



Also it is not to be overlooked that German terrorism and plunder throughout the satellite countries in the past four years have produced a more bitter hate for the Reich than in the last war so that subjugated peoples will be ready at the first

opportunity to expel the invaders.

As far as the Germans themselves are concerned, the United Nations bombardment has shown beyond dispute that the European fortress is a much propagandized but an exceedingly vulnerable institution which may be descroyed even while the German military forces are defending faraway frontiers. And as far as conditions and morale within the Reich are concerned, they may be accepted as having become really bad.

Under such conditions, it is not surprising that certain experts maintain that the proper combination of political propaganda and military pressure just now may achieve more decisive results than was imaginable a few months or even weeks ago.

## Task to Feed Europe . . .

The most immediate international problem in the post-war period will be feeding Europe. All reports show that there is terrible starvation everywhere. The first task will be to feed Europe and maintain a semblance of order because when men are hungry they fight and kill.

Now that Italy has fallen it is necessary to keep Italians alive. Soon other countries will have to be Smithers Boys taken care of. ## New Conception Growing . . .

A most striking thing in the world today is the Force. new international conception which is slowly growing up. There is a tendency to gradually evolving common policies on many matters such as trade, forces. transport, communications and native affairs. This is a great evolution in the minds of many although it will take some time before it is generally realized and accepted. Now countries work together in harmony on common principles without seeming to conquer each other or upset local loyalties or languages or methods of administration.


