Geatest Road Building Program in History

the address in reply to the Speech from the Throne concluded in the Legislature yesterday, Minister of Public Works Herbert Anscomb announced the greatest road building program in the history of the province of British Columbia.

Referring to the road built by the Dominion government to link Prince Rupert and Hazelton, Mr. Anscomb said he was in favor of the national government maintaining the road itself as a military highway in the same way as the Dominion government is maintaining the Alaska Highway.

"Both were built for that purpose and both, I maintain, should be national responsibilities."

Of particular interest to the northern part of the province was Mr. Anscomb's statement that the federal government had been approached concerning the construction of a road to link Atlin via the Alaskan Highway with Whitehorse. A reply. he said, had been received that the Department of Mines and Resources was quite favorable to the project "and the project should be approved. It is quite possible the Dominion government will undertake all the work, including surveys, with our province contributing its share of the cost of the work."

HOW MONEY IS TO BE SPNT

With public works department expenditures for the 1946-47 fiscal year totalling \$22,850,000, Mr. Anscomb outlined the great program, summarizing expenditures as follows:

. Maintenance, \$5,000,000.

2. New loan for capital development, \$5,000,000.

3. For machinery and equipment, \$5,000,000. 1. Completion of contracts already entered into.

\$600,000 (approximately). 5. Kootenay Lake ferry road and landings,

\$750,000.

6. Peace River road connection, \$6,000,000. 7. Hope-Princeton road, \$5,000,000.

The minister predicted that the public works department is planning to tighten up "very considerably on gross loads carried on highways by trucking operations."

During the war, Mr. Anscomb said, "we allowed heavy overloads because of the necessity of the times. Whether that necessity has passed completely or not, the fact remains we are going to restrict them because the roads were never constructed for the loads now being placed on them and they are wrecking the roads so fast without additional compensation that it has got to stop."

The minister indicated that tolls would not be removed from ferries, bridges and highways. He said that the tolls collected from such ferries, roads and bridges represented \$600,000 a year which would hard top 100 miles of road.

Mr. Anscomb said, however: "I want it very clearly understood that, whatever I say about them does not mean that, under ordinary circumstances, I am personally in favor of a toll."

The minister recalled that on one occasion in Wilson. the Legislature he had remarked that, when the federal government relinquished its present threecent gasoline tax, the province should impose it." 



LONDON (CP)—The London Daily Mirror teday published a dispatch from its Ottawa correspondent saying that Canadian authorities are ready to announce within a few days the arrest of a member of the Dominion Parliament on a charge of war-time espionage. The correspondent said he was "informed on excellent authority that a Member of Parliament is accused of having reported secret sessions of Canadian Parliament directly to Moscow, even sending photostatic copies of highly confidential documents."

#### Russia's Gyrations

Evidently determined to persist in their own obdurate way in foreign affairs, Russia chooses to promote another crisis in the United Nations Organization by throwing the issue of the Franco government in Spain before the security council while United States and Great Britain hold that, since the continuation of the Franco government, which both of them are seeking to have overthrown by persuasive internal means, does not menace world peace and security, the U.N.O. is no place for the matter. Those who look with magnanimity on the Soviet's gyrations in the field of foreign politics notwithstanding, it seems there is a good deal of inconsistency in Russian foreign policy unless consistency is measured in her case solely by whether or not it is compatible with her own national or political interests. #### A Town Grows Up

When one recalls that a few years ago Boards of Trade and Chambers of Commerce of dozens of Canadian towns and cities were in hot competition with each other to induce new industries to settle in their communities, the report from Guelph, Ontario, that that city is doing nothing to attract a new automobile industry, comes in the "manbites-dog" class of news, says The Printed Word. The chairman of the city's industrial commission is quoted as saying: "If we invite a factory as big as that we are inviting labor trouble. What we want is a flock of small industries."

This statement may sound like heresy to the enthusiastic local booster, who thinks of progress as a god in itself without regard to its direction or results; but those who believe that an ideal town should be something other than a place where one earns a living will find a good deal of common sense in Guelph's attitude. They look on such places as Montreal, Toronto, Vancouver, Hamilton and Windsor as necessary growths, but they have no desire to live in them or to have their own towns emulating them.

Like a person, a town develops character through experience and observation. It learns that the good life is not dependent on material wealth and a continual striving to be more prosperous than the neighbors. It reaches maturity when it can decide calmly that the loss of its own integrity is too great a price to pay for the chance of amassing greater wealth.

### Weather From Toronto

Toronto is losing its grip on at least one operation of Canada-wide interest. The Dominion meteorological service, whose headquarters is at Toronto, is at last being decentralized. Henceforth the weather forecasts for Canada will not come solely from Toronto, but also from Halifax, Montreal, Lethbridge and Vancouver.

However it remains to be seen whether "The Probs" as sent out from Halifax, Montreal, Lethbridge and Vancouver will be any better than those Toronto has been furnishing. We would likely have been run out of town if our readers had thought that all this time we had been getting our weather from Toronto. However, we have been able to check the forecasts with some local forecast instruments.

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

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



Interesting Old Ship

Plan Found Evidence that 20 or so years ago there might have been more enthusiasm than there is today on the part of the Prince Rupert dry dock in planning for Canadian National Steamships coastal ship replacement has come to hand and it was a young boy rummaging around in an attic who was instrumental in bringing the fact to light. The young boy is Peter Harvey, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Harvey, and the evidence is a draftsman's drawing of an attractive 340-foot ship entitled "proposed new yessel for Canadian National Steamers." The drawing was found in the attic of the Harvey home on Fourth Avenue East which was at one time owned and occupied by G. A. McMillan, now manager of Canadian National Steamships at Vancouver and one time manager of the local dry dock and former draftsman. The plan of the ship, which evidently died in the conception, is an intriguing document. The vessel would have been a four-decker with main and shelter decks not unlike the old Prince Rupert with a promenade deck on which would have had one large stack. 
