He was committed for trial by Magistrate W. D. Vance in city police court yesterday.

According to Sergeant Edward Albert McBrien R. C. A. F. who testified that he had rushed down to the hotel lobby from an upstairs room when he heard the fight begin, the first thing the accused said when quiet had

"Is anybody hurt?"

McBrien said that he had been asked by Constable Turtle of the city police to keep an eye on Cooper following the fight while Turtle used the telephone. Although Cooper received no answer to his first question he continued to ask


