EDITORIAL Eighth Army Day . . .

Tomorrow has been designated "Eighth Army Day" on which an endeavour will be made to set a record for number and amount of Fourth Victory Bonds purchased in commemoration of the gallant feats of this Army.

Atlee's Statement

General Montgomery's address to his troops should prove an inspiration to all of us for "Eighth Army Day." He said:

"On the 20th of March, in a personal message before we began the battle of Mareth, I told you

the 8th Army would do three things: "1. Deal with the enemy in the Mareth position.

That was done between the 21st and 28th of March and we took 8,000 prisoners.

"2. Burst through the Gabes Gap. That was done on the 6th of April. The enemy was so unwise as to stand to fight us on the Akarit position. He received a tremendous hammering and we took another 7,000 prisoners.

"3. Drive northwards on Sfax, Sousse and finally Tunis. That is now in process of being done; and if we collect in prisoners at the present rate the enemy will soon have no infantry left to hold his positions.

"I also told you if each one of us did his duty and pulled his full weight then nothing could stop us. And nothing has stopped us. "You have given our families at home and in

fact the whole world good news and plenty of it every day. "I want now to express to you, my soldiers,

whatever may be your rank or employment, my grateful thanks for the way in which you responded to my calls and my admiration for your wonderful fighting qualities.

"I doubt if our Empire has ever possessed such a magnificent fighting machine as the 8th Army; you made its name a household word all over the

"I thank each one of you for what you have done. 'I am very proud of my 8th Army.

"On your behalf I sent a message of appreciation to the western desert air force. The brave and brilliant work of the squadrons and the devotion to duty of all pilots made our victories possible in such a short time.

We are all one entity—the 8th Army and the Western Desert Air Force-together constituting one magnificent fighting machine.

"And now let us get on with the third task. "Tet us make the enemy face up to and endure a first class Dunkirk on the beaches of Tunis.

The triumphant cry now is: Forward to Tunis! "Drive the enemy into the sea."

Must be no Jerry-building Labor Party Report Submits to Government in Housing Scheme Suggestions

(Canadian Press Staff Writer) LCNDON, May 13 (P-Houses for ury stores and schools and hospitals must have priority over theatres when post-war rebuilding starts in Britain.

This would involve, the report argued, the requisitioning of large unoccupied houses and reconditioning of existing houses to bring them up to prescribed standards. Other immediate expedients, such as the temporary use of hostels, would also have to be undertaken.

Other suggestions included some form of control of the building industry, continuation of the essential works order and the creation of a fund from which the state would advance, at substantially lower rates than normal, the money required by local authorities for housing purposes.

Stability Essential

Communities must be protected against "jerry building" by private firms, the report said. Building societies must accept liability for defects in houses upon which they have advanced money and the report estimated that about 1,250,000 workers would be needed to carry

Transfer or Replacement of Oil-Burning Equipment Is Prohibited

To every owner of oil-burning equipment:

Under regulations of the Oil Controller, it is not permitted to transfer any oil-burning furnace, boiler, or stove from one location to another. This prohibition does not apply to kerosene stoves used in the home, but kerosene must not be burned in any stove which was not fuelled by kerosene on July 1, 1942.

If oil-burning equipment is worn out or obsolete it must not be replaced with new or second-hand equipment.

Any infraction of this order is subject to severe penalties.

DESERT



VICTORY

By J. V. McAREE

When you see Desert Victory, as you surely will unless willing to miss an extraordinary experience, you will be conscious that for the first time you are looking at a screen play through your own eyes or at least through the eyes of a soldier on the field of battle, instead of through the eyes of a staff of expert movie technicians. There is nothing interposed between the eye of the spectator and the fighting of a series of historic battles. There is no art but the art of the camera involved. That is why the impact of the scenes is so terrific, like a smash in the face. And when you receive a smash in the face no emotions are for the moment perceptible.

> It seems to me that the unique quality of Desert Victory is that there is no emotion on the screen. It must arise in the mind of the beholder. You see men killed, dropping to the earth as suddenly as if their legs had been broken. But you have no time to pause and reflect upon these horrors. The camera has already moved you to another incident. There is nothing gruesome; there is nothing morbid, though the whole thing is a shock, more likely to be felt when it is over than while it is going on. You see no tears, no bodies racked with pain. The close-ups of some of the men waiting for the zero hour at the beginning of the great attack at El Alamein are memorable. They show young soldiers with rigid, almost sombre faces from which all expression but that of a kind of fierce intentness has been wiped. You see them before the beginning of the battle writing their last letters home, the last letter that thousands of them were ever to write. But again the faces are as dispassionate as if they were working out some routine mathematical problem. You see them at the rough play and gymnastic exercises which were part of the training for the advance. There they

name of the Eighth Army high on the roll of all the glorious armies of the world, past and present, and their bearing showed that they knew it. We can forgive them their pride; we can share

were being made into athletes as well as soldiers. You see them lying at ease in the sands the day before the battle while a Highland piper stalks among them. You can imagine what a thrill a professional director would have extracted from this incident. There is no thrill here. The soldiers watch silently, and it would seem indifferently. They are men to many of whom death is near. When you see the men naked except for shorts and boots, gouging trenches out of the flinty desert, their heads swathed in mosquito netting, you get a glimpse of the hardships and annoyances of war, which are probably harder to endure than its dangers. When you see the huge tanks rolling through the seas of sand you think you are the victim of some photographic tricks, that it is simply impossible that these monsters, which appear almost the size of locomotives, should shear through that country as a ship cleaves the waves.

I came away from the showing with no idea clearer in my mind than the terrific material expenditure of war, the prodigality with which millions of pounds worth of ammunition is blown into the air. The thought came that if it had been less prodigal there might have been a different and less happy ending to the advance. This, it seems to me, is the propaganda lesson of Desert Victory, and one that ought to be set before every war worker in every one of the United Nations.

Memorable in another way was the march past in Tripoli. I never saw soldiers march like that. There was in their swing and stance the stride of conquerors. There was a lofty pride in their bearing, and one could almost feel the fierceness in their eyes. Perhaps this was an exception to my impression that on the screen itself no emotion was displayed.

They Pulled Their Weight . . .

Those two simple sentences evoke a question: Are we. thousands of miles away from the horror of battle, knowing little or nothing about the physical impact of war, doing our duty and pulling our full weight?

That question must and should be answered by every individual in this community as he or she considers the meaning of Canada's Fourth Victory Loan. It can be answered in simple terms. There is nothing intricate or: perplexing about it.

They did their duty; they pulled their full weight. And many of them will never see their homes and loved ones again. A little wooden cross will bear mute witness to their sacrifice.

All we are asked to do by our government is to make a profitable investment. What an indictment for those who shirk their duty!



Improved Vegetables

Gardening beginners often make the mistake of asking for varieties that perhaps were popular many years ago, without realizing that there has been vast improvement, and much better kinds are now available. Plant breeders have been steadily turning out better varieties, bigger, earlier and more tender than many of us knew in the old days.

There are beets and carrots that grow more quickly; radishes that are fit to use in a matter of days from the time of seeding; spinach that will not go to seed and become coarse so quickly; peas that will be ready to put in the pot in from 50

to 60 days. All these points are most important, and especially to the beginner or the gardener in parts of Canada where early frosts are all too frequent. These varieties are much too numerous to be mentioned in detail here. The prospective gardener is advised to secure a good seed catalogue or up-to-date government bulletin which lists varieties suitable for the various areas of Canada. Incidentally, all varieties listed in Canadian seed catalogues
