during the year in District No. 2 were 19,500,000 pounds, value \$2,-735,000 (Canadian landings 6,050,-000, value \$853,000), average price \$14.06 per hundredweight as compared with 1941 landings of 16,-740,000, value \$1,790,000 (Canadian) landings 6,580,000 pounds, value \$720,000). The increase in landings over last year was due to the lifting of restrictions as to the amount that could be marketed on each trip to port. This was a factor in bringing more American schooners into this port than would have come in normal times.
