ENEMY CARRYING OUT DEMOLITIONS ON SOUTHERN COAST OF ITALIAN TOE WITH VIEW TO RETREATING FURTHER NORTHWARD

With American forces entering Messina this morning and the Berlin radio admitting in a broadcast that all German and Italian troops have been withdrawn from Sicily, the conquest of the great Italian island appeared nigh complete. The Americans announced today that mopping up operations were now in progress.

The vanguard of the British Eighth Army, moving up the east coast of Sicily, staged a commando type landing yesterday eight miles south of Messina and was pressing forward on the city today. The main force of the British Eighth Army was still at Santa Teresa di Riva.

Allied headquarters in North Africa announced that the enemy was carrying out demolitions on the southern coast of the Italian toe, indicating the intention of withdrawing farther up the Italian Peninsula.

Royal Navy warships pounded Port Scalea, sank an armed fighter and two escorts off Cape Benifata and again shelled the port of Vibo Valentia on the Italian mainland, it was announced.



A Fourth Front . .

Statements by Dr. Goebbels calling upon Germans to show themselves equal to their world role and reminding them indirectly that their behavior will be compared by the world with the behavior of the British under the German air threat in 1940 indicate that the Nazis are facing not only a second front to the south of them and a third front overhead but a fourth front at home. From all sides the news that Berliners must listen to is bad. And there are evidences of lack of leadership such as characterized the Italian scene for months before the fall of Musso-

Obviously something unusual is transpiring in Berlin. This can be seen in statements emanating from the German International Information Bureau.

We need to beware of peace-offensives-by-rumor, and of the effect on our own morale of premature expectations of a crack in Germany. If the rumors are true, so much the better, and so much the harder should the free peoples fight and work. Hard fighting and hard working remain, and will remain until the Nazis surrender unconditionally, the surest way to shorten the war.

The question of venereal disease control in Prince Rupert was brought before the city council at last night's meeting Dr. R. G. Knipe, director of the public health unit; Sergeant O L. Hall, chief of city police. and Indian Agent James Gillett being in attendance at the meeting. After some discussion. in the course of which there was difference of opinion on the point of responsibility, two motions were passed—one to notify the Department of Indian Affairs of the venerea disease situation among the Indians and demanding that the department assume its responsibility in the matter and the other to leave the matter of immediate cases in the hands of

Answering another question Indian Agent Gillett said that there was no law to compel the Indians to remain on their reserve. They could come and go as they pleased. The war had accentuated the problem of venereal disease. Mr. Gillett said he had the authority send Indians who were affected with disease to hospital but today there was no room in the hospital here for their admis-

There were few cases of venereal disease in military circles here, Dr. Knipe said.

Ald. Black was emphatically of the opinion that it was up to the Department of Indian Affairs to make arrangements for the treatment of its wards.

Ald. McKay did not feel that the city should be saddled with the cost of treatment of venereal disease cases.

Acting Mayor W. H. Brett and Ald. Elliott recognized that even if some cost was involoved the city would have to assume a measure of responsibility with immediate cases which menaced the general health of the community.

The conclusion of the discussion was the passage of resolutions as already outlined.






