Hamilton in Duty for War

Production of Ontario Industrial Output Increases From 155,000 to 200,000.

Following is one of a Canada Press series outlining the progress of war in Canada. It tells of Hamilton, Ont.

MILTON, Ont., Nov. 26 (CP)—A hail of bullets glanced off the tough skin of a corvette tank, when an anti-aircraft gun roared from the deck destroyer, products of war-Hamilton are doing their bit in the front line.

The city whose pre-war population of 155,000 has grown to 200,000 has been pouring munitions of war for years. Contribution to the cause of the United Nations has been heavy, but it has not been done without heavy strain on the community itself.

After the huge gun plants of the Otis-Fensom Elevator Co. and the Canadian Westinghouse were opened here, thousands of Canadians flocked to this city from other parts of the province causing a housing shortage which has grown steadily more acute.

War-time Housing Ltd., has constructed 950 temporary dwellings and soon will build 300 more. A huge staff building has been erected and a new building for single women was opened early in the year. East of the city in North West, War-time Housing has a model community with a social centre, school and a playground to accommodate war workers.

The immense growth has placed a heavy burden on the transportation system which is being met by the Hydro-Electric Commission of Ontario. The plants rely partly on the coal system of gasoline ranging to permit their staffs to work on time.

Increases in industrial employment have been consistent throughout the city. The big plant of the Steel Company of Canada is working at capacity and a new blast furnace and a new open hearth furnace to be into operation during this month.

Domination Steel and Foundries producing guns and armor. The International Harvester, Hamilton Bridge and scores of other companies are engaged in war work. The "bits and pieces" program has engaged many small concerns and the many knitting mills are working at capacity.

Hamilton's enlistments in the armed forces are included in official figures on Military District No. 2 and there is no accurate record of the number, although the total is estimated at more than 12,000.

The city has found time to do every Victory Loan, Red Cross and charity drive over the years.

Women are playing a leading part in wartime Hamilton. The munitions factories are filled with girls in overalls and uniforms who have replaced their fathers and fathers at the machines. There are women taxi drivers, women bread wagon drivers, women bell boys in the hotels and girl messengers.

FORMOSA BOMBING

Allied Planes Said by Tokyo to Have Made Attack on Important Island

TOKYO, Nov. 26—It is announced here that twenty Allied planes bombed the island of Formosa and three of them were shot down. Formosa is off the south China coast and was used by the Japanese as their springboard against the Philippines.

There was no confirmation in Allied quarters of the bombing of Formosa although it was announced that New Guinea, New Britain, Bougainville and the Marshall Islands had been air attacked.

POSITIONS IMPROVED

Eighth Army Continuing to Give Good Account of Itself—Fifth Army Static

ALGIERS, Nov. 26 (CP)—The British Eighth Army has improved its positions in the new bridgehead across the Sangro River near the Adriatic shore. Allied headquarters announced Friday.

Supporting ground forces. Allied aircraft destroyed motor transport and enemy guns in the coast sector just above the bridgehead.

Bisk activity was reported inland where other Eighth Army units captured some high ground dominating Castel Disangro from the northwest.

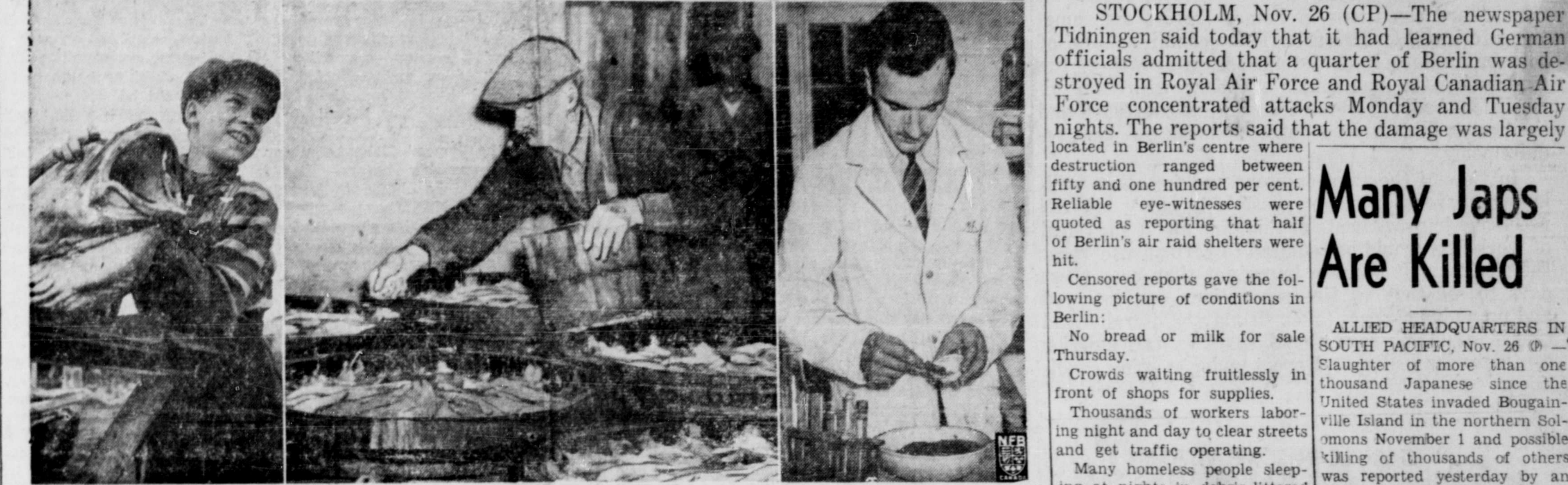
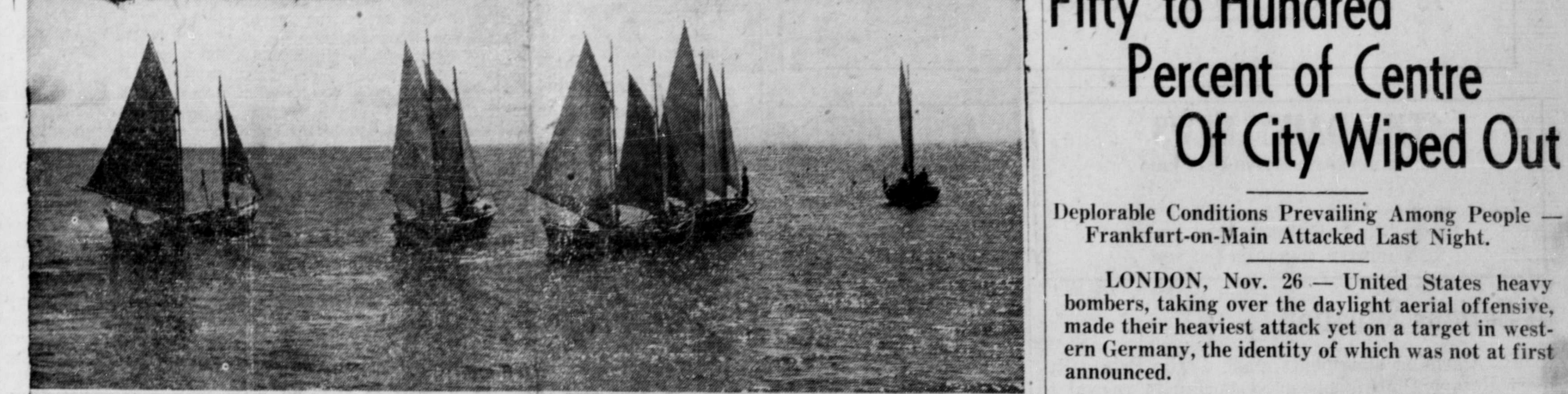

CANADIAN COD FISHERMEN REAP VITAL WARTIME HARVEST



From the picturesque shores of the Gaspé Peninsula, flotillas of graceful fishing schooners daily put out to sea carrying more than 3,500 fishermen to their rugged jobs. These men annually bring in catches totalling more than 35 million pounds of cod fish to swell the food and medical supplies of the United Nations. Cod is dried and cured for overseas shipment, thus saving valuable cargo space, while the livers yield precious vitamin-rich oil. Some of the 1,800 boats used during the fishing season, which lasts from June through November, are shown at sea in the top photo. A young fisherman displays a prize catch at lower left. Lower centre photo shows cod filets being cured with salt in huge barrels. Chemist at right is preparing cod livers, from which 75,000 gallons of cod liver oil are produced annually. Fifty to Hundred Percent of Centre Of City Wiped Out

Deplorable Conditions Prevailing Among People — Frankfurt-on-Main Attacked Last Night.

LONDON, Nov. 26 — United States heavy bombers, taking over the daylight aerial offensive, made their heaviest attack yet on a target in western Germany, the identity of which was not at first announced.

STOCKHOLM, Nov. 26 (CP)—The newspaper Tidningen said today that it had learned German officials admitted that a quarter of Berlin was destroyed in Royal Air Force and Royal Canadian Air Force concentrated attacks Monday and Tuesday nights. The reports said that the damage was largely located in Berlin's centre where destruction ranged between fifty and one hundred per cent. Reliable eye-witnesses were quoted as reporting that half of Berlin's air raid shelters were hit.

Censored reports gave the following picture of conditions in Berlin:

No bread or milk for sale Thursday.

Crowds waiting fruitlessly in front of shops for supplies.

Thousands of workers laboring night and day to clear streets and get traffic operating.

Many homeless people sleeping at night in debris-littered streets.

Firemen so busy they have been unable to dig into ruined air raid shelters for bodies.

Last Night's Attacks
British Royal Air Force and Royal Canadian Air Force heavy bombers hammered at Frankfurt-on-Main Thursday night as Mosquito bombers stabbed at Berlin to set air raid sirens howling in the battered German capital for the fourth consecutive night. Bad weather prevented accurate observation of the results. Thirteen aircraft were lost in the night's operations which included placing of mines in enemy waters.

American heavy bombers were attacking targets in north-west Germany today.

Meanwhile Air Marshal Harris, chief of the Royal Air Force bomber command, declared that the Battle of Berlin will continue until the head of Germany ceases to exist.

A few Nazi raiders flew over the southeast and Essex coast Thursday night dropping bombs at several points but causing little damage.

Many Japs Are Killed

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN SOUTH PACIFIC, Nov. 26 (CP)—Slaughter of more than one thousand Japanese since the United States invaded Bougainville Island in the northern Solomons November 1 and possible killing of thousands of others was reported yesterday by an American naval spokesman.

At the same time Allied headquarters announced that Japanese counter-attacks had been repulsed both against the beachhead at Empress Augusta Bay on Bougainville and Sattelert, plateau position in northeastern New Guinea jungles against which the Australians are moving from three sides.

Disciplining Of General

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26 (CP)—Responsibility for disciplining General Patton for striking an enlisted man in a fit of anger was placed on General Dwight Eisenhower by War Secretary Henry L. Stimson yesterday. Stimson said that the department's policy was to select the best possible theatre commander and then give that commander a free hand and full authority.

LONDON, Nov. 26 (CP)—Germany is massing troops near the Greek border as guerrilla fighting increases, reports reaching London said last night.

Turkish Minister Is Coming

OTTAWA, Nov. 26—Arrangements have been made for the opening of a Turkish legation in Ottawa. A member of the Turkish legation staff at Washington is coming to assume the post of minister.

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN SOUTH PACIFIC, Nov. 26—United States submarines have sunk seven more Japanese freighters as well as an airplane transport and a tanker.

Gomel Has Been Taken

LONDON, Nov. 26 (CP)—Following unofficial reports from Moscow to Sweden that Gomel had fallen to the Red Army, Berlin radio today admitted evacuation of that important Russian city. Moscow announced that 180 towns had been taken and twenty thousand Germans killed in new fighting north of Gomel where the Red Army has torn a gap of 37 miles in the Nazi lines.

Gomel is a key bastion in white Russia and was the only important town still held by the Germans east of the Dnieper River. It has important railway lines running in all directions.

Double Drowning in Skeena River While Soldiers Are Engaged in Training

Two soldiers, while engaged in training, were drowned in the Skeena River near the bridge at Terrace on Wednesday, according to word reaching the city. Names and details of the tragedy were not available at police headquarters. The bodies were recovered by dragging.

After a year or so of strict observation Freddy Grant was released by permission of the federal government. He has since done his part in the war effort in writing music for two major Canadian shows.
