Allies Extend Air Operations

REDS DRIVE FORWARD
MOSCOW—The Red Army continues to speed forward to the following the capture Saturday of Zhitomir and is smashing Nazi defences in the Dnieper Bend and west of Kiev.

BATTLE OF ITALY
ALGIERS—Faving heavy resistance, bad weather and terrain, the Allies have made only slight gains in the Italy. Air attacks continue.

POUNDING AT REICH
LONDON—Royal Air Force Mosquito bombers raided Berlin points in western Germany again Sunday night. It was a consecutive night of attack on western Germany.

MORE JAP SHIPS SUNK
ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN SOUTH PACIFIC—American Marines have sunk a Japanese air transport vessel and six merchant ships in the southern Pacific.

IN CHINA AND BURMA
HONGKING—The Japanese have been driven from both of the Yangtse River by Chinese defenders. Allied land aerial campaign in Burma has been resumed.

CANADIANS IN ITALY
ALGIERS—Allied headquarters have formally announced the names of three Canadian units of the First Division as being Italy. They are the Hastings and Prince Edward Regiment, Royal Canadian Regiment, and the Carleton and York Regiment. All are eastern Canada units.

SITUATION IN LEROS
CAIRO—The Germans have been throwing parachute troops, bombers and seaborne reinforcements against the British Italian troops defending Leros Island in what appeared an all-out effort to regain the Aegean stepping stone.

Divinity Of Christ Established

To a large audience in the Oddfellows' Hall last night Evangelist Balmer, in forceful language, dwelt on the divinity of Christ by an exposition of the prophecy of Daniel 8 and 9.

The speaker said that the prophet Daniel clearly understood the vision of the eighth chapter with the exception of verse 14, in which the angel declared that, after 2300 days, the sanctuary would be cleansed. Being a prophet, Daniel understood that a day in prophecy represented a year (Eze. 4:6; Num. 14:34) and in applying this rule to the 2300 days he was very much distressed. At the time the vision was given to Daniel, the angel did not give the interpretation because Daniel "fainted and was sick certain days—and he was astonished at the vision, and none understood it," Dan. 8:27.

In the ninth chapter the angel Gabriel conveyed to Daniel the desired information and starting point of the last prophetic date in this world's history. Verse 25 gave the information, and the decree for the starting point bore the date 457 B.C.

According to Ezra 7:11-13 483 full years would carry into A.D. 27. In the autumn of that year Christ was baptized, Mark 1:9. Another 7 year period reached to A.O. 34. However, according to verses 26 and 27 Christ was to be crucified in the midst of this period and this occurred in the spring of A.D. 31. In the year 34 the Jews as a nation through the Sonherin rejected Christ officially. Thus was fulfilled the 70 weeks or 490 year period of 2300 years allotted to the Jews. Subtracting the 490 years from the 2300 there were 1810 years left. Adding this 1810

Cabbage is for Kings!

Full of Vitamin C, Cabbage has come into its own as a favourite food

First a word to the wise about cooking cabbage as a green vegetable. It will have better texture, colour and flavour (and more vitamins) if you cook it quickly in boiling water (seven minutes shredded, a little longer in sections).

But don't be content only to serve it like that... or as cole slaw though cole slaw is nutritionally valuable. But there are so many other good ways of enjoying cabbage. For instance:

SPICY CABBAGE AND SAUSAGE CASSEOLE to serve 4

1/2 lb. sausage 1 cup canned tomatoes, or gravy
1 tsp. vinegar 6 soda crackers (crumbled)
1 tsp. paprika 2 cups shredded raw cabbage

Crumble sausages and pan fry. Mix in vinegar, paprika and cracker crumbs. Place layer of cabbage in casserole, then layer of sausage mixture. Repeat. Add tomatoes and stock. Bake, covered, in moderate oven (350°) about 30 minutes.

To meet the increased demands for all lines of children's underwear, plans were developed last summer with the manufacturers for stepping up production to the maximum and continuing it through the winter months. In normal times production is discontinued in the Fall, and most retailers receive the bulk of their supplies before winter sets in.

To facilitate the increased production, arrangements were made for appropriate supplies of yarns and other raw materials. Production quotas were worked out with manufacturers to make full use of the looms and equipment that can turn out these goods in Canada.

The extended production schedule will bring a continuing supply of new goods to retail stores during the winter.

Military needs as well as increased civilian requirements have put enormous strains on Canada's knit goods industry. The public is asked to co-operate by spreading its buying of children's underwear over the season.
