Dr. Manion, Three Times Cabinet Minister and One Time Party Leader, Passes

OTTAWA, July 3 (CP)—Dr. R. J. Manion, aged 63, three times federal cabinet minister and leader of the Conservative party until his retirement from political life in 1940, died suddenly at his home here late Friday when struck by a heart seizure. He was national director of civilian air raid defence in Canada. Having served overseas...

war to the full extent of Canada's power but both pledged themselves not to enact compulsory military service. After the election Dr. Manion called a caucus of elected Conservative members and submitted his resignation. Hon R. B. Hanson was made temporary House leader. Overseas in 1941 In March, 1941 Dr. Manion was appointed by the Defence Department to consult with Canadian army heads in England to determine in what way the military authorities could aid in the work of the auxiliary services overseas. He was made acting colonel. Dr. Manion was born at Pembroke, Ont. Nov. 19 1881, son of Patrick J. and Mary O'Brien Manion, both Irish-Canadians. The father operated a store and as the Canadian Pacific Railway moved into the west, he moved his business along with it, finally settling at Fort William. Bob Manion received his early education from the schools of the pioneer town and was sent off to Queen's University for a medical course. After a year there he transferred to the University of Toronto, where he graduated in 1904. Post graduate work at Edinburgh and Glasgow followed. Returning to Fort William, he specialized in surgery and soon established a sound reputation in the operating theatre. Dr. Manion's decision in 1915 to go to war changed the whole course of his life and led to his abandoning surgery for politics. He went overseas on his own, hoping to obtain surgical work in a hospital as he did not wish to tie himself down by enlistment because of his family. He found civilian doctors were not wanted until a friend put him in touch with a group who were operating a hospital near Noyon in France. Later he returned to Canada, obtaining a commission on the recommendation of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. In England he served on a travelling board which visited

ACROSS CHANNEL

Allied Aircraft Continue Pounding Away at Enemy Objectives on Continent

FOLKESTONE, England, July 3 (CP)—A strong force of Allied aircraft was heard crossing the Channel at great height early this afternoon and soon distant explosions echoed back from France. Yesterday Royal Air Force and Royal Canadian Air Force joined in air attack on Northern France and the Low Countries, hitting at enemy railway and communication lines as well as supply and fleu bases. An oil station in Holland was hit hard. Bombing shipping off the invasion coast was also effectively attacked. Five planes failed to return, all the Canadians getting back safely.

His objective was the front, however, and eventually he was attached to the 21st Battalion in France. At various times he served with other battalions and with field ambulance and tested the misery, the danger and the weariness of the front line. He wrote "A Surgeon in Arms" during intervals of leisure in his medical officer's dugout. At Vimy Ridge he won the Military Cross. While overseas Dr. Manion was nominated a Liberal candidate for Fort William in the 1917 election which brought the historic break in the Liberal party. One section, favoring conscription, joined in with the Conservatives under Sir Robert Borden while the main body of the party under Sir Wilfrid Laurier opposed conscription.

Dr. Manion was a personal friend of Sir Wilfrid but felt compulsory military service was necessary. He threw in his lot with the Unionists and was elected to parliament while still serving. Soon after the war ended in 1918 Sir Robert Borden retired and the Union Government was reorganized under the leadership of Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen. Some of the former Liberals returned to their party but Manion remained and became Minister of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment. He was re-elected as a Conservative.

SITUATION IS BETTER WASHINGTON—The situation in the Pacific is now so favorable that there is no longer much danger of raids on the west coast of the United States, Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox declared yesterday. CLOSE TO SALAMAUA

This is Objective Now of Australians and Americans

JAP FLEET DRIVEN OFF WASHINGTON D. C. July 3—Japanese cruisers and destroyers, endeavouring to turn big guns on American positions around Rendova Island, were driven off by United States naval units in a sharp engagement early today. The Navy said that a enemy task force of seven warships, including three cruisers and four destroyers, moved in in an unsuccessful bombardment attempt.

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN AUSTRALIA, July 3—Allied land forces are converging from three sides upon the important Japanese base of Salamaua on New Guinea—the Australians from the south and the Americans from Nassau Bay where they landed in force a few days ago. A juncture between Australians and Americans was effected since yesterday. Meanwhile, the Allies keep up an unrelenting aerial assault upon Salamaua.

The latest count of aircraft losses in the battle over the central Solomons is 145 for the Japanese as compared with only 25 of the Allies with ten of the pilots of the latter saved. On Thursday the Japanese lost 22 planes and the Americans eight. A Japanese broadcast claimed today that two large American destroyers, a medium destroyer and a transport had been sunk in the central Solomons and that many American planes had been brought down.

FAST TIME ON FLIGHT

T.C.A. Pilot Crosses Atlantic Ocean in Fourteen Hours

MONTREAL, July 3—Completing an exceedingly fast air crossing of the Atlantic from Great Britain to Canada, a Lancashire flown by Capt. M. B. Barclay, of TransCanada Airlines, arrived yesterday at Montreal airport. The time from take-off to landing here was 14 hours, seven minutes, which establishes a near record for a westbound passage. Eastbound trips have been made in faster time, conditions usually favoring these flights.

The only faster trip was made by the late Capt. E. R. B. White on June 10, 1941, when he flew a Liberator from England to Montreal in 13 hours 30 minutes. Since that performance no flight westbound has even approached that time.

TransCanada Air Lines pilots and air crews have been participating in regular transatlantic service for some time in co-operation with the British Overseas Airways Corporation, their function being to pilot planes carrying official passengers and special shipments. Their returning planes usually carry as passengers pilots who previously had flown military planes from Canada to Great Britain.

CUSTOMS RECEIPTS

Revenue in June Lower Than In May; Also Lower Than June Last Year

Customs receipts at the port of Prince Rupert in June were \$55,237.49 which was considerably less than May when \$74,971.48 was received. The total customs receipts for the first six months of the year have been \$364,982.61. Last year the customs office collected \$67,492.80 during June, and the receipts from the beginning of 1942 up to the end of June were \$260,265.67.

MAIL HERE IMPROVED

Full Car Service is to be Given Daily on Local Line

OTTAWA, July 3 (Special to Daily News)—An order-in-council has been passed expediting and improving the mail service between Edmonton and Prince Rupert and all between points on the railway. Olof Hanson (Liberal, Skeena) and Gray Tugeon (Liberal, Caribou) have been pressing for a daily mail service for the north country. Hon. Ian Mackenzie, with the two members, discussed the matter with the Postmaster-General and Col. Mulock has had an order-in-council passed reorganizing the mail service. An apartment mail car will be carried on the daily train and mail will be sorted enroute so that there will be no hold-up as previously occurred where some points got their mail 24 hours late.

Mail between Vancouver and points on the Edmonton-Prince Rupert line via Jasper will also be speeded up by the new arrangement.

SMASHING AT ITALY

CAIRO, July 3 (CP)—Nearly one hundred United States heavy bombers smashed at three air fields in southern Italy yesterday in the biggest offensive yet staged by four-engine craft from the Middle East, dropping more than 400,000 pounds of bombs on Italian bases at Locce, Grottagli and San Pancrazio, 35 miles north of Rome. Bombers from North Africa penetrated heavy haze Friday to attack Castel Vetrano air field in Sicily, following up heavy Royal Air Force attacks against Palermo and Cagliari.

Part of the plan will call for a new house to house canvassers as well as give the oldtimers a chance to show how up-to-the-minute they are with their preparations. Shore To Shore Air Cover Effectively Given To Transports

One Submarine Destroyed, Another Probably Sunk And Others Possibly Damaged in One Recent Trip

LONDON, July 3 (CP)—A great convoy recently crossed the Atlantic under shore-to-shore air cover of land and carrier-based planes and one submarine was destroyed, another probably sunk and others possibly damaged, the Admiralty and Air Ministry announced today. Reinforced surface escorts also helped shepherd the ships through.

Submarines made a series of attacks over a two-day period but the convoy was undeterred. In the first stage of the journey, Royal Canadian Air Force planes of the eastern command protected the ships. The Royal Air Force coastal command took over on the approach to Britain and the mid-Atlantic gap was filled by planes from British carriers.

INVASION NOT TODAY

LONDON, July 3 (CP)—The Axis designated this as Allied invasion day but dawn broke over Europe with no immediate omen of such activity. The Nazi-controlled radio which had drummed at the July 3 theme for a week only to back down slightly yesterday sarcastically opened the morning's news broadcast with the declaration that "the day of liberation has arrived." The broadcast was apparently an attempt to get across that it had not been serious about the date.

REVIVING OF A.R.P.

At a meeting of the district wardens of the Civilian Defence Committee (A.R.P.) last evening a general review of the local organization provided material for an interesting discussion and plans were drawn up for future activities.

Eight Calls Are Answered

The Prince Rupert fire department answered eight calls during June, bringing the total number of calls for the year up to 68. The most serious blaze during the month occurred at the Victory Rooms on June 3 when damage between \$7,000 and \$8,000 was caused. Last year, there were seven calls in June and the total for the first six months of the year was 46 calls.

N.Y. Mayor ON COAST

VANCOUVER, July 3 (CP)—Mayor Fiorella LaGuardia of New York, accompanied by United States military leaders, arrived in Vancouver yesterday and attended a conference of the permanent Canadian-United States Defence Board. Mayor LaGuardia is chairman of the American section of the board. The conference is continuing today.

WAR NEWS

GAINING IN SOUTH PACIFIC

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN AUSTRALIA—American and Australian jungle fighters menaced the Japanese air base of Salamaua on the northwest coast of New Guinea from three sides today in the growing Pacific offensive while in the Central Solomons, at the other end of a 700-mile arc, pressure was maintained on the enemy air base of Munda. Today's communique reported, as the latest success, the juncture of Australian patrols from Mubo, 12 miles south and inland from Salamaua, with Americans who landed on the coast at Nassau Bay on Wednesday. In addition to patrols south and east of that enemy base, other patrols have been reported north of it in the vicinity of Malolo.

REDS FORCE NAZIS BACK

LONDON—The Berlin radio reports, without confirmation from Moscow, that Nazi forces have fallen back to strong defence positions 50 miles northeast of Smolensk. Strong Russian patrols have been harassing the Germans on the central front and elsewhere.

Celtic place-names and names of persons and families survive more or less in all parts of the British Isles. Again, let us remember that our ancestral islands were never entirely Teutonized. We are not merely descendants of Teutonic invaders. The blood of the Britons is in us yet. "Saxon" is O.K. for the people of Saxony but not for us. We English-speaking nations have every right to quit sharing appellations with Germany and demand for ourselves the more British and more appropriate term namely—"Anglo-Celt."

**Waterfront Whiffs**

Halibut Landings This Week Very Light, Pulling Season's Total Down—First Week of Salmon Canning

Following the closing of Area No. 2 to fishing for the season, Prince Rupert had a light week of halibut landings ending yesterday with only 259,500 pounds of fish being brought in, 211,000 pounds from American vessels and 48,500 pounds from Canadian. This brings the grand total of landings at the port for the year 1943 to date up to 7,448,900 pounds as compared with 8,346,019 pounds at the corresponding date last year. The Canadian aggregate for this year is 3,902,700 pounds compared with 3,360,219 pounds last year while the American total is 3,546,200 pounds—far below last year's 4,985,800 pounds. Prices during the week maintained

high level with the top price for Canadian fish 21.1c and 17c and 16c paid the Finella for 8,500 pounds and the low 20c, 17c and 16c received by the Kaare II for 40,000 pounds. For American fish the high price of the Betty was 27c and 21c paid the Betty for 20,000 pounds and the low 22.1c and 18c received by the Urania for 35,000 pounds.

Salmon canning operations for the 1943 season on the Skeena River got off to a quiet but orderly start during the past week following the opening of fishing with sockeye gillnets on Sunday night. A scarcity of fishermen was evident due, no doubt, to the call of the war industries at Prince Rupert and elsewhere. The natives, particularly, were slow in getting started but, at the end of the first week, the number of the fishermen on the Naas and Skeena Rivers was gradually building up. First week fishing averages per boat on the Skeena River have been 15 to 20 fish, in Prince Channel (outside the Skeena River), 50 fish, and on the Naas River, 30 fish. Canning every other day in view of the light landings of fish, the canneries on the Skeena River have been all packing during the first week of fishing with the exception of the new Nelson Bros. Fisheries Ltd. plant at Port Edward which is expected to get under way during the second week.
