SCHOOL BOMBED; CHILDREN PERISH

Daylight Raiders Over London; One of War's Bad Civilian Disasters

Some of Victims Killed Outright and Others Buried—Only Eleven Children and One Teacher Escaped

LONDON, Jan. 21 (CP)—The known death toll in a London school which was smashed by a German bomb yesterday was raised to forty-four today after rescue workers worked through the night in the debris. Three teachers were among the killed. The rest were children. Fifty others are reported injured.

IN NORTH AFRICA—

TRIPOLI IS NEAR FALL TO BRITISH

Tommy's Bay in Sight of It Today—Rommel is Still in Bay Way

LONDON, Jan. 21 (CP)—The British Eighth Army, with a fighting French desert column on its left flank, pushed Marsal Erwin Rommel's hard-pressed rear guard down the coastward slope from Nefusa Ridge to probably within 35 miles of Tripoli today in continuing advance past the village of Tarhuna and the coastal town of Homs.

Occupation yesterday of the towns of Tarhuna and Homs was announced in today's Cairo communique and it was thought possible the British forces might have reached the outskirts of Tripoli.

The Cairo communique said that General Montgomery's forces had pushed on "in close contact with the enemy retreating in the west."

The Fighting French, moving northward from Lake Chad in Equatorial Africa, have joined forces with the British Eighth Army closing in on Tripoli, it was announced last night. They are attacking on the left of the British flank. Twin British columns pushing toward Tripoli were reported last night to be within forty and sixty miles respectively of the bomb-battered Libyan capital.

Under steadily mounting aerial assault the Axis withdrawal showed signs of disorganization but informed sources said there was no authoritative indication that bomb-battered Tripoli was being evacuated.

West of Tripoli Allied bombers were causing havoc to Axis forces while naval vessels were on hand to meet any evacuation move.

Meanwhile the British Admiralty announced the sinking of fourteen Axis vessels in the Mediterranean during the first three days of this week.

On the Tunisian land front, where it was suggested new Axis offensive thrusts might be intended to hold open a corridor for Rommel's withdrawal, Axis troops made a new advance against French positions southwest of Point Du Fahs.

"ALL IN THE FRONT LINE"

LONDON, Jan. 21 (CP)—List of civilian victims of the war are to be placed in Westminster Abbey with service names after the war—the first volumes contain 42,000 civilian names covering the Battle of Britain are being completed.

A report of Dr. R. J. MacDonald, medical inspector of schools, is being awaited by the school board. Dr. MacDonald has been out of the city for the past couple of weeks.

The visit which caused the destruction of the school was carried out by rooftop raiders of the Luftwaffe. In addition to the children that were killed outright, others were buried beyond hope of life in the swift but small scale attack on London. Only eleven children and one teacher emerged from the building alive.

In addition sixteen children and nine women were killed by bombs which smashed into houses.

Fourteen raiders were shot down by the Royal Air Force and the Royal Canadian Air Force which lost two planes.

Enemy raiders were over London again as rescue work was being carried out. One was shot down today.

There was also a raid on a southeast coast town and two of the German planes were brought down.

New School Is Required

Large Increase of School Population in East End—Opening New Room at King Edward

The board of school trustees is moving to immediately open an additional teaching division at King Edward School because of overcrowding there. Mrs. Avery has been appointed to take charge of the new room which will be in the annex building to the school and which will be opened as soon as the necessary arrangements for its use can be made. The school committee was delegated at last night's meeting of the school board to make these arrangements.

A report from Trustee E. J. Smith advised the board that, at the present time, one room in King Edward School had sixty pupils and another fifty-one, the other classes also being full to capacity.

The same report advised the board that, when some 200 new Wartime Housing houses are completed in that area, it may be necessary to open three or four more classrooms in the east end. This would bring up the necessity of obtaining a new school building which should be taken up with the city council. The suggestion was made that Wartime Housing might build this new school, particularly since it was due to unnatural industrial activity that the increased school population was developing and, further, that the terms of agreement with Wartime Housing for property did not call for the payment of sufficient taxes to meet the costs. This will be one of the matters to be taken up at the conference of the city with Wartime Housing officials this Saturday night.

There is no overcrowding problem at Booth Memorial or Borden Street Schools.

THREATENS KHARKOV

Soviet Columns Are Still Sweeping On Against Germans in Southern Ukraine and on All Fronts

MOSCOW, Jan. 21 (CP)—Red Army troops are now driving fifty miles into the Ukraine and are reported forging a new pincer threat to the big steel city of Kharkov after a seventeen-mile advance to the southeast.

Other Soviet columns are reported sweeping through the southeastern Ukraine toward the Sea of Azov in a move to close a steel arc around Rostov, fall of which would cut off escape corridor of perhaps 60,000 Axis troops in southern Russia.

The Russians are now within fifty miles of Rostov and 94 miles from Kharkov.

During the past six weeks the Nazis have suffered 750,000 casualties.

On all fronts there is no let-up in the Red Army drive.

SHOOTING IS URGED

Major R. G. Pickrell Gives Talk And Demonstration To GYRO Club

"Think of the difference it would make to a nation if all its men and women could handle a rifle or pistol effectively," commented Major R. G. Pickrell, former revolver champion, before the Prince Rupert GYRO Club at luncheon yesterday.

"Think of the defence your own city of Prince Rupert would have if everyone over 17, men and women, could not only operate a weapon but had the confident knowledge that they could use it with deadly effect against any enemy who dared to land here.

I am sure the Japs, who are not good shooting nation, would certainly take note of the fact that they had to fight not only the armed forces but a tough hard-hitting civilian population before embarking on any expedition. One of the reasons the Germans have stayed their hand against the Swiss is because every man and woman in Switzerland can shoot and shoot well.

"Also think of the high standard of morale that would exist with the knowledge that you and your neighbor were self-reliant and able to play your part in an emergency.

"Shooting will do more than anything else to make our people cleaner living, more sober and reliable citizens than anything else. You try it.

COL. RALSTON HURT

OTTAWA—Defence headquarters, in a statement Wednesday night, said that Defence Minister Ralston and Lieut. Col. George S. Currie, deputy minister, "suffered painful injuries" when a car they were riding into an airport rammed into the rear of a snow plow. The statement added: "There is no likelihood of serious complications." Col. Ralston suffered a fractured wrist and cuts. Col. Currie received head and face injuries.

EDMONTON—A serious fuel shortage threatens western Canada. Edmonton people, many of them, are down to the last bucket of coal with temperature at 40 below. In Calgary and Brandon the situation is serious. Flin Flon is having the coldest weather on record.

Value of School Buildings Here

Total for Buildings for Insurance Purposes is Placed at \$150,693 In Report

School building property in the city is estimated at a total of \$150,693 for purposes of insurance carried in blanket policies, according to a report presented to the school board at its meeting last night by Trustee E. J. Smith who had been delegated to make such a report.

Salaries Of Teachers In Consideration

In speaking of a report which he is preparing on the question of teachers' salaries in Prince Rupert, Trustee J. T. Langridge told the board of school trustees at its meeting last night that salaries in Prince Rupert compare favorably with those of schools in other places of the same size.

Mr. Langridge told the board that he was to have a meeting with the executive of the Prince Rupert Teachers' Federation on the subject of salaries.

The board was advised in a communication from the Superintendent of Education that the government was contributing \$631 per year to the salaries of High School teachers, \$606 to Junior High School teachers and \$489 to elementary school teachers.

The desirability of putting in fifty more chairs in the music room of King Edward School as well as more tables and chairs in the lunchroom came up at the meeting of the school board last night and will be dealt with further in connection with the consideration of estimates for the year.

Heavy List and Strong Riptide Caused Vessel to go Down—Only First Officer and One Man Saved—Some Died in Boats

VANCOUVER, Jan. 21 (CP)—Two seamen are recovering in Port Alice Hospital today—the lone survivors of the 150-foot coastal steamer Northholm which sank off the west coast of Vancouver Island last Saturday with loss of fifteen members of the crew. Reports from the provincial police at Port Alice said that a heavy list and strong riptide caused the ship to founder.

First Officer Ray Perry and A. Henry Gerbrandt, survivors, were taken to Port Alice where the Northholm left early Saturday on her ill-fated trip which was to have brought here here. The two were found by a trapper after they had made their way ashore in the only life-boat launched. Of six others who escaped in the boat two were washed away and four others were dead when the boat reached shore.

The crew prepared to abandon ship when the tide rip sent water cascading over the starboard rail, making the vessel unmanageable, but they were unable to launch the port lifeboat and nine were carried down with the ship.

The Northholm, which belonged to the Frank Waterhouse Line, controlled by the Union Steamship Co., was very well known as a visitor to Prince Rupert for many years.

The Northholm was built in 1924 in Bristol, England, and was registered out of Vancouver. She was 150 feet long, 25 feet beam and eleven feet in draft. Her gross tonnage was 447 and registered 229.
