Leipzig Last Night's Bomb Target

War Facts Faced

States Solons Hear The Fight Facts from General Marshall and Others

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 21 (CP)—Members of Congress left the House chamber with grim faces yesterday following a session with General George Marshall, chief of staff of the United States Army, and other leaders of the armisties.

An official statement was issued as to the proceedings. One member let it be known that it was considered possible to use Russian troops in the war against Japan in the event of difficulties that might be involved in maintaining them while another member said that Japan was building up faster than the Allies could destroy them.

Jens Munthe Vice-Consul

Appointment is made of appointment of Dr. Jens Munthe as Norwegian vice-consul at Prince Rupert in succession to the late John Dybhavn.

Flights Permitted

It was pointed out by the authorities here today under the revised coastal regulations as affecting Prince Rupert area, small lights exceeding 25 watts in intensity and so shielded as not to be visible from the sea, may be burning unattended by night over safes and vaults.

Big Bomber Is Crashed; 24 Are Lost

OTTAWA, Oct. 21 (CP)—Searchers for a missing Liberator aircraft carrying twenty-four Canadian Air Force personnel from eastern air stations to Montreal have sighted wreckage off the mouth of the Saguenay River and it is feared the plane crashed into the St. Lawrence, Royal Canadian Air Force headquarters announced Thursday.

INVESTIGATE WAR CRIMES

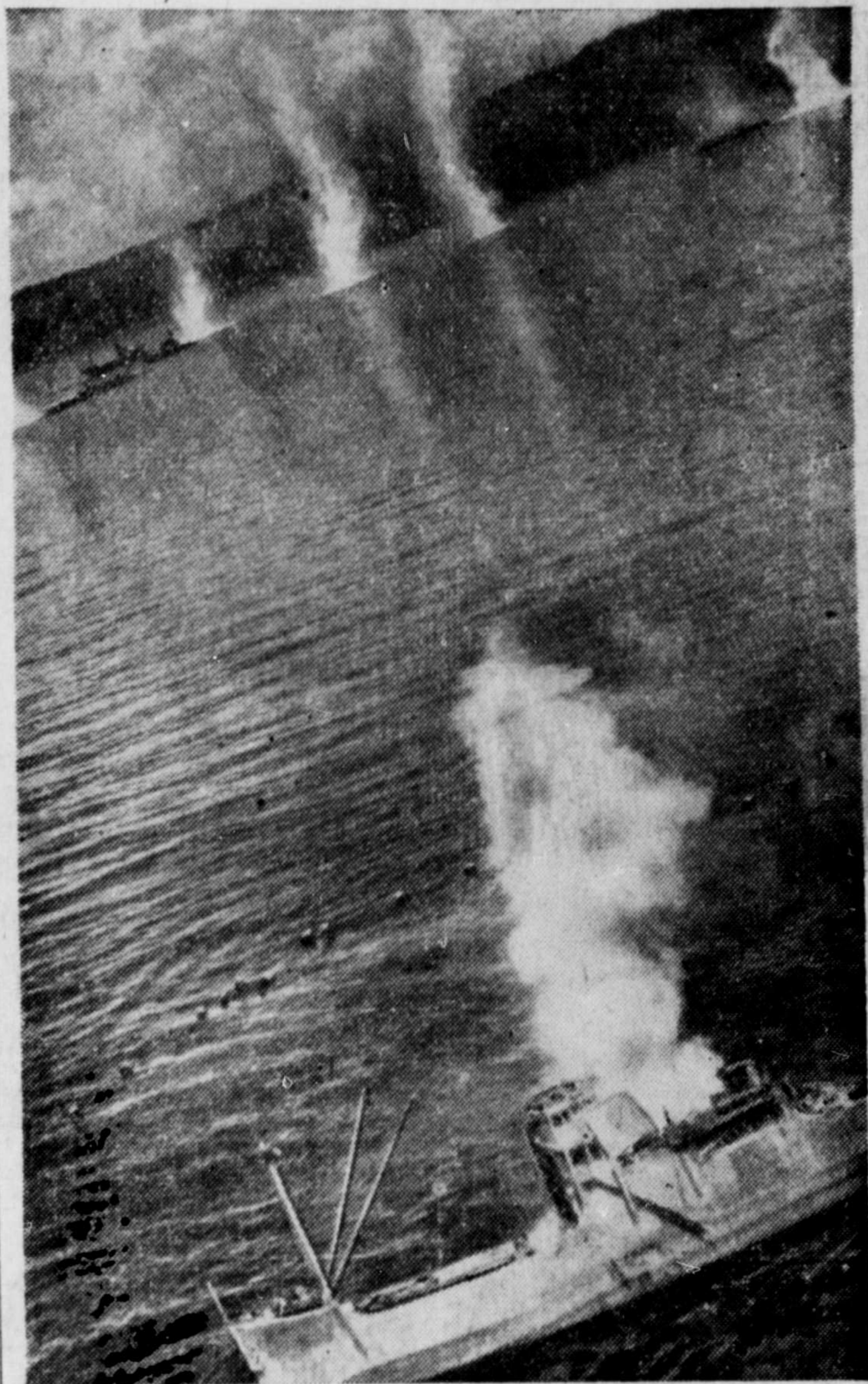
Final Arrangements Are Made For Setting Up United Nations Commission.

LONDON, Oct. 21 (CP)—The Foreign Office announced yesterday that final arrangements had been completed for the establishment in London of the United Nations Commission for the Investigation of War Crimes. (SUNCIWC).

BIG FIGHT IN RUSSIA

Melitopol, Kiev and Gomel Continue Venues of Sanguinary Engagements

MOSCOW, Oct. 21 (CP)—Bitter fighting continues with Melitopol and before Kiev and Gomel in the war along the Dnieper River between Soviets and Nazis. Further general advances by the Russians from their bridgeheads across the Dnieper are reported.

Conference Is At Business

Opening Formalities Over, Moscow Parley Gets Down to Basic Subjects.

MOSCOW, Oct. 21—The Moscow press says that the opening formalities of the three-power conference between Great Britain, United States and Russia are over and the conference has got down to the real business of basic subjects. There will be daily conversations until the parley ends. No official report on the proceedings has been issued. Soviet newspapers indicate, however, that the second front is the burning question.

Capt. Anthony Eden, British foreign secretary, commented on the Russian tendency to cut the essentials and get down to the basic questions.

The tri-partite conference heard British and American military advisers on Wednesday and it is suggested that a land attack on western Europe might have been the topic of discussion.

All official representatives refused to comment about the conversations until the conference is completed but relaxed sufficiently to say that a cordial atmosphere prevailed.

The Moscow press is also appealing for recognition of the pre-war boundaries of Russia in 1941.

Mayor Is Retiring

W. M. Watts Not to Seek Re-election as Chief Magistrate of City

Mayor W. M. Watts this morning authorized the announcement that he will not be candidate for re-election at the civic election in January.

Mr. Watts expressed appreciation of the privilege of having held the office for the past year although he was modestly loath to assume any feelings of self-satisfaction at such accomplishments as there may have been during the difficult period of reorganization after the long period of municipal receivership.

His principal reason for definitely deciding to retire from the mayoralty, Mr. Watts explained, was simply that he could not give the time the office demands.

Nearly One Third Mark

Total of \$218,750 Reached in Fifth Victory Loan Campaign Here

Yesterday's Fifth Victory Loan subscriptions in Prince Rupert totalled \$39,850, bringing the cumulative total for the first three days of the campaign to \$218,750 as compared with \$147,450 in the first three days of the Fourth Loan. Thus the third-way mark towards the \$750,000 objective is approached. Canvassers continue to report a gratifying response.

ADVANCE IN ITALY

Allied Armies Moving Forward Steadily All Along Front From Coast to Coast.

LANDING NEAR ROME? LONDON, Oct. 21 (CP)—An Allied landing in the area of Rome which lies 15 miles from the Tyrrhenian sea coast is imminent, a DNB dispatch broadcast from Berlin said tonight.

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN ITALY, Oct. 21—Burning buildings and farms and shooting and even people as they retreat before the Allies north of the Volturno River. They are falling towards Rome and a new stand about 83 miles from there is indicated.

The Fifth Army has advanced seven miles in another day and General Montgomery's Eighth Army has moved ahead to seven miles. Several counter-attacks have been essayed by the Germans to slow up the Allied advance. The front has been reduced to a length of 95 miles.

It was announced today that the Anglo-American Fifth Army had made slight gains north of the Volturno River and advance elements are probing the region to determine exactly where the Germans are setting up new defences based on Massico Ridge, Ditches and canals are slowing the progress of the Fifth Army.

On the eastern end of the front, the British Eighth Army formed high ground dominating the head running northwest from Vinchiatiuro, occupied Busi mountain village about four miles west of Campobasso, and went into Oratino.

OFF RATIONS LIST OTTAWA—Tea and coffee may be off the Canadian rationing list by Christmas "if present conditions continue." It was announced by an official of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board today.

IN NEW GUINEA ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN SOUTH PACIFIC—Fierce fighting continues on New Guinea in the vicinity of Finshafen where the Japanese are staging strong counter attacks, the most of which have been so far held back.

American Bombs Are Dropped On Balkan Targets

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN ALGIERS, Oct. 21 (CP)—Stabbing deeper into the Balkans than on previous flights, American medium bombers wrecked a round house and locomotives at Nis to assist Yugoslav guerrilla forces fighting the Germans. Nis is an important railway junction.

More Internees To Return Home

LONDON, Oct. 21 (CP)—Richard K. Law, minister of state, informed the House of Commons yesterday that every effort is being made to bring about the further exchange of 1600 British internees in the Far East. Fifteen hundred internees, including British, Canadians, Americans and nationals of other western countries, will return home soon aboard the Swedish Gripsholm, being now on their way.

Germany's Second Line Of Industrial Defence Is Now Being Smashed

Mosquitoes Over Berlin and Elsewhere in Reich—Scattered Raids are Repeated Over England With Another Alert in London.

LONDON, Oct. 21 (CP)—A great fleet of Royal Air Force and Royal Canadian Air Force heavy bombers smashed at Germany's second line of industrial defence Wednesday night, hitting at Leipzig where many of the Ruhr's bombed out industries have moved. Mosquito bombers flew over Berlin while others ranged over widespread areas of Germany. Seventeen bombers are missing, one of them Canadian.

Trying to Stop Nazi Collapse

BERNE, Oct. 21 (CP)—Germany is building an "internal Siegfried Line," first aid posts and underground hospitals in an effort to prevent a collapse of morale on the home front, it was reported yesterday.

Gets Fined For 'Defending' Army

Last night William Sneddon, lately employed by the American Army Transport, found himself overcome by a surge of alcoholic patriotism and took up cudgels in behalf of the army. Loitering in front of a Third Avenue restaurant at a time when the establishment was closing its doors for the night, Sneddon witnessed the spectacle of two soldiers being turned away when they sought admittance. This, he considered was high-handed conduct toward members of the armed forces and he proceeded to take action. Anyone who would treat servicemen in that way, he loudly explained to the restaurant functionary and to the crowded street, was a dirty "so-and-so" and a Fascist "such-and-such."

The restaurant man, resenting Sneddon's tirade, phoned the police, who carted Sneddon off to the lock-up. He appeared this morning in city police court on a charge of vagrancy in which was mentioned the word "Swearing."

At his hearing it became plain that Sneddon's volubility had not decreased with the arrival of sobriety although his speech had been cleansed of its profanity. He explained to Magistrate T. W. Brown at great length how he had left the American service on account of injuries which made it impossible for him to do heavy work, and that he was, this very day on the verge of going out to a construction camp to do the relatively light job of bull-cook.

With the agreement of Sergeant O. L. Hall, of the city police, who prosecuted, Sneddon was let off with the minimum punishment of \$10 or seven days and, when he said that he had no money to pay the fine, he was allowed until a week from Saturday to raise the money.

Sir Dudley Pound Has Passed Away

LONDON, Oct. 21 (CP)—Sir Dudley Pound, Admiral of the Fleet, died in hospital here today. His condition had become much worse last night and had caused grave anxiety since then.

PASSES AWAY AT SIMPSON

Mrs. M. C. Dudoward, Venerable Woman of Village, Is Dead

PORT SIMPSON, Oct. 21—Venerable and respected pioneer woman of this village, Mrs. M. C. Dudoward passed away at her home here at 7 o'clock this morning. She was 92 years of age and had been in failing health for the past two weeks. Mrs. Dudoward was born in Victoria and came here as a girl. For years she was connected with missionary work, later putting her efforts to school teaching and church activities. Her home, scene of many relics, was a place of interest. Left to mourn her passing are two daughters, five sons and twenty-seven grandchildren.

Metal Plant Is Target Of Bombing Raid

LONDON, Oct. 21—The principal target of American bombing planes in daylight raids yesterday on enemy territory was a Nazi metal plant 22 miles south of Cologne. An air field in Holland was also attacked. Eight of the American planes failed to return. There was strong enemy fighter resistance and eleven German planes were brought down.

The Moscow Conference...

The tripower conference in Moscow may possibly lay the foundation for a new balance of power. It will be different to any which has gone before. The days of England's "splendid isolation" are over. No longer will it be possible to maintain balance of power by naval and industrial strength. Power now rests on industrial capacity, on the ability to control the supply of raw materials, on a high order of technical skill, and on productive capacity. It depends also on ability to command the active allegiance of the increasingly individualized and politically conscious masses. Only the great powers can command these qualifications. We are therefore moving toward a system of large organizations under the direction of the great powers. In such a system Russia with its 180,000,000 population, its now industrial power, and its military skill must be reckoned with.

Where are Britain, America, Russia and France to fit into the pattern? To what extent will the manpower of America, Russia, the British and French empires, China, and a post-war Germany count in this picture? The Moscow parley may be the most momentous political discussion of the decade. On what is done there, and on the solutions supplied to the problems of these three nations, may depend the peace of the world for the next generation.

It has always seemed inappropriate that the National Stud owned by the taxpayers of Britain, should be situated in neutral Eire so hopes for transfer of the establishment to England received a stimulant when the Agriculture Ministry purchased the Sandley Estate in Dorset. The estate, offered at auction by executors of the late Lord Furness, was sold for approximately \$73,000. The belief is that it was bought on behalf of the National Stud. It houses stables and other training equipment.

The National Stud at Tully, County Kildare, covering 980 acres, was presented to the British nation by Col. Hall Walker, later Lord Waverley, in 1916. All Colo. Walker's thoroughbreds were included in the gift which had a total monetary value of \$450,000. Since then, it has realized a similar amount in profit for the Exchequer. Some of the most famous racehorses of the past three decades have been bred there. Among outstanding ones of recent years were Sun Charlot and Big Game, leased to the King. Between them they won four of Britain's five classics last year, including the Oaks and the St. Leger. The taxpaying Briton benefitted by more than \$13,000 as a result.

Yearlings from the Stud realize some of the highest prices at bloodstock sales, usually held at the Doncaster St. Leger in September, but which in these war days are held at Newmarket. At present there are about 47 two-year olds and many yearlings and retired winners of notable races, including Sun Charlot, at Tully. The question of disposing of the Stud has been raised from time to time over a considerable number of years and in 1935 there were informal discussions between the

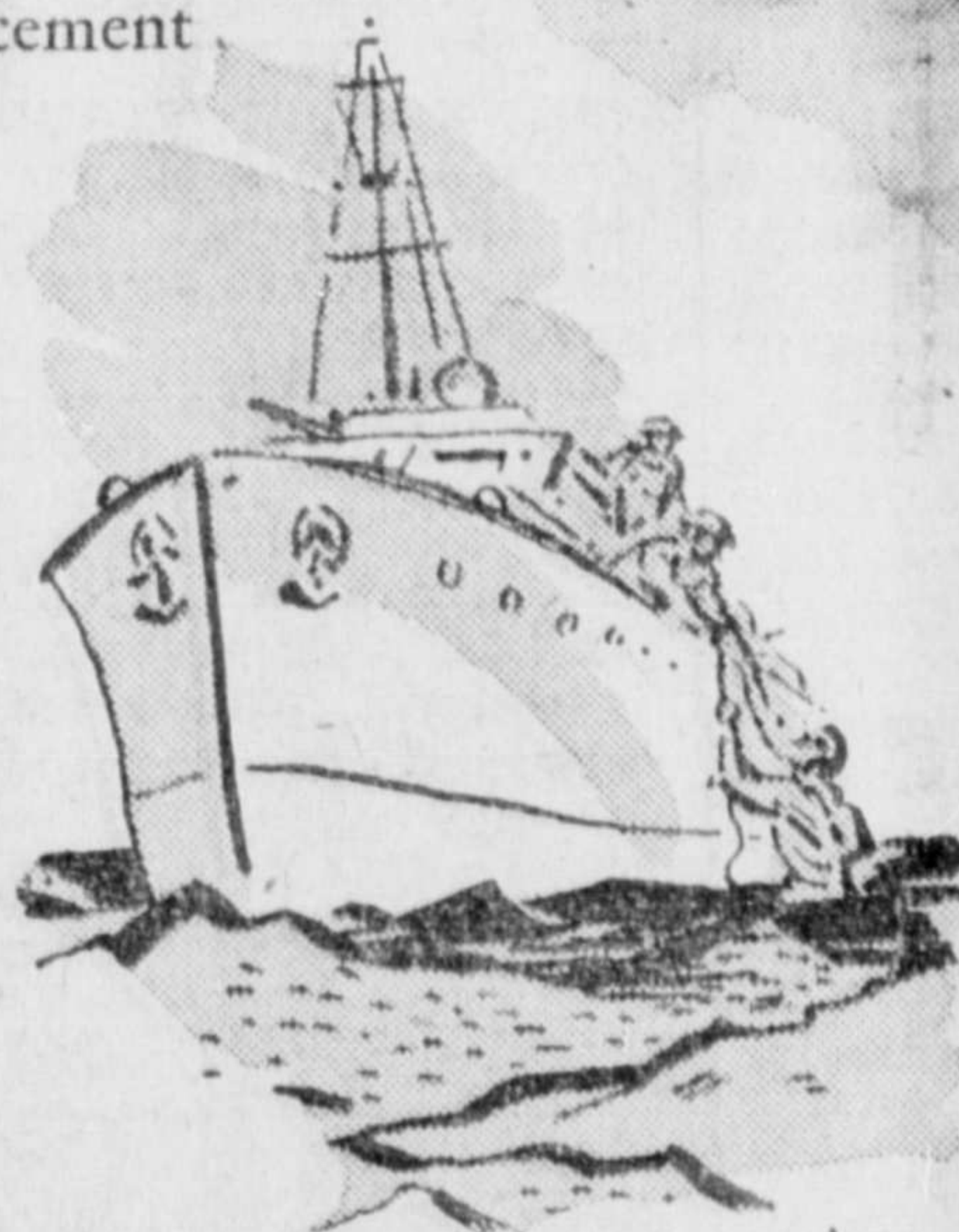

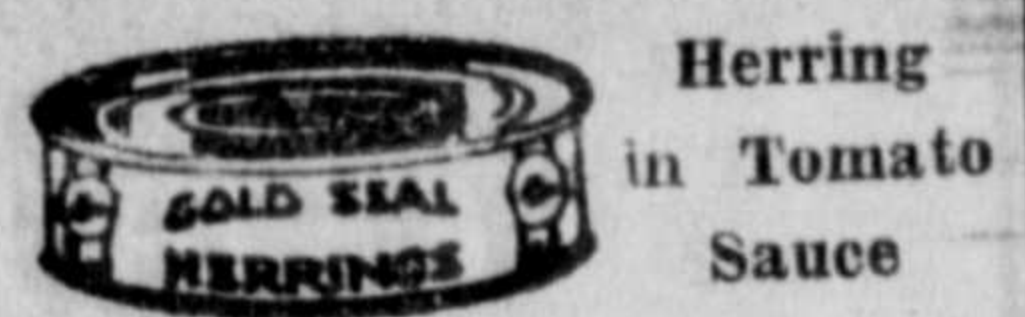

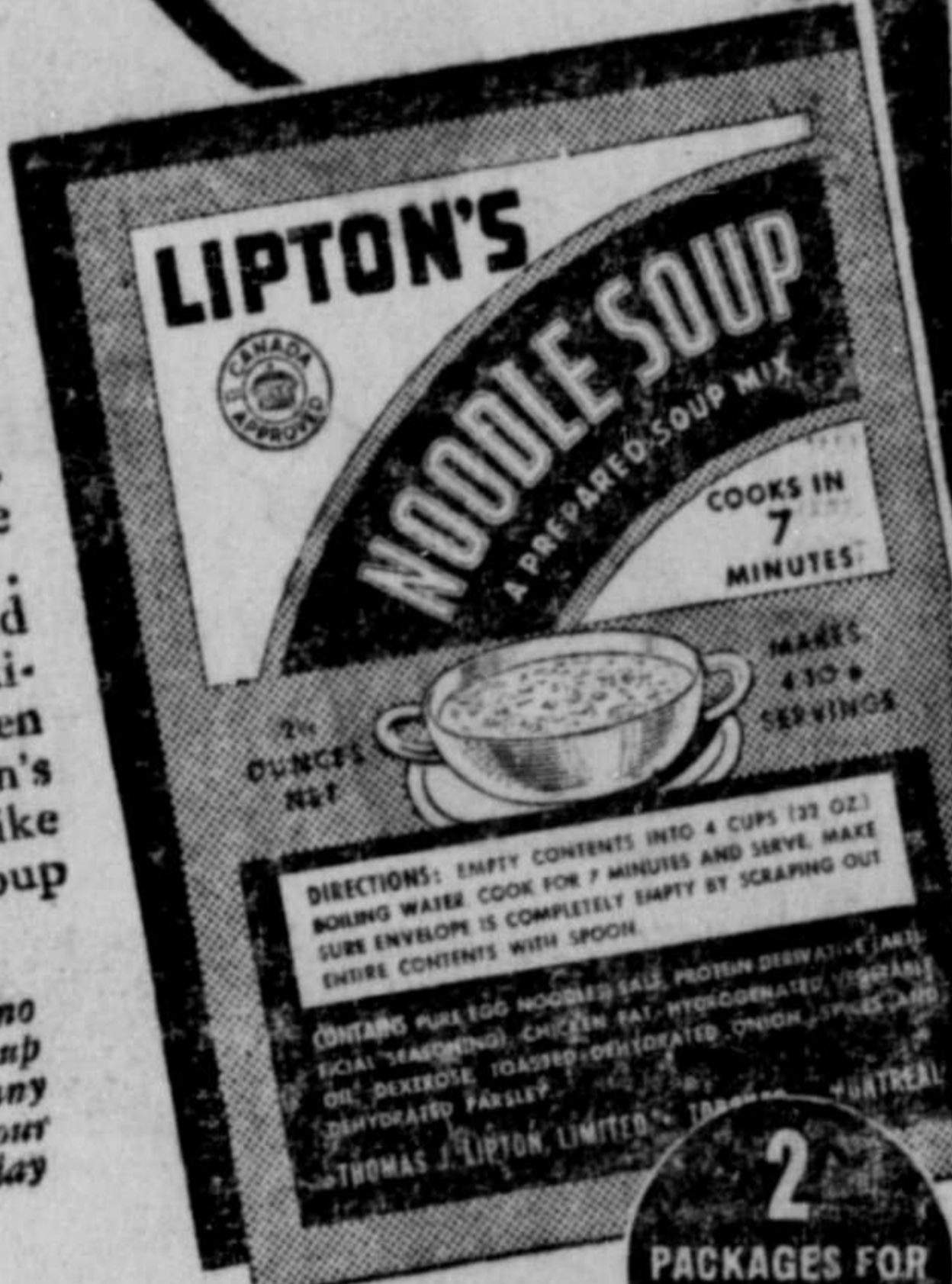

WHAT IS HOME WITHOUT A GARDEN?

All Victory gardens, except those on pronounced slopes which would suffer seriously from the washing away of top soil, should be spaded this fall.

This is especially true of new gardens, where sod is turned over. Thousands of gardeners who struggled with heavy sod last spring learned from experience why it should never be turned over in the spring, to prepare gardens to be cultivated intensively by hand. Better strip the sod and pile it up to decay.

But when turned over in the fall, sod will decay sufficiently to permit spring preparation with much less trouble. The same rule applies to any sort of debris which may be mixed with the soil to decay, especially dead leaves, and fresh manure. Turn them under in the fall, but pile them up in the spring, and keep them out of the soil you expect to plant immediately.

Limestone should be applied in the fall, where needed. It is more often needed than not. It corrects soil acidity, which is harmful to most vegetable crops; and helps to loosen heavy soils, being far more effective for this purpose than sand. As much as 10 pounds to 100 square feet may be applied without danger; and it is beneficial to sandy soils, as well, making them more compact.

Except in areas to be planted immediately with perennial plants, or fall sown seed, the soil should not be leveled this fall, or even clods broken up. Let the surface be as rough as possible, with many little hills and hollows, so that water will be retained, and the soil affected

as much as possible by frost action. Alternate freezing and thawing is fine for heavy soils. One fact well established about plant growth is that plants take from the soil the food they need only in liquid form. So we water our gardens and find that the soil which is retentive of water in just the right way seems to encourage plant growth.

We speak of this quality as the mechanical condition of the soil, and when soil is in good mechanical condition it is known as friable or mellow soil. When taken in the hand it crumbles easily, and while it allows water to run through it quickly it retains water, as a sponge which has been squeezed out still remains moist. Most plants refuse to thrive in a soil which holds too much water, but demand that the soil shall retain just enough.

Heavy soils are made friable by breaking up the cohesion of their particles. This is best accomplished by mixing with them decayed animal or vegetable material, which makes humus. Anything which is decayed or will decay readily is useful, but substances slow to decay should not be mixed with the soil of a cultivated garden. All forms of wood, including shavings, are detrimental. Leaves decay slowly.

Humus is black and colors the soil. Black soil is usually in good mechanical condition, though not necessarily fertile, while some of the most fertile soils are not black and yet are both rich and friable.

Other things than humus are useful in making clay soil friable. Pulverized limestone, wood

TENDERS FOR CEDAR POLE TIMBER ON KITSUMKALUM INDIAN RESERVE NO. 1, SKEENA DISTRICT, B.C.

Sealed tenders addressed to the undersigned and marked on the face of the envelope, "Tender for Kitsumkalum Timber," will be received until 3:00 p.m. on Monday, the 11th day of November, 1943, or the purchase of all cedar poles in the Indian Reserve known as Kitsumkalum No. 1, Skeena District, Province of British Columbia. This reserve contains an area of 1124 acres, more or less, and is intended to create a stand of approximately 150,000 lineal feet of cedar poles, which is offered for sale at an upset price for cedar poles 20 feet and under, of three cents per lineal foot, and for cedar poles over 20 feet, of 3 1/2 cents per lineal foot.

Three years will be allowed in which to complete the cutting and removal of the timber under the provisions of the Indian Timber Regulations. The Indians of the Kitsumkalum Band shall be given the preference by way of employment in the work of cutting and removing the timber, and as far as the disposal of slash and debris is concerned the operator will be required to satisfy the Provincial Forest Service.

Tenders must submit their offer on the form of tender provided for that purpose, the bids indicating the price offered per lineal foot for poles under 20 feet, 21 to 30 feet, 31 to 40 feet and 41 feet or over in length; for railway ties and fence posts per piece, and shingle bolts per cord, and each tender must be accompanied by an accepted cheque on any Canadian chartered bank, for a sum representing a deposit of \$500.00, together with an annual ground rental of \$224.80 and first year's licence fee of \$50.00, such cheque to be made payable to the Receiver General of Canada and to be returnable to the unsuccessful tenderer, the highest or any tender not necessarily accepted.

Should a tender be accepted, the deposit will be held by the Department until the satisfaction of the Minister of the Department of Mines and Resources.
