. In the second rescue forty-five men and eight women were saved. One woman was lost when attempts were made to lower a lifeboat.

GERMAN IS RECAPTURED

Nazi Prisoner of War is Back in Custody at Gravenhurst in Ontario

TORONTO, April 6 (CP)—Siegfried Schmidt, one of seven German prisoners of war who escaped from a prison camp near Gravenhurst, last December 8, has been recaptured, it was announced today. The announcement said that Schmidt never left camp but gave no other details.

Postal Official Is Visitor Here

Possibility of Obtaining Improvement in Local Service Being Looked Into

The supervisor of postal services for British Columbia is in the city today and is being met by a committee of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce consisting of W. J. Scott, Frank Skinner and Alex Mackenzie with a view to obtaining betterment of local service which has been the subject of general complaint for considerable time.

Wartime Prices Rule Too Tight

Should be Possible, it is Felt, to Take Cup of Coffee to Fainting Woman

The Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce is not satisfied with a supposed ruling of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board that a cup of coffee may not be taken out of a restaurant even in the case of such an emergency as a woman fainting on the street. There had been such an incident recently when a woman had been brought into his store, Alex MacKenzie told the Chamber in making a motion that the Wartime Prices and Trade Board be approached.

After discussion, in which some members thought it was hardly a matter to be taken up by the Chamber, the motion was passed.

The New Income Tax . . .

The new federal income tax plan cancels half the 1942 tax liability of all individuals except those with investment incomes exceeding \$3,000 annually, where the tax is postponed until death and collected with the succession duty. This is just another little dig at the capitalist system.

All taxes paid in 1942 can be credited against the 1942 tax liability. Thus, the cancellation of six months' income taxes means that the majority of Canadians are paid up for 1942. Those who have been paying on a quarterly basis discharged their full obligation by the payment of their second quarterly instalment due January 15 last. The first 1943 instalment was due March 15, however, instead of April 15, which means a slight squeeze.

Those who have taxes deducted at the source of their salaries or wages have paid four months' taxes in 1942 which are still owing. During the other eight months, national defence taxes were paid and these can be added to the income taxes paid in the other four months. For those in the low brackets, the total of these payments will exceed their 1942 tax liability. For those earning between \$2,000 and \$5,000 annually there will still be a small amount owing but this may be less than the 10 per cent which they expected to pay in September. For those with salaries much over \$5,000 the extra burden will be heavy, as the national defence tax credit will be relatively slight. During the next nine months such taxpayers will be forced to pay what amounts to practically eleven months' taxes. To them, Mr. Ilsley's proposals smack of double taxation and a capital levy.

Although Mr. Ilsley has not raised rates, those with both low and high incomes will find that their total tax payments over the remainder of 1943 will show a large proportionate increase over the present rate of payment.

Finally, other factors being equal, higher rates in 1944 will be necessary if Mr. Ilsley hopes to maintain income tax receipts, as many taxpayers will pay an amount in 1943 larger than their actual tax liability for this year.

decided to lend support to the movement to ensure that adequate milk supplies be made available for the babies of the city. The Chamber will collaborate with a committee of the Prince Rupert Parent-Teachers' Association consisting of S. A. Cheeseman, Mrs. G. R. S. Blackaby and Mrs. G. A. Hill which is dealing actively with the matter.

Mr. Little felt it was fitting that the Chamber should take some action with a view to co-ordinating representations and drawing up an effective case.

Mr. Blackaby felt the situation was critical. It was laudable to send as much milk abroad as possible but it was of primary importance to keep enough in Canada to ensure the health and well-being of children and others who required it. Prince Rupert was in a peculiar situation in that it had few dairy herds. Already fresh milk delivery services were being cut down.

Arnold Flaten felt the matter might be taken up with the Provincial Board of Health. Milk cows were being slaughtered and he could see rationing of milk coming. C. C. Mills spoke of commitments

which British Columbia canned milk producers had to fulfil with the British Food Ministry. However, 600 cases had been released to Prince Rupert a few days ago and another 1,000 cases had arrived this day. By April 20 the British Food Ministry commitments would have been met and then he believed there would be a normal supply to meet the requirements here providing there was no hoarding.

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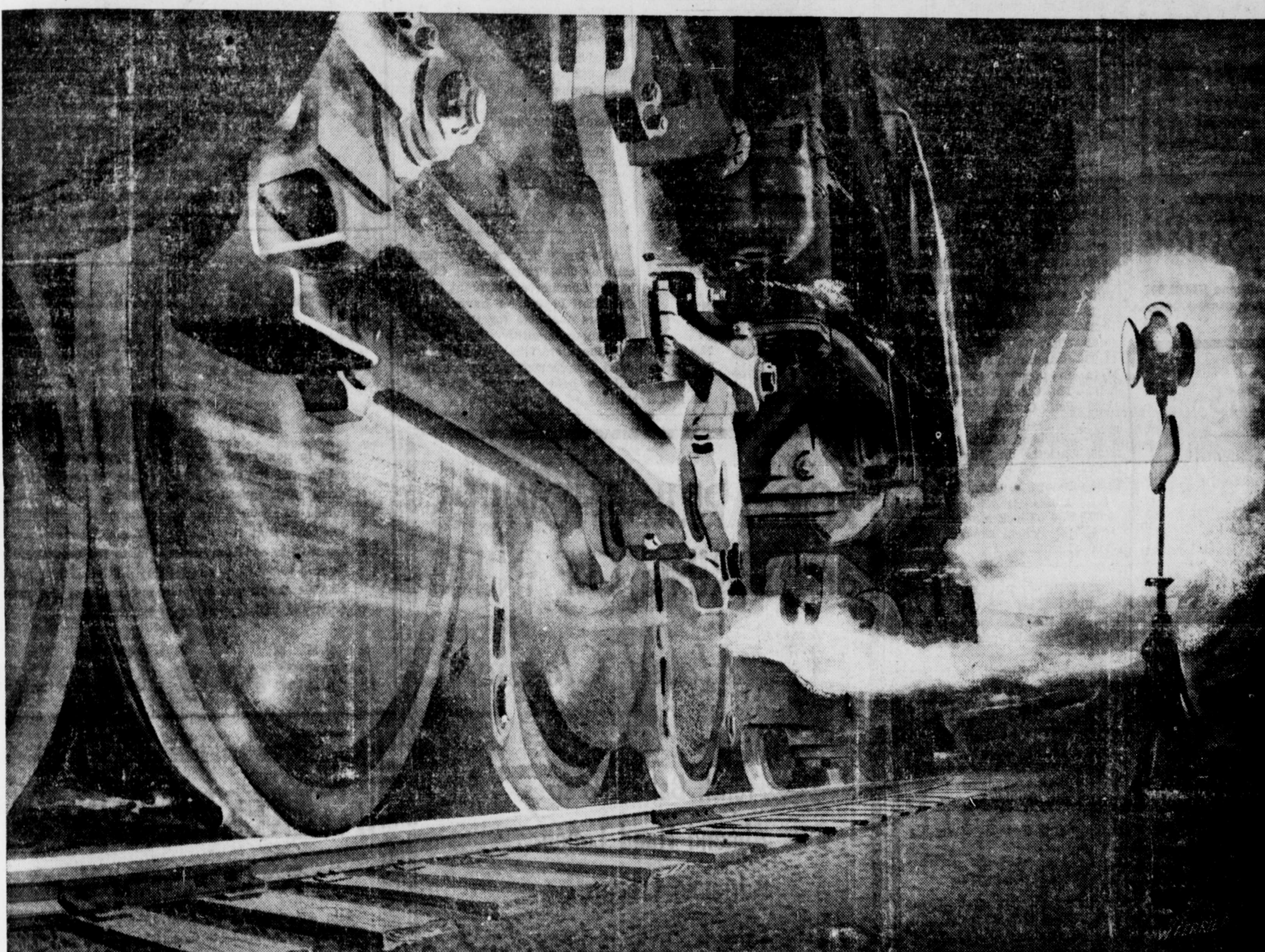
