# One Hundred Seventeen Persons Rescued; Three Are Numbered as Dead

Spectacular Rescues Are Effected in Vicious Winter Elements—Captain of One of Russian Ships Perishes

SEATTLE, April 6 (CP)—Dramatic and hazardous rescues of 117 persons from two grounded ships in the North Pacific with loss of three lives were disclosed while the Navy Department announced in Washington that a third ship had run aground. Two of the three were identified as Russians. In one spectacular rescue 1,200-foot line and breeches buoys were

strung out to bring sixty-four per-sons to the isolated shore after the freighter had been grounded

The captain of the vessel and one member of the salvage crew were lost.

In the second rescue forty-five men and eight women were saved. One woman was lost when attempts were made to lower a lifeboat.
