ANKARA, Nov. 18 (CP)—William King, Associated Press staff writer, said in a dispatch today that Turkey's sub-rosa assistance to the Allied armed forces which closely approximates that which the United States gave Great Britain in the months before United States entered the war, is rapidly carrying Turkey toward a war footing. King reported that he is convinced Turkey will be in the war by spring.

Mr. Lamb had been feeling unwell for about ten days and last week went off duty, being taken to the hospital on Monday.

URGES PACT BE UNIVERSAL

Extension of Moscow Accord to All Countries is Advocated by Wendell Willkie

NEW YORK, Nov. 18 — Wendell Willkie, 1940 Republican candidate and aspirant for the nomination again in 1944, urged last night that the Moscow accord reached by Great Britain, United States, Russia and China be made the "embryo of a general and vital international understanding" by enlarging participation to include all the United Nations and eventually all countries.

AIR FORCE OUT AGAIN

Ludwigshafen and Berlin Were Principal Targets Last Night — Norway Today

LONDON, Nov. 18 — Royal Canadian Air Force and Royal Air Force heavy bombers, in the first raid in a week, attacked Ludwigshafen, great German chemical centre on the Rhine, last night while Mosquitoes bombed Berlin for the third time in seven days.

Today American heavy bombers smashed Hitler's war industries in Norway.

Only one bomber—a Canadian aircraft—was lost during the night's operations.

Shooting Alarms Terrace People

TERRACE, Nov. 18 — A complaint has been lodged with the local police that shooting is taking place on Sunday within the area of the game reserve adjoining Terrace. Some of the people living within the area have been alarmed at the whistling of passing bullets.

Reds Yield Ground For First Time

MOSCOW—Premier Joseph Stalin announced today that the Germans are switching their attack from recaptured Leros to Samos, last Aegean island in Allied hands, and have begun an aerial assault on that island.

ANOTHER CITY FALLS

MOSCOW, Nov. 18 — The Russians have given ground for the first time since the great Soviet offensive began four months ago, withdrawing Wednesday in the Zhitomir-Korostyev sector of the Ukraine at the tip of the salient west of Kiev before a series of heavy German counter-attacks.

Reports said that the Nazis threw at least 150,000 troops into the counter-assaults.

The depth of the withdrawal was not given in the Russian communique.

Military observers believed the withdrawal was not on a large scale.

The Russians are advancing on other fronts.

Yesterday the Russians converged on Gomel, storming that last important German base east of the Dnieper River.

The Russians have been pushing into the Ukraine although slowed up by adverse weather and stiff Nazi counter-attacks, endeavouring to edge toward Korosten, rail junction controlling traffic on the Leningrad-Odessa and Kiev-Warsaw railroads.

Heavy storms are also reported to be slowing the Russian advance into the Crimea from Kerch bridgehead but the Germans are falling back under growing pressure of Red reinforcements from the Caucasus.

EXPECT JAPS LEAVE RABAU

One Hundred and Two Planes Shot Down in Six Days.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18 — The Japanese have suffered such blows at Rabaul that they may be compelled to abandon their key base in the South Pacific, a naval spokesman, interviewed here yesterday, said, recalling that 102 Japanese planes had been shot down in that area in the last six days against 15 United States planes, a ratio of seven to one.

Allied bombers have been active with good effects against Japanese installations in the Finichhafen area of New Guinea and the Kara area of Bougainville on the Solomon Islands.

The Japanese made raids against the Americans on Gilbert and Marshal Islands.

HULL REPORTS

WASHINGTON—In a triumphant speech before the Senate and House of Representatives in combined session today, Secretary of State Cordell Hull gave an official report on the Moscow conference, which, he said, "would do much toward shortening the war and making provisions for the peace." He said that the agreements reached have already been made known to the world and that no secret agreements of the old diplomatic order had been contemplated.

PREMIER TOJO TALKS

TOKYO—Premier Tojo told newspapermen from Japanese-controlled countries that Japan is fighting to "emancipate Eastern Asia from American and British greed." A naval spokesman spoke of "brilliant victories" in the South Pacific.

ALLIES HAVE ADVANTAGE

WASHINGTON — President Roosevelt, in an address last night, said the United Nations now have "the supreme advantage of initiative" which must be held throughout the war and into the peace to follow.

TRIESTE-FIUME TIED UP

LONDON—The Germans are unable to use the ports of Trieste and Fiume in the Adriatic Sea owing to guerrilla activities.

STEEL MILL LAY-OFF

TORONTO — Trades union heads have sent messages to the government to take action in connection with lay-off of 7,000 men from the steel mill at Trenton, Nova Scotia.

DO NOT NEED PERMITS

OTTAWA—Women over 44, over 59 and school teachers and pupils may work during the Christmas rush between December 13 and January 5 in post office and retail stores without selective service permits.

MAY SELL SWEETMEATS

OTTAWA — Churches and charitable organizations may sell donated jams and jellies at bazaars and sales without ration coupons provided local boards are notified.

FILM EXCHANGE FIRE

TORONTO—Damage amounting to \$100,000 was done in a moving picture film exchange fire on Victoria Street last night. There was an explosion in stored film. Three persons were sent to hospital.

REGISTERING RENTED ROOMS

Control of Shared Living Space Under Way by Prices and Board

Compulsory registration of all living and rooming houses, other than "shared accommodations" in Prince Rupert, is under order of the administrator of the Prices and Trade Board.

The purpose of the registration, according to G. S. Miller, manager, regional rental of which is in town to get the started, is to get an accurate survey of the rates and on all shared living in the city.

Information gathered from the registration, Mr. Miller emphasized, will not be in connection with income tax or other taxes or any other scheme. It will, however, be used as a basis for adjustment of disputes between landlords and tenants and land-owners at any time be asked for evidence that they have registered.

The staff at the local office is headed by Aid. Nora Arnold and up to noon Wednesday about 100 premises had been registered.

FIGHTING IN ITALY SLOW

Fields in Athens Hit—All German Counter-attacks are Repulsed

ATHENS, Nov. 18 — Allied forces attacked two Nazi air bases in the Athens area Wednesday while heavy rains and rising rivers reduced ground fighting in Italy. It was announced today.

Under adverse conditions, German forces staged several counter-attacks on the eastern front of the Italian line but all were repulsed by the British Army.

On the entire Anglo-American front only one incident of fire in which small German boats on the Garigliano River were hit was reported.

London Unable To Understand Leros Reverse

LONDON, Nov. 18 — Some military observers profess difficulty in understanding why the Dodecanese island of Leros should have been lost since the Allies were supposed to have had superiority in sea and air in that part of the Mediterranean as well as having thousands of troops available.

London morning newspapers were sharp in criticism of the British loss of Leros to the Germans.

The Post said the matter needs "explanation."

The Star described it as an "unpalatable reverse."

The Daily Mail said it would have been better never to have set out on the enterprise.

The News-Chronicle stated bluntly "it is hard to resist the conclusion that somebody blundered."

All editorials were filled with the question and stressed the political setback to the United Nations in Turkey and the Balkans.

LONDON — Gen. A. C. Critchley, Calgary-born chief executive of the British Overseas Airways, is making a flying inspection of aviation facilities in India. He recently completed a similar tour in Canada.

ACTIVITIES OF Y.M.C.A. AND Y.W.C.A.
By DOROTHY GARBUTT

Writer Dick Blamey showed me a clipping from one of our Canadian magazines which explained very clearly and concisely "how to tell his rank at a glance." It has to do with the Navy. It says—There are two types as naval ratings (1) Men dressed as seamen (these are the traditional sailor collar with round hat outfits, known as the round rig) and (2) Men not dressed as seamen. (the square riggers, sound like schooners, don't they?) These latter are dressed in blue uniforms with single breasted coats and black buttons. Their caps are comparable to those worn by officers. Only the cap badge will tell the difference. This is a red crown riding atop a small anchor. Men who wear these uniforms are writers, supply ratings, cooks, stewards, sick berth attendants and innumerable others who form a great and valuable portion of the navy.

The officers are the fellows who, during the winter months, wear dark blue double breasted jackets with eight gilt buttons. The cap badge bears an anchor and a crown on top. Around the whole is a gold-colored cluster of laurel leaves—In summer time the uniform can be either white or khaki. Rank is worn either on the sleeve or on the shoulder epaulettes. It is shown by gold colored braid rings. The rings are either wavy or straight. The straight rings indicate men of the permanent force while the wavy rings, plain or criss-cross, point out the fact that the Officer is of the Royal Canadian Naval Reserve or the Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve, and has enlisted for "duration" only. The latter is in the greatest number.

Lieut. Philip Lee, RCNVR goes on to give further instances of "how to tell at a glance" in his very interesting article in Chatelaine. The only thing he seems to left out is a description of my special pets, the Chief and Petty Officers. Perhaps he couldn't find words to describe them. Sometimes I can't.

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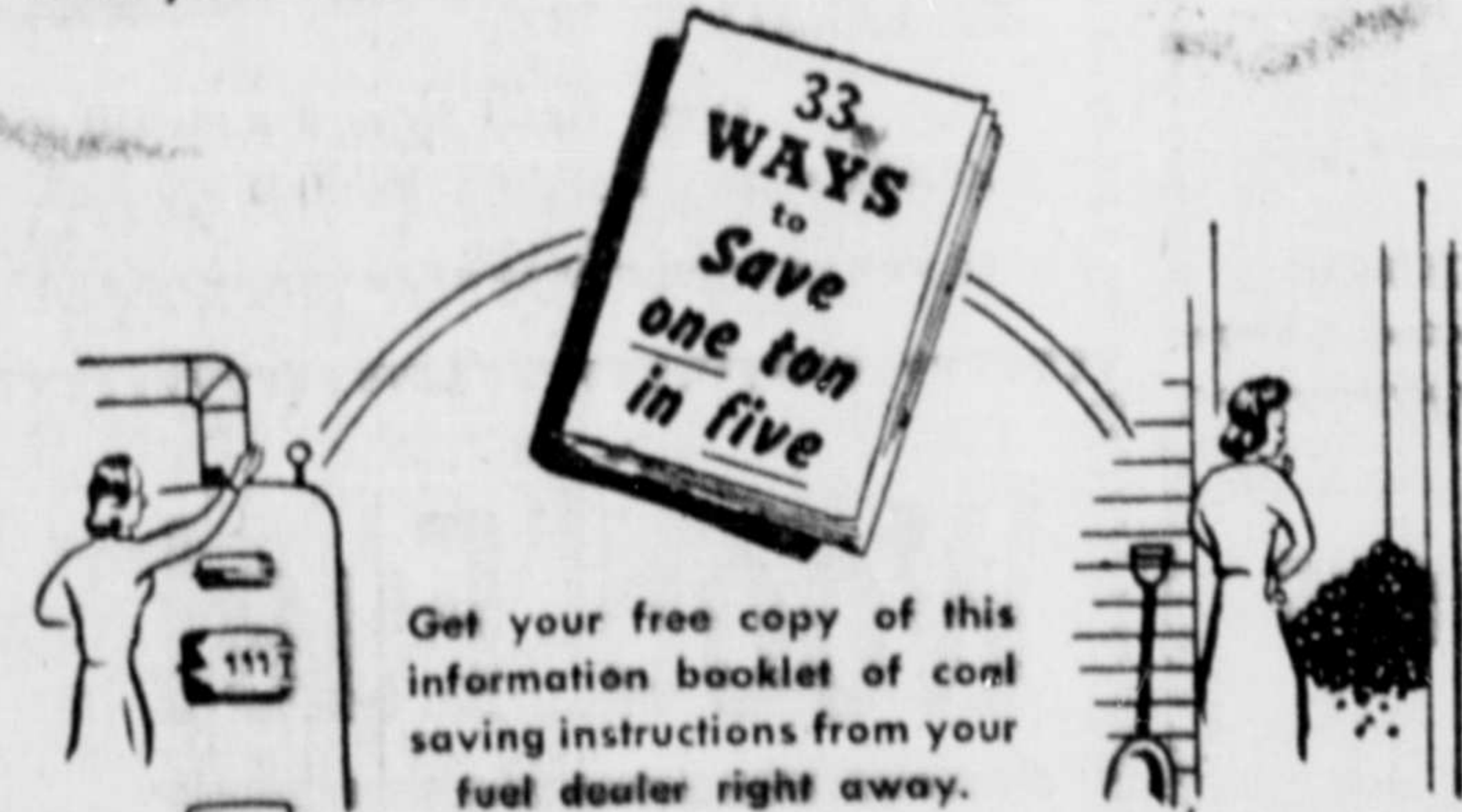

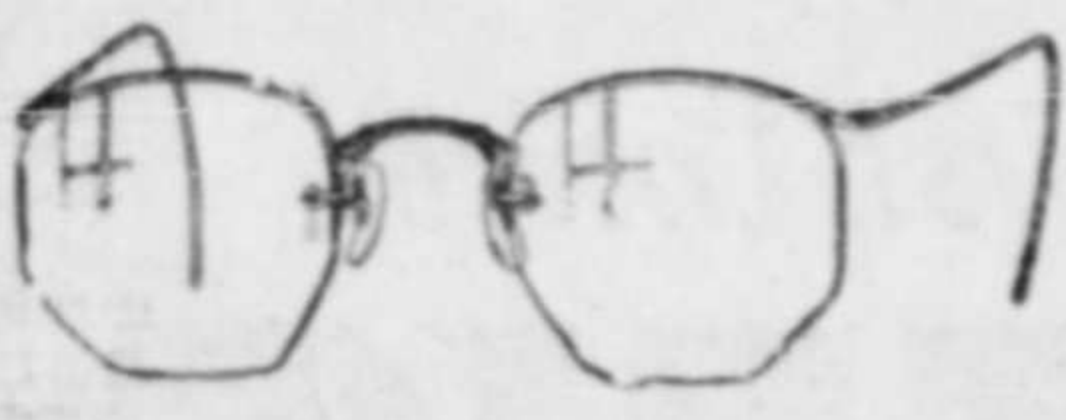
