In the history of the British Empire, 1867, is a most significant date. Canada was the first of Britain's colonies to become self-governing, the first to work for and win responsible government. It was not until 33 years later that a former colony became another self-governing unit within the Empire. In 1900 Australia by an act of the Imperial Parliament was given complete self-government within its own boundaries. Similar status was granted to New Zealand in 1907, South Africa in 1909 and Eire became a "sovereign, independent democratic" state in 1937.

The high hopes for the future which Canada's Confederation raised have been more than realized. Population in 1867 was 3,500,000 with only 100,000 west of the Great Lakes. The 1941 census figures show population as 11,506,655 with 3,255,950 west of the Great Lakes. In 1867 there were nine cities of over 10,000; today there are 77. In the development of natural resources, the growth of agriculture and lumbering, and the expansion of industry the figures are even more impressive than those of population

On the basis of reports by the Imperial Conferences of 1926 and 1930, the Statute of Westminster was formulated in 1931. To a certain extent the document was merely a formal statement of practices and customs which had existed for a number of years in the conduct of Imperial relations. It has been called the new Magna Charta of British Imperial Unity.

Based on mutual confidence, it attaches the dominions to the spirit of the Empire; it confers upon them equality of status, completely free from subordination one to another in any respect of their domestic or external affairs;; they are united by a common allegiance to the Crown and are freely associated as members of the British Commonwealth of Nations.


