

With the extensive rationing scheme for sugary products such as jams, syrups and honeys which we out the rugged challenger. announced in the Daily News yesterday, Canadians will be feeling the food conservation and control measures more generally than ever before. To many families which had been such free users of commodities like jams, marmalades. honeys, canned fruits, syrups, it will seem like getting down closer to business of plain living to have to adjust to one threepound tin of jam for a family of four in a month.

Few of us, however, have really suffered from the rationing measures imposed to date and, if the tightening up on the sweetspreads seems to affect some of us, there are still plenty of plain, substantial, wholesome foods available in good quantities.

In short, even the latest rationings do not present great hardships or great sacrifices.

Developing Unfortunate Attitude...

One of the unfortunate incidents of the manpower shortage is the attitude of independence and often sheer impertinance of young and irresponsible employees in their dealings with the public. Those who have been used to decent courtesy and consideration may be somewhat shocked with the treatment they are accorded sometimes. However, it will be the young people themselves who will be the sufferers in the end for the habits and attitudes they are now developing. It is the young person who still realizes a sense of responsibility and is imbued with a spirit of courtesy and consideration who is arming himself for the more normal times.


