Nazis Facing Another Disaster

Canadians Take Part in Raid On Italy

Germany and France Also Included Last Night In Big Attack

Described as One of Most Powerful Air Operations of War—Turin, Lorient and Ruhr Objectives Are Hit

LONDON, Feb. 5 (CP)—The Royal Air Force and the Royal Canadian Air Force joined last night for one of the most powerful operations of the war, spreading destruction over Axis centres in Germany, Italy and France with loss of only three big bombers. Royal Canadian Air Force bombers were in a force that smashed at Turin in northern Italy and the submarine base of Lorient in France while other Royal Air Force raiders hammered simultaneously at the northern Italian naval base of Spezia and industrial targets in the Ruhr.

LONDON, Feb. 5—The note issued by the Spanish embassy in Rio de Janeiro denying that Chancellor Adolf Hitler of Germany was planning a peace offer through the Spanish government has occasioned some surprise since it was the first official attention given to such rumors by any country.

New Modern School Building In Vicinity of McBride St. Plan of Former Inspector

From the school records in the City Hall Mrs. J. A. Rutherford, secretary of the board of school trustees, has just dug up a hitherto unpublished survey of the local school accommodation situation which was made by Alex Turnbull, former school inspector here, who left the city for another inspectorate last summer. It is an interesting

document which, among other things, found that all the present elementary school buildings in Prince Rupert had just about come to a state structurally where they would have to be replaced before long by new ones.

Mr. Turnbull recommended that Booth Memorial School be converted from high to elementary school purposes and that a new eighteen-room school for senior and junior high school purposes be built in the vicinity of McBride Street, possibly embodying the features of a civic centre.

It was left to the chairman and treasurer to conclude any business of the committee which might remain outstanding.

Even this year the school board contemplates that it may be necessary to add two teachers to High School staff and six to public school if the rate of school population increases as anticipated due to the arrival of new industrial families here. The increase is all in the east end.

EDITORIAL

Pay-As-You-Earn Taxes...

Interest is growing rapidly in proposals for putting the income tax system of both Canada and the United States on a pay-as-you-earn basis.

While in 1941 approximately 300,000 people in Canada to approximately 1,000,000, the great majority of whom to approximately 1,000,000, the great majority of whom earn less than \$2,500 a year.

The pay-as-you-earn plan or pay-as-you-go plan, whichever you like to call it, simply means paying our income taxes on a current basis.

A revision of the system that would in effect wipe out all arrears and be a real pay-as-you-earn plan would be of great benefit to workers whose income may fluctuate quickly and sharply as a result of periods of illness or unemployment.

Cashing Checks...

Local industrial workers are rightfully complaining at the inconvenience caused through lack of facilities to get their pay checks cashed.

A responsibility or duty in the matter of doing something about providing the service of making the necessary cash available must rest somewhere.

There is a dissatisfaction existing which has justification and which there should be some means of remedy before it hampers the war effort.

New School Buildings...

The city appears to be up against the early necessity of doing something about providing additional school accommodation here.

It is a difficult problem but one that will have to be met unless children in Prince Rupert are to go uneducated. And that such a pass as that should come seems hardly reasonable.

Fancy construction plans are discussed at times but we might as well forget them for the present.

Possibly, after the war is over and things settle down to a more permanent and definable basis, something enduring may be undertaken.



Estimates Of City Schools

Are Again Before Board — Must Be Completed For Council by Next Week

The board of school trustees is still wrestling with the estimates for the year which are to be ready for presentation to the city council next week. Not including salaries and repairs, the school expenditures last year were \$5,709.62 for fuel, \$3,560.50 for supplies and \$6,190.90 on principal and \$7,304 on interest of debt, the total being \$23,506.12. This year it is expected that the fuel cost will be about one-third higher than last year owing largely to the conversion from oil to fuel in the heating systems.

The estimates will be coming up again next week by which time committees are expected to be able to report finally on salaries and repair needs for the coming year. Figuring of additional school costs for the coming year owing to increased school population, the volume of which is uncertain, is making it difficult for the board to make its estimates this year.


