

LOTHES AND THE LADY

THE LOW-NECKED DRESS and bold look of the wearer are signs of the present fast, frivolous and indecorous age. The Girl of the Period is a creature who dyes her hair and paints her face; no one can say of the modern girl that she is tender, loving, retired, or domestic." Were those words written today? No, they were written just eighty years ago, and the trouble had started with the alleged flaunting of ankles on the Parade at Brighton, England. It was said that "at the seaside most of the young ladies are thinking of the admiration they hope to excite and reveal in the mincing airs they assume at the approach of the opposite sex."

The furore about ankles eighty years ago seems incredibly remote when the beaches of today are crowded with brown-skinned holiday-makers but Victorians took the matter of dress very seriously. It had social significance. Its aim was to indicate the wearer's social position — whether she was single or married, owned a carriage and a lady's maid. In fact, it almost told you the size of her income. If the lady was very young it conveyed the impression that her papa could doubtless afford a comfortable dowry and if she was married that

her husband was in a sound financial and social position.

It was essential that her dress, her small gloved hands and delicate air should show that the lady did no manual work. We read of a mother reproving her daughter for removing her gloves in church. "But, Mama, what is one to do if one's hands perspire?" The answer was simple: "My love, the perfect lady does not perspire." For in those far-off days the rule was that "horses sweat, gentlemen perspire but ladies—only glow."

The modern hiker might like to know what her grandmother was advised to take on a walking tour. She required, we are told, "two cotton dresses, on cashmere dress, one ulster, one alpaca dust-coat, one parasol, one umbrella, one walking stick, one pair of shoes, one pair of button boots, six pairs of stockings, two straw hats, one green veil, and a small flask of brandy in case of faintness. The woollen undergarment must come up to the neck and down to the middle of the thighs, with long sleeves; this, with flannel drawers and a light-colored petticoat is all that is needed."

That is how grandmother went hiking and she played tennis in gloves, apron, bustle and ten pounds of clothing.



Due to the jellying qualities of alginic acid, its main attraction is in the food industry. It is used as a stabilizer in icecream to keep it from settling to liquid, in chocolate milk to hold the chocolate in suspension, as a thickener in cream soups and as a fruit jelling agent, according to Mr. Walkington.

Interesting possibilities are foreseen for an alginate preparation which will make custards and puddings with cold Lumber - Coal - Wood - Baggage milk and thus eliminate the trouble of cleaning pans in which milk has been boiled. The powder is simply dissolved in water, added to the milk and

******* Professional footballers and cricket umpires have joined the parade of workers' seeking higher wages to meet increased living costs. Before the war umpires for first class cricket matches got 10 guineas (\$42) for week-end fixtures and nine guineas for midweek games. This has been increased to £13 (\$52) and £12 but they complain this still isn't enough. The footballers, who also got increases recently, are seeking further boosts. They want a maximum of £12 a week during winter and £10 during summer, instead of the £10 winter and £7 10s. wage now in force. In addition, they urge a higher minimum scale. Another complaint of the cricket umpires is proper lodgings should be provided for them when they arrive in a town where they have an engagement. Rooms are so difficult to get that often they've had to walk the streets or sleep in the cricket pavilion overnight.

Veteran race-goers recalled the turf exploits of Frank Bullock when the ex-jockey and trainer died at Branstead, Surrey, aged 61. An Australian, he rode in England from 1913 to 1925. Some of the victories Frank gained were the One Thousand Guineas and Oaks on Saucy Sue, the Goodwood Cup, Cesarewitch and Ascot Gold Cup. One sports writer said Bullock was the greatest match-rider he had ever seen, "seldom being beaten in a match, which is more often than not a test of brains." After he gave up riding Bullock became a trainer in France, Australia and India.

One of the oldest sporting events in England—the annual Doggett's Coat and Badge sculling contest for young Thames watermen-was not rowed this year. It was last held in 1939. By next year it is hoped enough youths will have returned to take part in the event, which was founded in 1715 by the Dublin - born actor, Thomas Doggett. He established a prize of a red coat with a silver arm badge for the winner of the race, to be rowed annually on August 1 by six young watermen within a year of completing their apprenticeship with the Watermen's Company. C. N. Cooper, clerk of the Fishmongers' Company, under whose auspices the event is held, said the competitors end their apprenticeship at 21 and therefore can take part only once in their lives. "During the war all the young fellows have been away and we are waiting for them to return," he said.




