Italians Are Anticipating Invasion

SHIPYARD SLOWDOWN IS ENDED

Men Vote to Return to Work After Receiving Assurance of Settlement of Commissary Issue

After hearing assurances by their leaders that W. R. Devenish, general manager of Canadian National Railways Western region, would attempt to negotiate an agreement with Wartime Housing heads and other authorities with a view to bringing satisfaction to their grievances, workers of the local dry dock indicated this morning by a showing of hands at a mass meeting that they would return to work their full regular shifts, until an agreement is reached.

The meeting followed almost 24 hours after the men left their jobs yesterday noon to begin a slowdown in which they were to work only four hours a day to emphasize their dissatisfaction with food conditions in the yard commissary and their determination to have alleged conditions corrected.

The executive of the Allied Trades Council, which includes H. Harrison of the Boilermakers, C. W. Wardale of the Electricians and J. S. Black of the Carpenters, advocated strongly the acceptance of Mr. Devenish's proposals regarding a negotiation period and expressed satisfaction that the men had agreed to return to their regular shifts during that time.

However, in addressing the meeting, H. Harrison said that, if no satisfactory agreement is reached within two weeks, the slowdown will be resumed after that period and continued until the demands of the unions are met.

The cessation of the slowdown goes into effect today and workers of the second and third shifts are expected to come prepared to work a full eight hours.

Howe, minister of munitions and supply, announced last night that the government would proceed with plans already under way to take over three Quebec shipbuilding plants, seven thousand workers of which went on strike yesterday in demand for increased wages and closed shops. The walk-out occurred last night.

ARGENTINA AND STATES BUENOS AIRES—The new Ramirez administration of Argentina has expressed its readiness of entering into a petroleum agreement with the United States.

TAKE OVER WAR PLANT WASHINGTON—President Roosevelt has ordered Secretary of the Navy Knox to take over a war plant in Philadelphia engaged in making bearings so that it may be effectively operated in war production.

OUT FOR GOOD CAPE TOWN—General Jan C. Smuts, Premier of South Africa, in a United Nations Day address expressed that hope that, now Germany and Italy were eliminated from Africa, they would be out for good.

SHOWDOWN THIS WEEK ALGIERS—A final showdown in the dispute between General Charles DeGaulle and General Henri Giraud is expected by Thursday when they will either resume negotiations or admit their differences cannot be settled. Giraud refused an invitation to a luncheon today at which DeGaulle was to be present.

DEFENDS ALUMINUM COMPANY OTTAWA—Hon. C. D. Howe, minister of munitions and supply, defended the Aluminum Company in the House of Commons yesterday. He said it had delivered all contracts and had given full value for every dollar spent.

GERMANS COLLABORATED WASHINGTON—It was revealed yesterday that German spies had collaborated with the Japanese in the sneak attack on Pearl Harbor. A German has been sentenced to fifty years imprisonment for having sent out signals in regard to type and kind of war vessels in the harbor. He had been at first sentenced to execution but this had been commuted.

STILLWELL BACK CHUNGKING—Lieut. General Stillwell, commander-in-chief of Allied forces in central China, is back in Chungking after a trip around the world. He attended the Churchill-Roosevelt conference in Washington as well as visiting London and Cairo.

KEEPING UP OFFENSIVE ON REICH

Oberhausen Principal Target For Mass Raid of Royal Air Force Last Night

LONDON, June 15 (C)—Following another mass attack last night on Oberhausen and other Ruhr objectives, a big formation of planes roared across the English Channel today to continue the offensive. As bombers rumbled out toward the continent two formations of British and Canadian fighters were just returning from a breakfast-time sweep of Pas de Calais area where they shot down three Pocke-Wulf 190's out of two formations of 15 which were presumably setting out to harass the English coast.

The raid on the Ruhr last night by the Royal Air Force marked continuation of the deadly offensive against armament centres of the Reich which has been going on since the greatest force of heavy bombers of the war was sent out to attack the Rhineland at the end of the week with the heaviest attack concentrated on Duesseldorf. In the Duesseldorf raid, it has been disclosed, all Royal Canadian Air Force squadrons in Canadian bomber groups in Britain participated.

ITALY EXPECTS INVASION

A Rome commentator told the Italians to stand by today for an Allied invasion and other Rome and Berlin broadcasts contrived to give a picture of intense air and sea activity in the invasion triangle between Malta, Bizerte and Sicily.

TURKO-SYRIAN BORDER CLOSED

Ankara reports that Allied authorities will close the Syrian border with Turkey at six o'clock tonight, semi-official sources said today. Turkish officials profess to have no knowledge of why the border is being closed.

MASS ATTACK ON RUHR

Royal Air Force heavy bombers made another mass attack on Ruhr objectives last night, concentrating particularly on the important steel and coal city of Oberhausen, three miles west of Essen.

MORE JAP SHIPS SUNK

The Department of the Navy announces that American submarines have sunk twelve more Japanese ships including a destroyer, a large tanker, five transports and cargo vessels. Other ships were damaged. There were no details of time or place.

NEW CITY ENGINEER

The city engineer's position has been offered to George H. Hanes and he has accepted it. Mr. Hanes comes from North Vancouver and is a former member of the Legislative Assembly.

OTTAWA, June 15—Associating himself in endorsement with the findings of the recent food conference held at Hot Springs in Georgia, Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King said yesterday that larger production of goods would have to be made by the nations capable of doing so if the world was to be freed of hunger.

MEATLESS DAYS HERE

Restaurant Plan Proves Very Effective For Conservation

Fine co-operation on the part of the managements of restaurants and camp commissaries in the Prince Rupert district in the plan instituted a few days ago to conserve meats has resulted in a saving of between 20 and 30 per cent over what was formerly used, it was revealed by information gathered this morning by the Daily News.

The plan, whereby restaurants would observe two meatless days each week and all restaurants would standardize their meat dishes on each day's menu, was brought about by the situation that, up to that time, local eating establishments had been using meat right up to the very limit of their allowance. The existence of the present saving means that there exists a margin which may eliminate the danger of a meat shortage.

Restaurant owners appear to have a feeling of greater security in the matter of meat, now that their sale of it is formally limited. The danger of embarrassment of being caught without either meat or a meat substitute no longer exists. One restaurant owner said that he actually had three meatless days each week, the official meatless Tuesdays and Fridays, as well as Wednesdays, when his restaurant was closed for a staff holiday. Other restaurant owners expressed satisfaction with the arrangement.

In the matter of canning sugar allowances a spokesman at the Wartime Prices and Trade Board office said that many people had not received their allowance cards because their ration books had carried out of town addresses, and their canning sugar requests had been sent to the place where the ration book had been issued. Many of these had been returned marked "address unknown" and had to be set aside until further action was taken by the ration book holders.

LOOK FOR NEW BLOW ON ITALY

Another Isand of Mediterranean is Taken—Sicily or Sardinia Next Objective

TYRRHENIAN SEA NOW ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, June 15 (CP)—Wellington Workhorses of the Royal Air Force drilled east Sicilian shipping and the ferry terminal of Messina with two-ton block-busters and showered it with incendiaries Sunday night. Allied headquarters announced today as preliminary attacks continued on large islands guarding the Tyrrhenian sea approaches to Italy. For the second successive day, however, northwest African air force delayed an all-out assault. Allied communiques announced that operations yesterday were confined to reconnaissance and patrolling.

LONDON, June 15 (C)—The tiny island of Lampedusa, eight miles west of Sicily, uninhabited and unfortified, being used only as the site for a lighthouse, was taken by the Allies yesterday. It was the only remaining island in the Sicilian Straits and Sea to be held by Italy.

According to reports from Rome the Italians are now speculating upon where the Allies may be expected to make their next landing attack. Sardinia and Sicily appear to be natural and some believe their siege may commence this week.

Allied warships and transports are already said to be massing in the Sicilian Straits where Axis planes are already said to have engaged an Allied convoy.

The Allied air force show little disposition to ease up on their history-making drive on the Italians in the Mediterranean and are continuing to turn their full weight on Sicily following the capitulation of Pantelleria and Lampedusa which was followed by the taking over of Linosa and now Lampedusa. In no case was there intervention of ground forces.

C.C.F. WINS REVELSTOKE

Coalition Government Loses Seat in Legislature as Result of Poll Yesterday

REVELSTOKE, June 15—Vincent Segur, Co-operative Commonwealth Federation candidate, won the Revelstoke provincial by-election yesterday in a close contest with Joseph McKinnon, the candidate of the coalition government. McKinnon conceded the election of Segur last night when, with four small polls yet to be heard from, the count was: Segur, 1013; McKinnon, 968.

The vacancy was caused by the death of Harry Johnston, coalition Liberal member.

The C.C.F. now has 16 seats out of a total of 48 in the Legislature. The standing of parties is: Liberals 20, C. C. F. 16, Pro. Conservatives 11, Labor 1. Joseph McKinnon, who ran as a Liberal Coalitionist, conceded the election of Vincent Segur to the British Columbia Legislature two hours after the polls closed when 16 out of 20 polls had reported with the 1036 to 968 result. The remaining four polls were very small and could not change the result.

A Post-war Aspect . . .

Considering the extent of government war borrowing there is a feeling of uncertainty among many people as to how the palpably necessary social and reconstruction programs which must follow the arrival of peace can be financed. These people, while realizing that the government must borrow money if there are to be any post-war plans effected by free Canadians, recall also that in the depressed years before the war the government's stock defence against the importunities of those who would have the jobless re-employed in national development work was that plans extensive enough to embrace all the unemployed would put the country in debt and raise taxation to hopeless levels.

In those days there was no powerful voice to foretell the value that ten years of planned development work might have become to Canada in her present stress. Even those who were most clamorous for "work and wages" rarely lifted their eyes above that urgent horizon to assess their claims in terms of Canada's future benefit. We know now that in the comparative leisure of the '30's there might have been built many of the projects which at present the country is trying to complete in a few months out of sheer urgent necessity. But it was not done.

And now many people are wondering how the same government which, with its comparatively picayune pre-war obligations could not relieve the distress of its people, can hope to advance them while hampered by its inevitably mountainous post-war debt.

There are probably as many solutions to this problem as there are self-appointed economists in the land. Some claim that no organized social program can mature while the money that should feed it is paying off war obligations and that thus our grandchildren will not have a full chance to pioneer the bright new world that should belong to the immediate post-war generation. Since this is the rankest sort of defeatism it is not worthy of comment. There is, however, another view which is as rosy as the first is black.

All the others that have come to hand have either been extensions of the first, or modifications of the second. It might even be unwise to say that post-war conditions will settle somewhere between the two.

Exponents of this second viewpoint claim that, since the government has not borrowed outside the nation, by accepting lend-lease or other foreign credits, the money is owed to the people of Canada, and is, therefore not really a debt. Since it is owed by the government to its own people it is an asset and there need be no urgency in reducing it while there is reconstruction work to be done. The existence of this asset will have a stabilizing effect during the extended unsettled period following the war, they claim. Interest payments and maturity dates can be met by a series of refundings which in no way will endanger popular confidence in the asset itself.

Such a plan arrives at the ultimate in capitalist mis-reasoning by assuming that people will do more for themselves if they have money invested in themselves than if their endeavors were prompted merely by such elemental needs as decency, security and freedom.

What plans will be worked out and followed by the post-war leaders cannot be known but what can be known and must be affirmed and re-affirmed is that, whatever its leadership, there can be little hope for Canada unless its people have an unshakable faith in their own bright future.

Revelstoke By-election . . .

The result of the provincial by-election yesterday at Revelstoke in which the C.C.F. candidate captured the seat from the coalition government will, of course, be construed by the C.C.F. as a sign of the political times in British Columbia. There is definite feeling in the air favoring a change from the old political lines. Indeed, it was in such a very feeling that the coalition government itself was conceived. The lesson from Revelstoke is that anything smacking of the old political way of doing things is still unpopular.

We have said before and we suggest again that the C.C.F., if it ever did get into power, would probably be just as political a government as any of the ones that would have preceded it. However, it is now accepted as the party of change, and, as feeling pervades the air these days, it is receiving the benefit of such an atmosphere.

These are times of expansionary feelings and things reactionary, or which even have the taint of reaction, are much in disfavor. Possibly there were other factors than those of provincial issue which had a bearing on Revelstoke.

CARDINALS IMPROVING

Margin of Leadership in National League Increased—Yankees Also Win in American

ST. LOUIS, June 15 (AP)—St. Louis Cardinals increased their margin of leadership in the National League yesterday to two full games by defeating the Cincinnati Reds while the second place Brooklyn Dodgers were losing to Boston Bees.

In the only game played in the American League the New York Yankees downed the running-up Washington Senators and their margin of leadership is now three full games.

ELECTION WARMS UP

Anti-War Parties in South Africa Fail to Reach Agreement but Coalition United

CAPE TOWN, June 15 (P)—Preliminary reports to the chief electoral officer at Pretoria as to what seats they intend to contest in the Union's general election of July 7 reveal fighting determination in both government and opposition parties.

The United Party of Prime Minister Smuts is contesting 132 of 150 seats in the Assembly. Dominion and Labor parties, who were in the coalition with Smuts in the Assembly just dissolved are putting candidates against the Opposition parties in the remaining constituencies.

The South African election campaign opened dramatically when government supporters declared the Nationalists, or Herenigde Reunited, headed by Dr. D. F. Malan,

neither expected nor desired to achieve an embarrassing majority victory. On the other hand Dr. Malan hotly denied he was putting on a "sham fight." The Africaner party led by N. C. Havenga, has announced it is nominating candidates in 25 constituencies contested by the Nationalists who complain this will split the anti-war vote and give a greater majority for the Smuts coalition.

This emphasizes the fact that the anti-war parties have failed to reach an election pact among themselves. In the government coalition, the Labor party has had two splits evolving a garment workers' group and a "militant democratic party" though both support the Union's part in the war.

For Post-War Peace

Speaking to a Cape Town audience the Prime Minister said South Africa was reaching a stage where she must throw open her doors and add to the country's manpower. In the post-war period he anticipated a world organization based primarily on the United Na-

RED TAPE ON SHIPS

Possession May be Many Points of Law but Others Have to be Decided on

LONDON, June 15 (P)—Britain doesn't automatically become owner of Axis ships captured on the high seas or found in ports taken during an offensive. International law demands that certain procedure must be followed before ownership can be established.

When a ship is captured, for instance, a "Writ in Prize," is drawn up and published in the London Gazette and advertised to the world. After an interval the writ is solemnly considered in the Admiralty Division of the High Court. Nothing—ship or cargo—is considered to be a "lawful prize" until a court of law has passed judgment.

Proof that Britain carefully follows the principles of international law was given in an announcement

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Won His Wings But Wants More

Parachute Lieutenant Starts at Bottom with R.C.A.F. to Make Moscow

EDMONTON, June 15 (P)—Disregarding an army commission and two years' hard work to get it, A. P. McCririk, 21, of Toronto, is training for his wings in the R.C.A.F.

AC2 McCririk already wore wings having won them as a paratrooper after graduation from Gordon Head, B.C. as lieutenant. Injured while skiing, just bad enough to prevent him from making parachute jumps, he was transferred to an administrative post at Calgary. But that didn't suit McCririk who wanted action, and he applied for a transfer to the Air Force.

His Army officer's uniform with parachute wings reposes with mothballs while he takes his air crew course in the R.C.A.F.

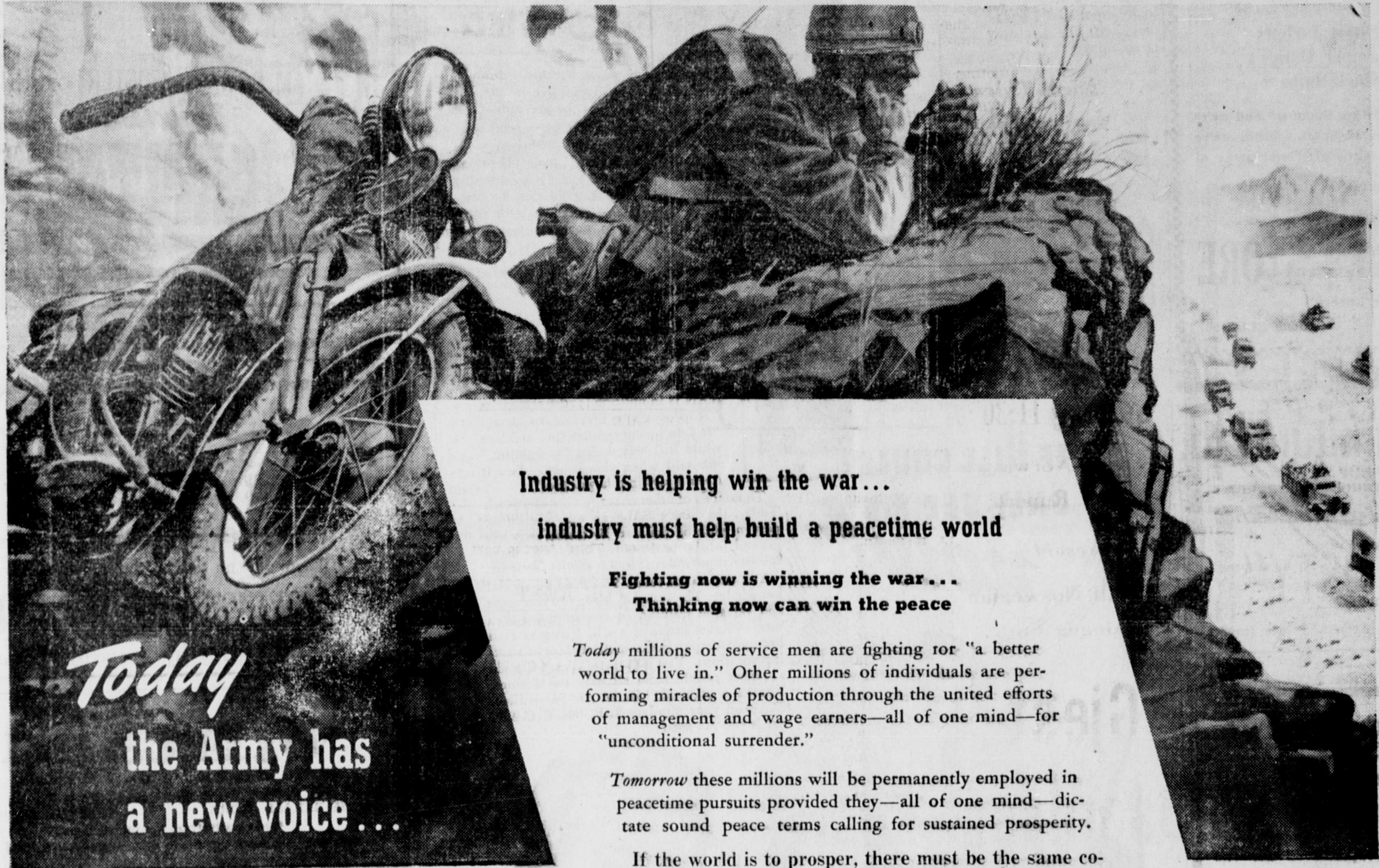
The romantic drama is based on the exploits of the Norway's dashing Nineteenth Century Robin Hood who stole from the rich and gave to the poor.
