PRINCE RUPERT, Aug. 28 (CP)—Prime Minister Winston Churchill of Great Britain, at present on a trip to northern Quebec, is expected to reach Washington next week to continue his conference with President Franklin Roosevelt.

A radio broadcast of Prime Minister Churchill, which has been made on Sunday, has been postponed until Tuesday of the same time.

The Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King of Canada may make another trip from Ottawa to Quebec for an informal meeting with Mr. Churchill.

Bad Wiring Fire Cause

An amateur job of light wiring was the cause of a fire which broke out in the attic of the residence of Mrs. Veitch, 220 Seventh Avenue East, at 1:20 yesterday afternoon.

Owing to poor workmanship in the wiring of the house, which is rented by Mrs. Veitch, a wire burned through, igniting the wallboard, which in turn ignited the underside of the roof.

The blaze was put out by the fire department before any great amount of damage was done, but it was the opinion of Fire Chief Lock that only the most prompt action on the part of his department had saved the house from greater damage.

Chief Lock praised highly the new fire truck which carries a quantity of water along with it, and which enabled the firemen to play a stream of water on the first as soon as they had got a hose line to it, instead of having to wait to connect a line to a hydrant.

"It was one of those fires where a split second might change the result, and the advantage was largely because of the new truck," he said.

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, Aug. 28 (CP)—Southern Italy's entire railway system has been disorganized by relentless Allied bombings with train traffic almost at a standstill, it was disclosed today. The railroads are the kingpin in Italy's defences. The announcement followed a heavy blast by United States bombers yesterday at the railway yards at Sulmona, nearly one hundred miles each of Rome, for the first time and other attacks on congested freight yards and locomotive works at Benevento near Naples.

VANCOUVER, Aug. 28 (CP)—The demand for cargo vessels has eased somewhat, Hon. Clarence D. Howe, minister of munitions, said Friday in a telegram to the executive of a conference protesting at layoffs in Vancouver shipyards.

Mr. Howe said that the highest priority had been given alteration work on aircraft carriers and diversion of expert workers may cause some reduction in the output of cargo vessels.

Over Million Words Handled

Quebec Conference Provided More Than One Million Words

MONTREAL, Aug. 28—More than one million words of news were filed over the wires of the Canadian National Telegraphs by 200 press correspondents covering the Quebec conference stated John O. Sullivan, superintendent, Montreal. This special service was provided under the direction of Mr. O. Sullivan assisted by D. McWilliams, Quebec manager of the telegraph company.

"The heaviest day's file was on the 24th when approximately 100,000 words were transmitted. One dispatch from Quebec to London, England, was completed in the record time of four minutes. Most of the cable business was handled to London with New York, Washington and Chicago receiving the heaviest American file in that order. For Canadian consumption, Montreal and Toronto received the largest portion of the wired news flashes but all cities coast to coast were well represented in the number of messages dispatched.

"In addition, the Canadian National Telegraphs installed eight loops in two CBC studios for special news broadcasts over Canadian and American networks. Tuesday, also, was the heaviest day for these broadcasts when twenty programs originated to keep the public informed of events," Mr. Sullivan said.

New Front Is Opened

Russians Break Through South of Bryansk and Overrun Important New Localities

LONDON, Aug. 28 (CP)—The Russians opened a fourth battlefront Friday by breaking through south of Bryansk and overrunning Sevsk and twenty other localities, Moscow announced.

The new blow carried the Russians to within twenty miles of the railway line linking Bryansk with Kiev, the key to German defences along the Dnieper River. Recaptured Sevsk is eighty miles south of Bryansk.

West of Kharkov the Russians gained three to five miles. The Russian army's westward drive across the Ukraine has pushed the Germans back another 15 miles and reached the Psel River, a tributary of the Dnieper, 100 miles west of Kharkov, the Army newspaper Red Star disclosed today. The new advance places the Soviet troops 15 miles west of Zenkov, furthest point previously announced as gained by the Russians in the westward push.

Another important point to be recaptured is Katelva, 63 miles west of Kharkov, this marking a further advance in the Donets Basin.

The Red Army, since the present offensive commenced, has won its way more than half way back from Stalingrad to the Polish border. It is now 500 miles west of Stalingrad.

Day of War Prayer to Be Observed

Rt. Rev. G. A. Rix, Bishop of Caledonia, has been notified by the Acting Undersecretary of State, W. P. J. O'Meara, of a proclamation setting apart Sunday, September 5, as a day of humble prayer and intercession for divine guidance in the prosecution of the war. Arrangements are being made for cooperation in this diocese in observance of the day.

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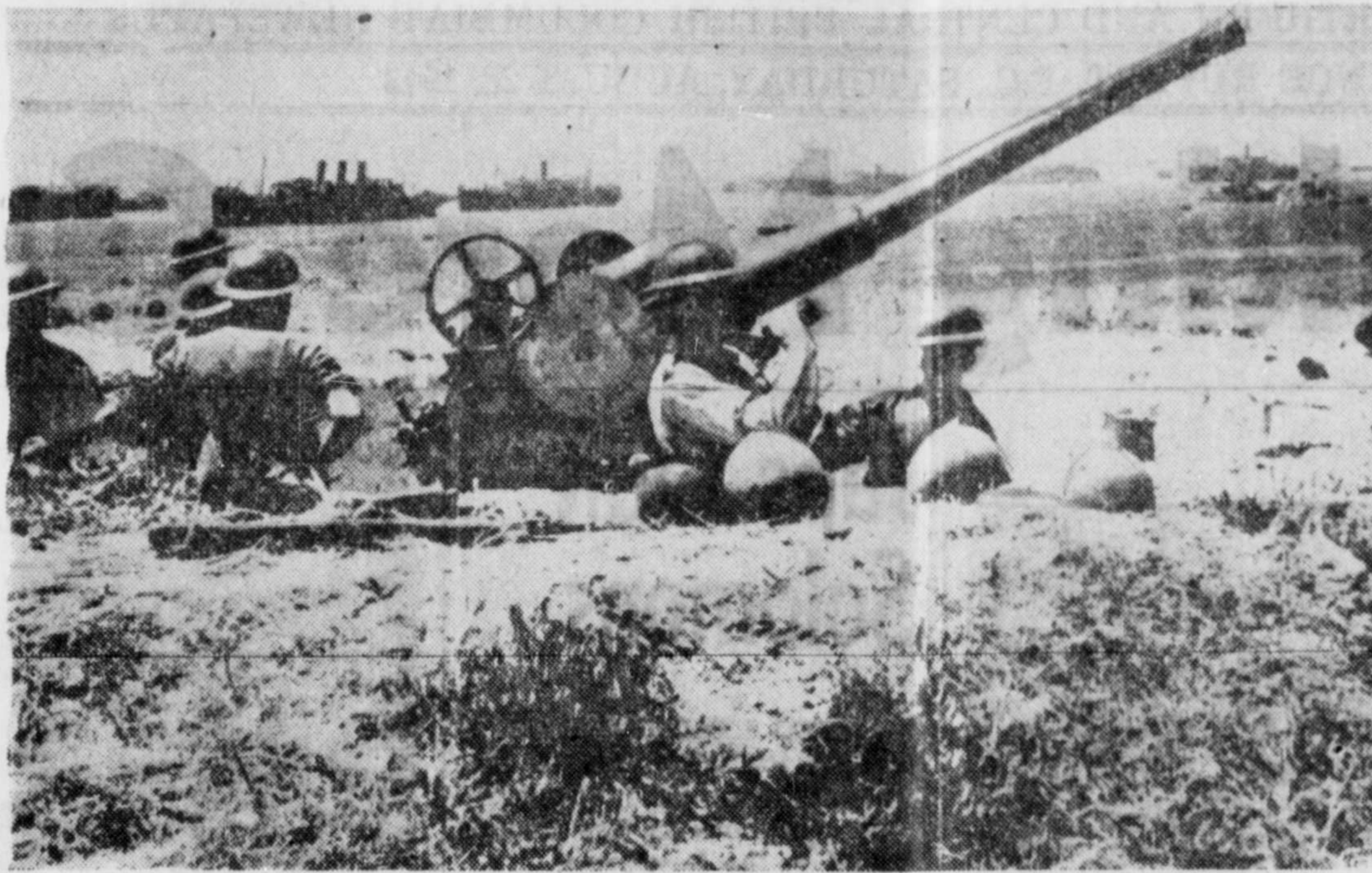

TURNED AGAINST ITS FORMER MASTERS

Perry Report and Shipbuilding . . .

"The Perry Report is not easy to read," says Francis R. Turnley, editor of the publication of a Vancouver engineering concern. "Six hundred pages without an index is like a feast without forks—but it is a feast and warrants far more attention than it has received."

"When the Act was passed in February, 1942, authorizing not more than twelve persons, including the chairman, to consider advance planning of rehabilitation measures, industrial reorganization and employment projects designed to meet postwar conditions, it was the signal for Hon. H. G. T. Perry, chairman, and his committee to pose the following simple question to the people of British Columbia: If you had a wish what would it be?"

"They were both astonished and encouraged" by the resulting answers. Hundreds of organized bodies and individuals came forward with clear-cut replies, all outlining some local or provincial postwar dream that, in their opinion, should be made reality with the least of delay.

"The schemes range over hundreds of activities, including the growing of beets, peanuts, gathering dandelion roots, building ball parks and stadiums, restoring the forests, utilizing the lignin in pulpwood, lowering taxes, establishing textile mills and the establishment of a steel mill on the Pacific Coast. Two groups—recommended continuation of the shipbuilding industry.

"The committee itself, in its own detailed reports, has little to say about shipbuilding. Perhaps the problem looks too large.

"From there on Mr. Turnley's article goes on to discuss the possibilities in British Columbia after the war, suggesting how this might fit in with the steel mill proposal for this coast.

"Shipbuilding is now our largest industry. We have everything to carry the business into the peace, except steel and engines and a market for the ships. We have plenty of iron ore, coking coal and limestone to make steel with; we have vast electrical resources, an all-year moderate climate and 45,000 men and women who now build ships and build them well.

"A lot of people besides those working on the ships have an interest in this matter. Jobs are at stake, tens of thousands of jobs, and, if this is a democracy, we should not have to cringe in fear of eastern steel being 'dumped' here to thwart our rightful industrial needs.

"The world will need ships and British Columbia might as well be building a goodly share of them. Right now Canada is building as many merchant vessels as the United Kingdom.

"Can't we find a place for our B.C. built ships somewhere in this (postwar) competition or perhaps we can end the competition by sensible common agreement and still build ships."

Bombing of Berlin . . .

The disinclination of the Allies to put a great amount of credence in the announcements that the government of the Reich has been removed from Berlin to other and safer cities, is doubtless based on a thorough understanding of the German propaganda machine. However, there is no reason to doubt that many non-essential civilians have been evacuated from the capital. This became necessary when the residents of Berlin heard of what happened to Hamburg. They were seized with panic and there is reason to believe that the government acted because the residents of Berlin were leaving the city in disorderly throngs, disrupting railway and highway services. Fear of Berlin being blotted out, like Hamburg and the cities of the Ruhr and Rhine Valleys, started the rush to other cities and towns more removed from possible bombing attacks and the rush continues.

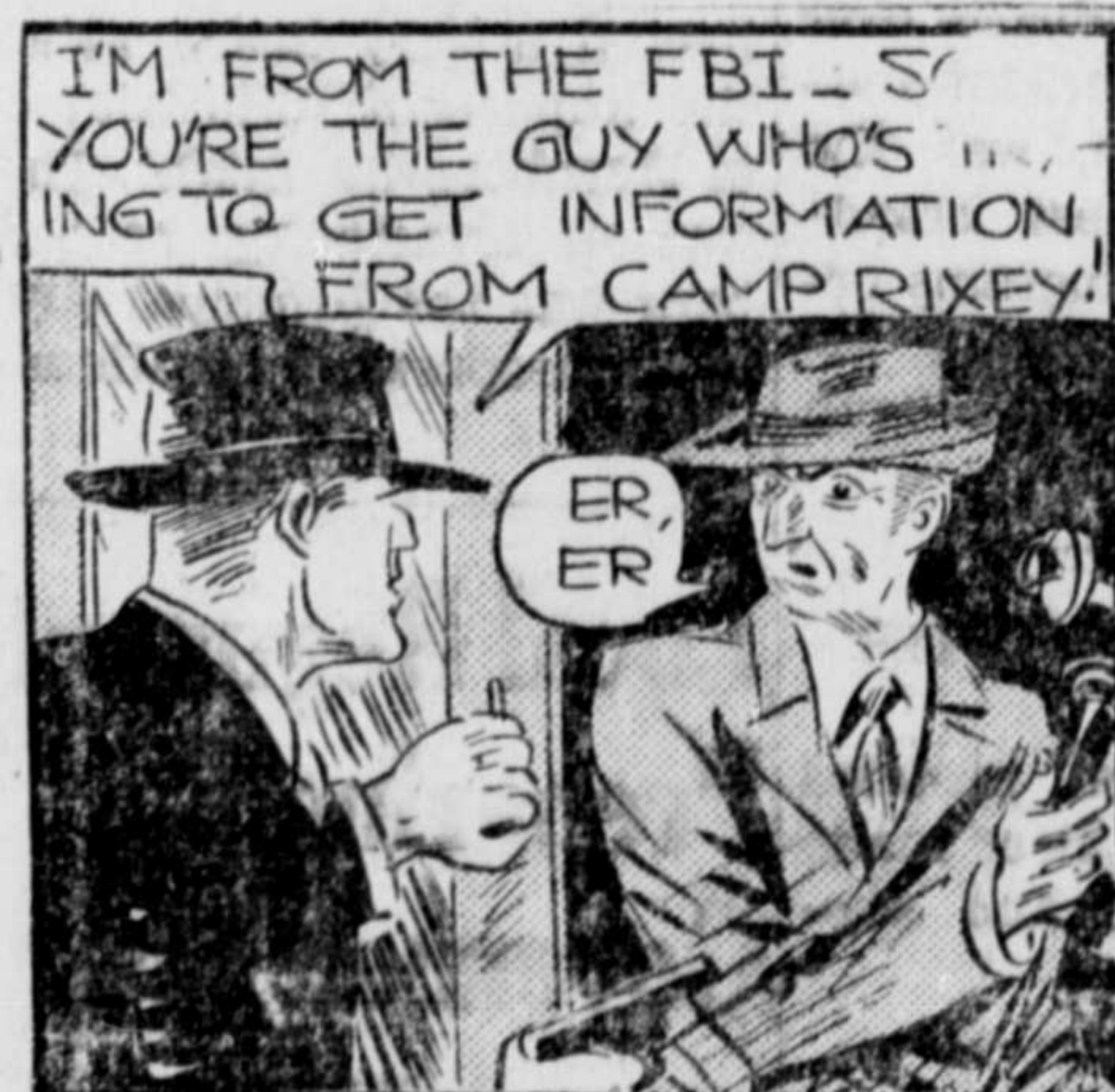

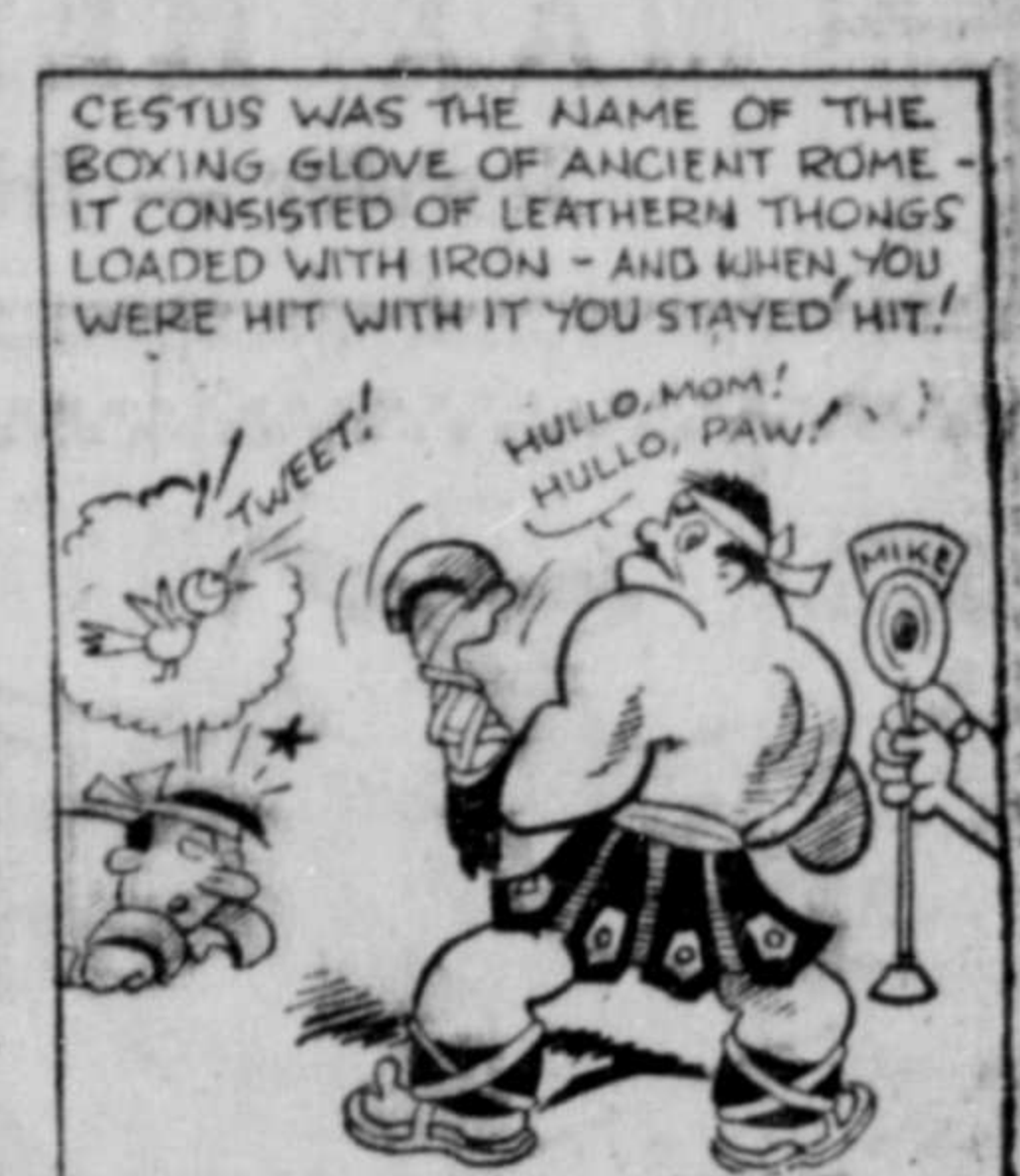
