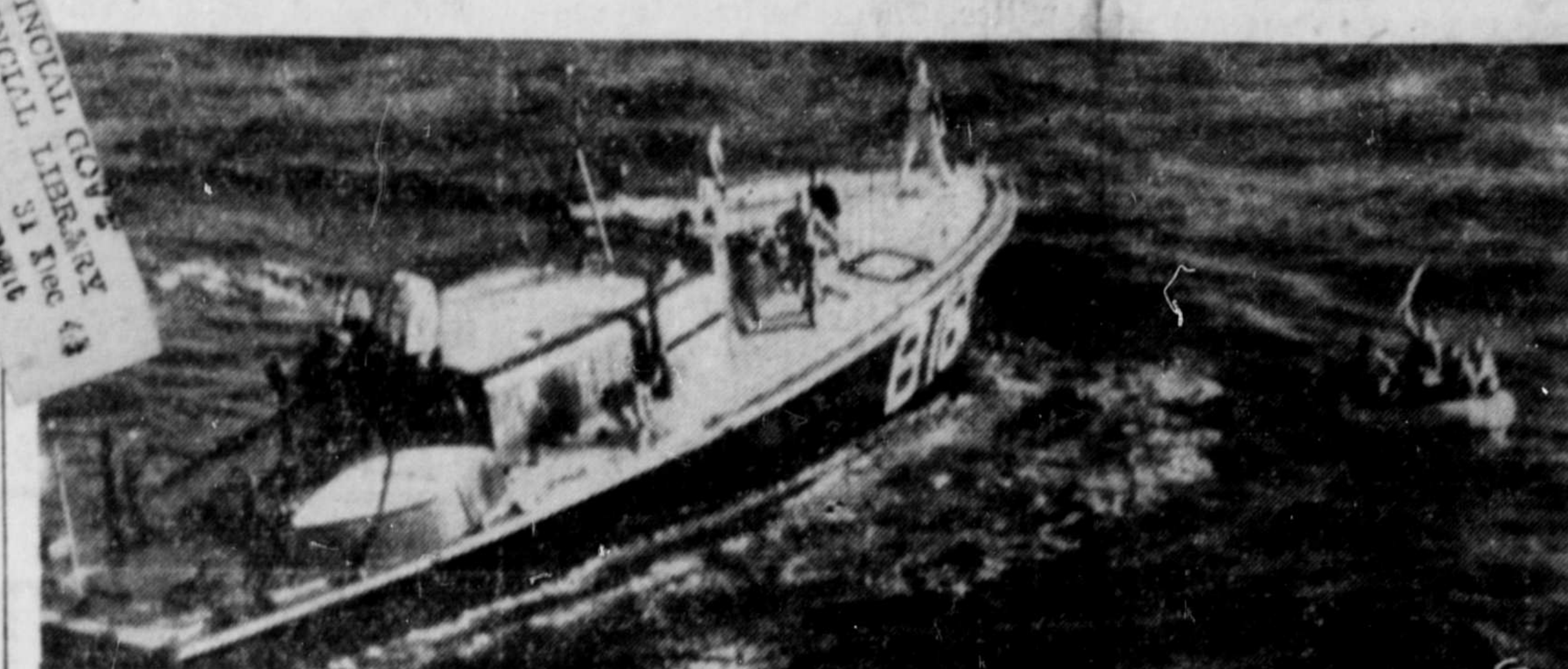
DE MARIGNY IS ACQUITTED

Coal Situation Major Problem in Old Land

Miners Claim Great Manpower Increase is Needed to Bring Production up to Nation's Minimum Requirements.

LONDON, Nov. 12 (CP)—Britain's restive coal front, lulled by the persuasion of the Prime Minister, is lulled only. The storm has not died. Mr. Churchill's victory in the coal debate averted a serious division in the ranks of the Commons and his Government is now considering by what methods it can better conduct operational control of the mines to meet a situation in which an already inadequate production is faced with the increasing demands of a developing military victory.

MINISTER IS NAMED

Lord Woolton, Food Minister, Minister, Takes Over British Reconstruction Portfolio.

LONDON, Nov. 12—Prime Minister Winston Churchill announces the appointment of Lord Woolton, minister of food, to a newly created portfolio of reconstruction. Woolton, who has made a great success of the food ministry, surmounting problems which seemed almost insuperable, will make plans for the post-war rebuilding of Great Britain.

Col. John J. Llewellyn, minister at Washington, D.C., will return to Britain as minister of food.

Terrace Made Good Victory Loan Showing

TERRACE, Nov. 12—The Victory Loan was oversubscribed by the Terrace district to the extent of 25 per cent. The quota was \$35,000 and more than 45,000 was taken up. This is a good showing as compared with most places in the province. Other interior points to exceed their quotas were Pinchi Lake, Smithers, Vanderhoof, Hazelton, Fort St. James and Burns Lake.

Port Simpson Boy Missing

Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Flewin of Port Simpson have been advised that their son Charles Edward (Ted) Flewin, aged 22, is reported missing as from November 3 after air operations overseas with the Royal Canadian Air Force. He would have been twenty-two years of age this month. He was a navigator.

Ambassador Is Canada's First

OTTAWA, Nov. 12—Prime Minister Mackenzie King announced yesterday an exchange of ambassadors between Canada and the United States. The change makes Hon. Leighton McCarthy, Canadian minister at Washington, the first Canadian ambassador anywhere. Formerly there had merely been ministerial status.

Chinese Victory Bond Campaign

A draw for two \$50 bonds raffled under the auspices of the Chinese Youth Association was held in the Victory Loan offices. The winning numbers were drawn by the Misses Jackie and Barbara Moore. Winners were J. A. Wood, Vancouver, and Harry Chan, Star Store, Prince Rupert.

Honor of War Dead

Remembrance Day Observed With Parade, Service and Placing of Wreaths.

With parade, service at the cenotaph and placing of poppy wreaths, solemn tribute was again paid yesterday morning at the armistice hour of 11 o'clock to the glorious dead of the First Great War. Thus the twenty-fifth anniversary of the ending of that war was commemorated on Remembrance Day. The proceedings were simpler and briefer than usual on this occasion and the principal participants were veterans themselves. However, women's organizations were also represented and among the participants in the placing of wreaths was Mayor W. M. Watts as well as the 102nd Battalion, Moose Lodge and Oddfellows.

Blocking Up Rails

LONDON, Nov. 12—Royal Air Force bombers Thursday night engaged in operations aimed at blocking Germany's railway communications through France to Italy. The main attack was concentrated on a coastal rail centre at Carnes where the blow was quite heavy and well concentrated.

Posts of Four Aldermen, Two Trustees Open

Nominations for candidates for civic electoral vacancies will be held in the city hall on December 13. Date set for the election is December 16. The seats now held by four aldermen will be open to contest in the civic election next month. Alderman Robert McKay, Thomas Elliott, Nora E. Arnold and Tage Sorensen, elected for a one-year term, are due for retirement unless re-elected. It is not yet known whether or not they will "choose to run."

TRAIN FOR INVASION

LONDON, Nov. 12—Supposedly anticipating a large invasion attack on that part of the Italian mainland north of Rome, Germans are scuttling ships and wrecking docks to block the ports of Leghorn and Pescara. Already much damage has been done by this action. The Germans acted similarly before losing Naples.

Nazis Wreck Italian Ports

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WAR NEWS

BATTLE OF RUSSIA
LONDON — Amid reports that the Germans have already begun to evacuate the Crimean Peninsula by sea, Russian shock troops are plowing steadily westward from captured Kiev after a twenty-seven mile drive which the Russians say netted them more than one hundred towns and villages. Moscow communique says the Russians have battled to within sixty miles of Korosten key rail city northwest of Kiev, to increase threat of encirclement of Germans still battling in the lower western Ukraine. In the Crimea, the Russians, fighting to extend beachheads on Kerch Peninsula, repulsed fierce German counter-attacks.

BATTLE OF ITALY
ALGIERS — The Germans staged nine furious counter-attacks in twenty-four hours but the Anglo-American Fifth Army drove a three-mile wedge into the Mignano-Venafro area against the core of the greatly reinforced Nazi winter line, it is announced. All counter attacks were thrown back with artillery and infantry fire taking a heavy toll. Enemy resistance is almost equally stubborn along the entire line but the British Eighth Army on the east has consolidated positions on high ground overlooking the Sangro River.

CLOTHES RESTRICTED

The supply of clothes available for British civilians is about half of what it was before the war. Clothes are strictly rationed and are cut on austerity lines.

RECORD IN BOMBS

By July, 1943, the British Bomber Command had dropped 12,000 tons of bombs on Essen. This was the greatest weight of bombs at that time dropped on any single town in the world.

LEBANON TROUBLE

British Government Announces It Will Not Permit Disorders There.

LONDON, Nov. 12—The British government will not permit disorders in Lebanon area, it informed the French Committee of National Liberation Friday in a protest against the arrest of the President, Prime Minister and members of the Lebanon government and parliament. There have been serious disorders with much bloodshed. Official informants said the French action was taken in Lebanon without consultation with no notification to the British authorities.

Blocking Up Rails

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Mosquitoes made a three-ply attack on Berlin, Hanover and the Ruhr. Seven bombers and a fighter were lost. United States flying fortresses staged a heavy daylight attack on Munster in Germany, yesterday.

Sobering Post-War Picture...

Anyone attempting to visualize the post-war period is gazing straight into a fog. Conditions in the years after the war will depend on many things, such as the length of the conflict, the condition of various countries, including the occupied regions, when fighting is over, the amount of sheer fatigue and inertia felt by the peoples, and the post-war agreements between victors and terms imposed on vanquished peoples.

In spite of all this there is a tendency in many quarters to believe that the post-war period will be better for most people than the years before the war. We all hope that such will be the case. But the report of the Research Institute of America prophesying that if Germany is defeated next spring there will be 4,000,000 people unemployed in the United States by the end of 1944 and possibly three times that many by the end of 1945 comes as something of a shock.

Pessimism is seldom constructive but it would be dangerous to allow an over-easy optimism to blind us to the difficulties that lie in the way of maintaining employment at present levels after the war.

Fortunately earnings are high just now, and wise people have invested in Victory Bonds to act as a cushion in years which may be less productive of employment. Canada has amassed something like \$100,000,000 in unemployment insurance. Such things will help but the main burden for meeting the crisis will rest on industry.

Achievement In Government...

It is something of a noteworthy achievement and a testimonial to good government management which we are getting these days at Victoria that British Columbia should have reduced its gross debt by well over twelve million dollars in a year, being the only province in the Dominion to effect a reduction in gross debt in ten years. The announcement we published this week is one of too few reminders we have of the effective administration of the Hart government. The government has possibly not publicized its accomplishments as much as it might have. It is well that the people should know things of this nature to guide their judgment against the day when they will be having to choose between a proven and sound administration and a new and experimental aspiring group. The one has been as silent about its achievements as the other has been vocal in promulgating its ideas.

Please allow me this valuable space in your newspaper. I am a married man with two children. A year ago I volunteered for active service in the Canadian Army and, while not being fit medically, I was accepted for service. I served my country for over a year but, as time went on, I found that I was unable to keep up and, therefore, after being examined by the military doctors, I was discharged as being unfit for the Army. I want to impress upon you here that I volunteered. I saw it was my duty to do so because my country needed me as they needed so many other men.

A few days ago an insult was thrown in my face. I received a registered letter from the government informing me that I had reached the age limit and was to submit myself for medical examination. In other words they, the government, did not know that I had served in the Army and was actually conscripting me for military service.

I ask you, Mr. Editor, is this not an insult?

SUSPECTS TIM BUCK

Tim Buck deceives now that he may come to power. Then business can be confiscated and the owners liquidated instead of compensated.

Sport Chat

A modern Sampson who defied the unhappy Biblical precedent, Arthur Danahar relaxed for a haircut between rounds of a welterweight bout with Vancouver's Sonny Jones—then raced to an easy points victory in London. The young Irish Guard's sergeant was having plenty of trouble with Sonny in their eight-round contest at London's Queensberry Club until in the interval after the sixth round he had a fringe of hair sheared. It had been falling over his eyes and bothering a small forehead cut. The effect was immediate. Danahar floored Sonny for an eight-count in the seventh round and punched him all over the ring in the final three minutes. Sonny, a veteran who put up some fine performances in this country before the war and recently returned as a Canadian Army private, fought back like the old campaigner he is and showed a dangerous left hook. In Danahar, he was opposing one of the best welterweights in Britain.

Peter Kane, one-time world flyweight champion, gained his second victory in three days with a triumph over Sammy Reynolds of Wolverhampton that headed the Queensberry card. Reynolds, challenger for the world title now held by Glasgow's Jackie Paterson, revealed little form that would suggest championship possibilities. Intent on a comeback, the 25-year-old Kane wants a rematch with Paterson, hard-hitting wee lad who knocked him out in just 61 seconds last June to take the world title as recognized by the New York Boxing Board of Control. Previous to the Reynolds bout, Kane kayoed Johnny Summers of Edinburgh at Bristol in 90 seconds. It was the first fight for the Royal Air Force sergeant physical training instructor since he ran into Paterson's fists. Against Reynolds, the ring wise Kane wasted few punches but his defence was by no means perfect and in the sixth round of the eight-round affair his mouth and eye were cut slightly.

Sgt. Rod MacDonald of Edmonton, who won the 1943 British and Canadian Armies middleweight boxing championship, lost on a referee's casting vote to a former titleholder over six rounds at a charity match in London's Queensberry Club. MacDonald kept pace in the punching department with Sgt. R. Thomas, British Army middleweight king two years ago, but persisted in clinching. The Canadian previously lost a decision in the same ring to Thomas, Amateur Boxing Association welterweight champ.

The Experts Say - - -

HOT DESSERTS—With colder days at hand hot desserts are increasing in popularity and a new recipe for Apple Upside-down. Cake comes from the testing kitchens of the consumer section of the Department of Agriculture to add a fillip to the daily menu.

To make six servings melt three tablespoons of butter in a baking dish, add one-third cup brown sugar and cook together two or three minutes. Peel and core three apples and cut them in half to make six thick rings. Spread the butter and sugar mixture evenly over the bottom of the baking dish and arrange the apple rings on top.

Now cream one-quarter cup clarified dripping or mild-flavored fat with three tablespoons of sugar. Add one well-beaten egg and one-third cup molasses and beat thoroughly. Sift together and add one cup pastry flour, one teaspoon baking powder, one-half teaspoon baking soda, one-eighth teaspoon salt, one teaspoon ginger, one-

half teaspoon cinnamon. After the dry ingredients have been added, quickly mix in one-third cup boiling water and spread the batter over the apples. Bake in a moderate oven, 325 degrees F. about 40 minutes.

ATAM A VEGETABLES—Marion Harlow of nutrition services tells us that housewives can make a sound health investment and delight their hungry families by taking advantage of the yellow and green vegetables which are rich in vitamin A. Carrots, sweet potatoes, squash and turnip, among the yellow vegetables, and spinach, cabbage, brussels sprouts and broccoli among the green, are all rich in the vitamin, which, unlike most vitamins, can be stored in the body. This vitamin "bank" helps keep the membranes of the nose and throat healthy and so ward off colds and other similar infections.

BACK IN CIRCULATION—Good news about the reconditioning of woollens comes from the consumer branch of the Prices Board which offers suggestions for repairing them. Worn, torn or frayed woollen clothes stand a better chance of being put back into circulation than clothes of any other material.

Consumer branch experts say tears can be almost concealed by running stitches back and forth with the weave, regardless of the direction of the tear. Ordinary adhesive tape, pressed on with a cold or barely-warm iron will do a good sticking job on two torn edges brought carefully together.

Tiny holes or threadbare spots can be darned or reinforced by travelling threads from the underseams and weaving them back and forth. If the elbows are worn and you can't restyle the garment with contrasting sleeves, knitted sleeves of the same color are both smart and practical.

NEW MENDING TAPE—A new resin-treated material can be used to mend materials other than woollens, while they are being ironed, says the consumer branch. Cut to fit, this mending tape can be placed under the tear or worn spot, pressed for a few seconds with a hot iron and the job's done. For patching heavy material, such as trousers or raincoats, it is suggested that a matching piece be taken from a concealed part of the garment and then set in with the tape.
