

## CANADA CONTINUES GROWTH ALL THROUGH PAST

Dominion's Status Enhanced as Canada May Major Roles in World Fields of War, Commerce And Diplomacy.

OTTAWA, Dec. 23 (CP)—Canada's place among United Nations has been pointed up during 1943 developments in the fields of war, commerce and diplomacy. Here are some of the year's highlights in the Dominion's growth as a nation:

Canada's armed forces in

Provision of \$1,000,000,000 "mutual aid" to nations lacking enough Canadian dollars to meet their needs for Canadian munitions and foodstuffs; with mutual aid agreements completed with several nations and more agreements pending.

Increase in Canada's diplomatic missions abroad and establishment of additional foreign missions here; elevation of the Canadian legations in United States, the Soviet Union, China and Brazil to embassy status and similar action in those countries.

Holding at Quebec last

part of one of the Churchillian war conferences.

Establishment of a new decoration—the Canada Medal—which to honor Britons and foreigners, as well as Canadians.

**Widespread Activity**

Canadian participation in the Italy and Italy campaigns, in joint occupation with United States forces of Kiska in the Aleutians, in the vast air bombardment of Hitler's Europe and the never-ending struggle against the U-boat brought pride to the Canadians during 1943—and appreciation from the people of the United Nations.

The population of these countries (receiving mutual aid) will remember that Canada

## Nazi Sense of Justice . . .

Nazi Germany announces that she will wreak her digibically conceived vengeance upon Anglo-American prisoners of war in reprisal for the execution of captured members of the Gestapo who had committed atrocities against the Russians at Kharkov. Such action would, of course, be typical of the perverted Nazi minds and could be expected.

Indeed, we wonder why the Germans even go to the trouble of trying to justify such action by explaining that the British and Americans are jointly responsible with the Russians because of policy decided upon at the Teheran Conference. Of course, the Germans do not know anything about what policies were set up at the Teheran Conference and an excuse of this nature is but pretence.

By this time we should have come to the conclusion that the Nazis have no respect for any so-called international rules of warfare. So we should not be surprised if the Germans now vent their wrath upon Britons and Americans whether or not they might have been jointly responsible.

## Teen-Age Hysteria . . .

A year or two ago Frank Sinatra was a crooner among thousands of other crooners that no one knew much about. Today, his name is synonymous with screaming teen-age girls who are said to swoon at the sound of his voice.

Lately America has become Sinatra-conscious. Not that the young singer is the musical discovery of the age but because his career has been cleverly managed by a professional promoter playing upon the emotionalism of young girls.

The agent is quoted as admitting the idea occurred to him when a girl beside whom he was sitting in a theatre began to moan softly to herself as the crooner sang. The agent asked why she did so, and she replied that such music always made her feel that way.

The next day there were more young women present to moan during the Sinatra performance. Yielding thoughtlessly or ignorantly to the power of this suggestion, thousands of young girls react accordingly.

What is needed is more of the attitude of the 1,400 Waves in the United States who remained fully conscious through the Sinatra performance, applauded politely at the end, and left with the situation well in hand.



Suspense-Packed Spy Picture  
Has New York Locale.

Modern New York City is the scene of a ruthless, deadly matching of wits and courage between one American and many Nazi agents in "The Fallen Sparrow", film thriller starring Maureen O'Hara and John Garfield which comes to the Capital theatre this Friday and Saturday.

The action pictured is the aftermath of a young American's adventures in the Spanish civil war, and subsequent imprisonment of torture by Nazis who fail to pry a secret from him by direct means. The New York action represents their resort to even more terrifying, but subtler methods.

Partly by making hard-boiled love to Miss O'Hara and two other beautiful women, Martha O'Driscoll and Patricia Morrison, Garfield is finally in a position to outwit his enemies and avenge ruthlessly his own wrongs and the murder of two of his friends.
