

Naples Is Captured By Fifth Army

Next Objective Is To Free Rome, Vatican and Pope, Roosevelt States

Advance on Historic Capital City Will Continue But Efforts Will Be Made to Prevent Its Destruction

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, Oct. 1 (CP) — Anglo-American Fifth Army today captured Naples, Italy's third greatest city, and threw the Nazis back on the defences of Rome, 120 air miles north. A special communique from Allied headquarters indicated that the Germans were engaged in a full scale withdrawal from Naples region under slashing attack by Allied warplanes.

PRIORITIES ON COAL
OTTAWA—The Department of Munitions and Supply announced Thursday night that, to assure the most equitable distribution of available coal supplies, dealers must now give to consumers who have less than one-quarter of their annual fuel requirements on hand priority on deliveries up to that one-quarter. The regulations apply only to consumers who use less than fifty tons of coal yearly.

LONDON—The Admiralty announces the loss of the corvette H.M.S. Polyanthus. The sinking occurred in the Atlantic, it is believed.

FISHING IS SUPERFINE
Local Anglers Have Great Sport With Rainbow at Babine—Also Bag Moose

Evidently there never was trout fishing just as fine as that which was enjoyed by a party consisting of Dr. R. G. Large, Flight Lieutenant (Dr.) Alfred Large and W. J. Scott which returned home last night from Babine Lake. This morning they were proudly exhibiting great rainbows running as high as four-and-a-half pounds in weight caught at Fifteen-Mile Creek where the pools were abounding with just such fish. The trout were caught with Silver Doctor flies and the sport in landing them was unsurpassed.

The party also met up with a bull moose and, after the smoke of a fusillade had cleared, the animal lay dead in the swamp, supposedly having had a broken blood vessel.

Earlier Allied troops, sweeping wide around Mount Vesuvius, captured the key road hub of Avellino, 30 miles due east of Naples, and seized Torreannunziata, nine miles south of Naples.

A German broadcast today attempted to alibi Nazi burning and pillaging of Naples as a work of "communist looters" but refugee-searching Allied lines had told eye-witness stories of Naples transformed into a scene of horror by Nazi dynamite crews and machine gun squads which ruthlessly shot down women and children.

Meanwhile it was reported at Washington that the Allies will recognize the government of Marshal Badoglio and King Victor Emmanuel and launch a campaign to rally the Italian people against the Nazi-fostered Fascist republic of Benito Mussolini.

President Franklin D. Roosevelt said today that the objective of Allied forces in Italy is to free Rome, the Vatican and the Pope while avoiding all possible destruction.

The President, reporting the fall of Naples, said the advance toward Rome will continue and every effort is being made by the Allies to prevent damage to Rome and the Vatican. They are doing everything possible to prevent active fighting leading to destruction in Rome, the President said.

GENERALS CHANGED

Potts Going From East Coast to Toronto and Ganong From Here to Atlantic.

OTTAWA, Oct. 1—Important changes in high Canadian Army commands are announced. Major General Arthur Potts, general officer commanding, Sixth Division, assumes command of Military District No. 2 with headquarters in Toronto. Major General Hardy Nelson Ganong, commanding officer of the Eighth Division in British Columbia, takes over the reorganized Sixth Division on the Atlantic coast.

Bought Liquor From Soldier

Hazelton Route to Alaska Again Brought to Fore

Plan of Burns Lake Man Endorsed "Mystery" As to Why Project Has Been Side-Track

Hazelton and Smithers Chambers of Commerce strongly endorsed a report prepared by Walter Burns Lake setting forth the advantages of the Hazelton route northward for an Alaska highway.

The Smithers District Chamber of Commerce has as follows: "It is a mystery of the people of Northern British Columbia, the people in the Panhandle of Alaska as well as to the people of Alaska as to why, in all reports that have been submitted, this route has been more or less set aside, when it is a well known fact that there is less snowfall, less rock work, less swamp land and fewer engineering problems along its length than along any other projected route."

"It opens up a country that has vast mining and agricultural resources as well as having a scenic value unsurpassed anywhere on the continent. "The present Alaska Highway in itself does not affect or help the Interior of Northern British Columbia but the eight hundred miles of highway from Vancouver to Hazelton directly affects all residents along the way. With the highway from Hazelton to Prince Rupert, which will be completed within the year, combined with a highway from Hazelton to Alaska, a great and very real need of the province will be fulfilled. Incidentally the people living between Prince George and Prince Rupert and who comprise the bulk of the people living in Northern Central British Columbia will be encouraged to remain and will have a real incentive toward the future development.

"From a military and economic point of view, its proximity to the coast makes feeder roads from the coastal cities a minor problem." "The Hazelton route would be of immense tactical advantage both to the United States and Canada. With its possibilities no other projected or proposed route can stand comparison. The grades are easy throughout, there is practically no rock work nor are there any engineering problems of moment and the ground is firm and suitable for rail or highway.

"The Groundhog, a vast coal field within easy reach of Prince Rupert, can produce coal which will compare favorably with the best that Pennsylvania has produced. Three or four connections from this highway could be made with the coast.

Only One Survivor as Canadian Navy Loses Its Thirteenth Vessel

Prime Minister's Nephew and Namesake is One of 146 Men Who Lost Lives—New and More Deadly Torpedo is Being Used

OTTAWA, Oct. 1 (CP)— Loss of the Canadian destroyer St. Croix with 146 men was announced Friday by Minister of the Navy Angus Macdonald. She was torpedoed September 22 while on convoy duty in the Atlantic and only one of her complement, Stoker W. A. Fisher of Black Diamond, Alberta, escaped.

The St. Croix was one of seven United States destroyers turned over to the Canadian Navy after the fifty-destroyer exchange for naval bases between Great Britain and the United States. It is the thirteenth Canadian naval vessel lost in this war.

The St. Croix was under command of Lieutenant Commander Andrew H. Dobson, aged 42, of Halifax.

The toll of 146 missing was the Navy's largest single loss in men. Among those missing was Lieut. William Lyon Mackenzie King, nephew and namesake of Prime Minister King. Fifteen British Columbia men were among the missing but none were from the Prince Rupert area.

To Set Up New Branch

With an increasing amount of its membership coming from the west end of the city, the Housewives League in session earlier this week decided to organize a second branch of their organization in the west end. The establishment of a second branch would necessitate the setting up of a central executive committee whose membership would be elected from both branches, and whose authority would be their guiding influence. A meeting place for the new branch has not yet been obtained.

The matter of appointing a liaison officer to deal with the Wartime Prices and Trade Board was also sounded out at the meeting.

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Fighters—And Potential Voters ...

The U.S. presidential election in 1944 promises to be one of the most interesting and significant in the American history for two reasons: The Fourth Term issue and the fact that, for the first time a block of votes will exist outside the States, big enough to decide a close contest.

By voting time next year, the American overseas soldier vote may run as high as 4 to 5 million, from a total armed force of 11,300,000 Mr. Roosevelt's popular vote pluralities in '32, '36, and '40, were respectively 7,060,016, 10,797,090 and 4,938,711; so the importance of the armed force vote both in the States and overseas is evident.

A new kind of political campaign on a huge scale is in the offing. Issues of the election will have to be carried literally to the ends of the earth.

Control of the mediums, the radio and the press, by which servicemen get their news is in the hands of the government. Already the Republican opposition is charging that the Democratic Government is carefully protecting the Armed Forces from politics—particularly Republican politics.

To the millions of Americans fighting for Democracy, important rights are involved, not only the right of the fighters to vote, but their equally important right to a fair hearing of both sides of the campaign.

Canadians will watch the election with keen friendly interest mainly because President Roosevelt is immensely popular in Canada, but also because the American handling of the overseas vote will offer useful experience for the next Federal campaign in Canada, due any time within the next two years.

The Liberation of Corsica ...

To most of us the invasion of Corsica is just another Mediterranean island operation. But to the French it is much more. It is the first step in the liberation of France, and it is being conducted by French troops, with some Italian support and the frenzied co-operation of the inhabitants of the island.

Allied political strategy in the Mediterranean area may have slipped a few cogs from time to time. But entrusting the liberation of Corsica to the troops and ships of Gen. Giraud was sheer inspiration of the highest order. The French are a proud people. They have never quite figured out what happened in 1940 when their army, which they had been told was the finest in the world—an opinion shared by many alleged military experts in other lands—melted like the snows in spring before the German blitzkrieg. Now they are having an opportunity for revenge—revanche they call it. Nothing could be sweeter, except perhaps driving the hated Nazis from their beloved Paris. It is no surprise to learn that no German prisoners are being taken.

Corsica has another special meaning to the French. It is the birthplace of Napoleon. Opinions about the Little Corporal have varied from time to time, but he is still a great national hero to Frenchmen. He is also a hero to the Italians, who claim that he really belonged to their race. Perhaps a common effort in the liberation of Napoleon's homeland may bring together the two great Latin peoples whose separation was one of Mussolini's blackest crimes.

Naples Is Near Fall

LONDON, Oct. 1—Official word of the fall of Naples is expected at any time now. Allied forces are already fighting on the outskirts. With British tanks reported to be driving in as the Germans move out, the Nazis are in general but orderly retreat. The enemy will, it is expected, take up new positions north of Naples.

The London Evening News says that there has been naval bombardment of Naples. After Naples, Rome, 130 miles to the north, will be the next Allied objective.

NEW SCHEDULE PRESERVES RATIONING
 EFFECTIVE SEPTEMBER 30, 1943

Preserves rationing gives the consumer a number of choices both of products and sizes of containers. Because of the wide range of container sizes and the variation in buying habits across the country it was necessary to put the system into operation and then make adjustments on the basis of experience.

Now that preserves rationing has been in effect for several weeks, it is possible to make some increases in coupon values. The new schedule is announced below and is effective September 30th.

The new doubled ration allowances for molasses, extracted and comb honey will enable consumers in areas where consumption of these products is heavy, to buy more and still have enough for districts where the total demand is light.

The increased ration allowances for corn, cane and blended table syrups and maple syrup are adjusted to bring coupon values more closely into line with the great variety of container sizes now in use.
