IMPORTANCE OF FIRST AID IS EMPHASIZED

Importance of St. John's first aid and industrial first aid training was emphasized today by Mrs. R. S. Woods, secretary of the local St. John Ambulance group, following the initial organizational meeting for training classes held last night in the Red Cross rooms.

Admitting that last night's turnout was "disappointing Mrs. Woods asserted that merely because the wartime danger of emergency has passed there should be no slackening in appreciation of first aid training. "It is the sort of training that

enables people to cope with everyday emergencies and may save lives." she said. "In an industrial town like Prince Rupert there should be no short age of volunteers for classes."

Mrs. Woods pointed out that people with industrial first aid tickets rarely have difficulty finding jobs, because the compensation laws require that trained first aid men be employed in most industries.

"We had several applications for first aid men from business throughout the district last year," she recalled.

Instructor for this year's classes is G. Aubrey Bate of the High School teaching staff, and both the regular first aid and the industrial course will b





Greece

The Greek Foreign Affairs Committee, comprising all those statesmen who have held posts of Premier or Foreign Minister, have issued a statement that constitutes an irrefutable justification from the Greek standpoint of the presence of British troops in Greece.

After expressing sincere regret that disagreement should have arisen between Britain and Russia over the presence of British military forces, the Greece statement proceeds:

"British forces first came to our country in November, 1940, in fulfilment of an obligation previously undertaken by Britain. They came at the request of the Greek government not in order to undermine our national independence, but to fight for that independence.

"At the time of the liberation, British forces again landed in Greece, not of their own accord, but at the request of the Greek government, and as the result of an agreement concluded in Italy and signed by all political parties without exception, including those of the extreme left.

"No one can fail to appreciate the compelling need that then existed for the presence of British forces in Greece, if he remembers that the Greek State was at that moment in a condition of utter dislocation and deprived of armed forces, police and administrative machinery, as also of the indispensible means for organizing the services. For that reason, the landing of the British forces was truly a most fortunate event.

"Since that time, the British forces remain in this country in accordance with the desire and free consent of all the successive governments, which have realized that the presence of these troops has been and is indispensable for the restoration of the rights of the people and for the prevention of recurring internecine strife.

"It is unnecessary to add that all Greeks are jealously attached to their national independence. They acquiesce in the presence of British troops solely because they clearly understand that no threat whatever could result from friendly collaboration with these forces."

The statement concludes: "Greece stands in need of all the Great Powers and makes no distinction between them. She appeals to them that, by avoiding misunderstanding and in a spirit of mutual goodwill, they may avert divergencies of opinion between them and devote themselves wholeheartedly to the task of rehabilitating humanity and more particularly of restoring the small, weak nations from the suffering of war."

It is pointed out in London that this declaration, at once spontaneous and unanimous, of a distinguished body of Greek statesmen, puts in a nutshell the rejoinder to the Russian criticism.

Whifflets From The Waterfront

C.N.R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. Ernest Caldwell, arrived in port at 12:30 today from Vancouver with passengers and cargo and is scheduled to sail at midnight for Ketchikan.

A profile of the bottom of Prince Rupert harbor, as recorded by an echo-sounding device on a herring seiner in search of herring shows the harbor bottom to be a series of pinnacles and depressions of greatly varying depth. Astonishing is the ability of the echo-sounder to chart not only the sea bottom. but also schools of herring, their depth and thickness, without distorting the picture of the sea bottom below. While the chart, recorded with a brush on a long. narrow strip of paper, revealed schools of herring, the fish were very small and of no commercial interest. 





CHOWDER-A creircious vegetable chowder for six requires one cup of diced raw potatoes, one cup diced raw carrots, two cups of tomatoes (raw or canned) two cablespoons finely chopped celery, 1/2 cup white beans which have been picked over and soaked overnight, 1/8 teaspoon of pepper. Add sufficient water to cover the vegetables. Simmer slowly until tender, at which time the water should be almost boiled away. Add one cup of rich milk or cream, bring to scalding point. Serve hot. A second vegetable chowder, also for six persons, requires one cup of canned corn, two cups canned tomato, one cup canned peas, one cup canned string beans, two raw diced potatoes, one small diced onion, two stalks diced celery. Salt and pepper to taste. Put all together in a saucepan. Simmer slolwy until potatoes are tender. Season with salt and pepper. Add one cup rich cream or milk and serve very hot.

CARROT SOUP - Cream of carrot soup for four calls for two cups of chopped carrot, two tablespoons of butter, two cups of milk, four tablespoons of flour salt and pepper to taste. Cook the carrots and onions in two cups of water for 10 minutes. Press through a sieve. Melt butter Add flour. Cook until frothy. Add vegetable puree and milk and stir until thickened. Add seasonings.


