China Moves To End Its Civil War

Communists and Government Leaders Are Working On Terms Of Truce

CHUNGKING (CP) — Chinese Communists and government leaders last night reached agreement on procedures for ending hostilities and restoring communications in strife-split China, an official statement said. Individual representatives of the two factions have been appointed to confer on steps to carry out cease-fire procedures.

Jap Crisis—Cabinet In Emergency

Means of Complying With Latest Demands of General MacArthur Are Under Consideration

TOKYO — Premier Shidehara's storm-tossed cabinet, weathering the first shock of General Douglas MacArthur's political purge, today postponed until Sunday a scheduled emergency session to discuss ways of compliance.

STAGED RIOTS IN OTTAWA PRISON

OTTAWA — Three men being held for trial on charges of murdering Detective Stoneman of the Ottawa City Police Force last October staged a riot in Ottawa's Carleton County Jail last night. They escaped from their cells in some manner not yet known, tied up two guards, slugged a third and turned fire hoses on, flooding three floors of the building. The trio apparently was trying to escape but thought better of it when a guard screamed.

No Trace Is Found Of Schooner Crew

PORTLAND, Me. — Coast-guard officials reported yesterday that the Canadian motor schooner Levallant sank December 18 last while enroute from the West Indies to Nova Scotia with no survivors located in an extensive aerial and surface search.

RACING AT SARATOGA

Will Be Resumed Next Year, It Is Announced

NEW YORK — Word from Albany, New York, says horse racing will return to Saratoga Springs next August after a four-year break during the war. The State Racing Commission will announce early next week assignment of the four-week period from August 5 to August 31, inclusive, to the Saratoga Racing Association. This is one week less than the normal five-week Saratoga season. However, the Saratoga Association will conduct a two-week meeting at Jamaica, beginning July 22. The purpose of this two-week affair is to permit the Saratoga Association to build up a bankroll in order to offer more stake races and larger purses during its regular season.

HERFORD, Germany — Six AWOL American soldiers have been arrested for conducting large-scale train robberies and black market operations in Germany during the last 18 months.

LONDON — The arrest of three Canadian Army men in Holland has prompted reaction on both sides of the Atlantic. A London announcement discloses Prime Minister Mackenzie King and Netherlands Premier Wilhelm Schermerhorn have been in communication over the matter.

Hitler Plan—Had Eyes On Switzerland

Not Explained Why Fuehrer Failed to Go Ahead With Attack in 1943

BERNE, Switzerland — The Swiss government has issued a document asserting Adolf Hitler intended to attack and partition Switzerland early in 1943. The attack is said to have been set for some time in February. The document does not say why the German attack never materialized but it does say that hundreds of suspected German fifth columnists were arrested by the Swiss officials.

WOULD CONVICT GENERAL STAFF

American Prosecutors at Nuernberg Are Embarked Upon Difficult Task

NUERNBERG, German — American prosecutors have started one of the most controversial and probably most difficult tasks in the entire trial of 22 ranking Nazis—the effort to convict the entire German general staff and high command as a criminal organization which willingly lent its services in the Nazi plot to wage aggressive wars.

VANCOUVER AIR ROUTE

BUILD UP PEARSON
LONDON — London newspapers are giving a big build-up to L. B. Pearson, Canadian ambassador to the United States, for the secretary-generalship of the United Nations Organization, a survey revealed today. The position is one of the most vital in the world.

NATION-WIDE STRIKE
NEW YORK — Frank J. Fitzsimmons, president of the Western Electric Railway Employees' Association, said today that the three-day-old strike by his union was just about ready to explode "into a nation-wide telephone workers' walk-out."

HIMMLER WAS COWARD
NUERNBERG — Heinrich Himmler, once dreaded chief of the SS, was pictured today as a fumbling coward who "slowly came apart" and spent his last days as a shivering wreck with a vial of poison constantly at his fingertips.

MONGOLIAN INDEPENDENCE
CHUNGKING — The Chinese Nationalist government today recognized the independence of Russian-influenced Outer Mongolia.

OUT FOR LOW RENTS
TORONTO — It has been disclosed at the Ontario Labor-Progressive Party's conference in Toronto that the party plans to conduct a Dominion-wide campaign for low-rental housing.

NEW ADJUTANT-GENERAL
OTTAWA — Major-General Ernest G. Weeks of Charlottetown is Canada's new adjutant-general. The 42-year-old general is a Commander of the Order of the British Empire and in addition holds both the Military Cross and bar. He replaces Major-General A. Ernest Walford of Montreal.

NEW STAMP ISSUE
OTTAWA — An announcement is expected shortly from Ottawa concerning a forthcoming issue of new Canadian stamps. Wartime designs will bow out while it is expected that the King will be pictured on some denominations of the new issue.

SAMMY SNEED LEADING AT LOS ANGELES

LOS ANGELES — Sammy Sneed has taken the first-round lead in the 72-hole Los Angeles open golf tournament with a three-under-par 68. Trailing just one stroke in second place are Jimmy Demarest and Jim Ferrer. Vic Ghezzi is in fourth spot with 70, and shotmaster Byron Nelson is fifth with 71.

LUMBER LACK STOPS WORK

Two Thousand Persons in Small Boatyards Down Coast May Be Thrown Out

VANCOUVER — Garry Culhane, secretary of the Shipyard General Workers' Federation, said yesterday that inability to get lumber was threatening to close down a number of small boatyards in Vancouver and Fraser Valley areas, affecting employment of 2,000 workers. He said he was protesting to Minister of Reconstruction C. D. Howe at Ottawa.

DOG TEAM ON WAY

RIO CONFERENCE
RIO DE JANEIRO — Brazil announces that she is going ahead with plans for holding the Inter-American Conference at the end of March. The conference was originally planned for last October but it was postponed when the United States refused to sit with Argentina in drawing up a hemisphere security pact. Presumably Argentina will participate in the coming session, unless some joint hemisphere action is taken to prevent that.

SCYTHIA AT HALIFAX
HALIFAX — The steamers Scythia arrived at Halifax today with 3400 veterans from overseas. She had a smooth crossing by way of St. John's, Newfoundland.

POLITICAL VICTIMS
LEON, Mexico — Thirty men, women and children have been listed as dead as the result of political disorders in Leon on Wednesday.

NEW BRITISH FACTORIES
LONDON — Three hundred new factories are to be built in various parts of England where postwar industrial conditions are bad. The scheme was originally proposed by the Churchill government and is being carried on by the Attlee administration.

PAPERS STRIKE-TIED
CLEVELAND — Three Cleveland daily newspapers are tied up by a pressmen's strike.

BRITAIN NEEDS TRADE
OTTAWA — White loans from the United States and Canada are helping to tide her over, permanent relief for Britain will come only by trade in world markets, Rt. Hon. Herbert Morrison told the Ottawa Canadian Club today.

POLE IN ROME
ROME — Zbigniew Stypulkowski, 41, one of 16 Polish leaders who were spirited away to Moscow on charges of sabotage, arrived here mysteriously today after serving a four-month sentence in a Soviet prison. He said that the group went to Moscow under the impression that they were to be the guests of Marshal Zhukov but instead they wound up in prison.

INCLUDED IN KING'S HONORS

Group Captain E. C. Tennant And Wing Commander I. M. MacKinnon

Two names of interest in Prince Rupert are contained in the list of awards made in the King's New Year Honor List to personnel of the Royal Canadian Air Force who served in Canada. One is Officer of the British Empire to Group Captain Ernest Clare Tennant, former commanding officer of the Seal Cove air base and a pioneer of the old R.C.A.F. fisheries patrol service on this coast upwards of 20 years ago. Another is that of Member of the Order of the British Empire to Wing Commander Ian Malcolm MacKinnon, now representative at Prince Rupert of War Assets Corporation.

SEARCHING FOR FISHERMAN HERE

City police are investigating the reported disappearance of Ernest Moe, local fisherman, who is said not to have been seen since 10:30 p.m. on January 2. Moe lived alone on the boat Ida, moored at the Union Oil wharf. The report of his disappearance was brought in by E. Falck, a friend of Moe, after a search failed to reveal Moe's whereabouts.

Meyer Gets No Quarter

German Who Murdered Canadians After Normandy Must Face Execution

LONDON — Canadian military headquarters announces that the petition of Major-General Kurt Meyer, SS divisional commander, against a death sentence imposed upon him by a Canadian military court at Aurich, Germany, has been disallowed. Meyer was convicted on a charge or responsibility for the shooting of eighteen Canadian prisoners. No date has yet been set for the execution of the sentence imposed a week ago for atrocities committed shortly after the Normandy invasion.

ANOTHER JAP IS CONDEMNED

Lieut. Col. Ohta to Be Executed for Series of War Crimes

MANILA — A United States military tribunal in Manila has condemned Lieut. Col. Seichi Ohta to be hanged. The tribunal said it found Ohta guilty of not one crime but a systematic series of crimes committed over a period of time. Ohta was commander of the Japanese secret police in Manila during the Japanese occupation of the islands. No date has been set for the hanging.

Asked to Quit B.C. University

VANCOUVER — Sixty-two students of the University of British Columbia have been asked to withdraw because of low marks obtained at the Christmas examinations, it was announced yesterday. None of the total were ex-service students.

ENCAMPED AT COURT HOUSE

Police Intervene in Unique Demonstration at Vancouver

VANCOUVER — Two veterans of the last war—Robert McEwen and Henry Fuhr—late yesterday pitched a tent on the lawn surrounding the Vancouver Court House in protest against lack of housing for returned veterans and lit a fire with wood gathered from lanes nearby. However, under orders from the police, they put the fire out. Crowds gathered around but left after the fire dimmed. After four hours, the two men themselves left. They had originally planned staying overnight, eating in cafes and keeping warm by the fire.

RETURNS HERE FROM OVERSEAS

After serving overseas for three years, Signalman Arnold Tweed, son of Mr. and Mrs. O. Tweed, 1089 Ambrose Avenue, arrived in the city on last night's train. He crossed recently on the Queen Elizabeth. While overseas, Signalman Tweed was married to an English girl, a private in the women's territorial army, who will be arriving here later. A second son of Mr. and Mrs. Tweed, Private Omar Tweed, is also home on New Year leave. Both boys enlisted in Edmonton and will proceed to Vancouver to take their discharges with a view to locating here later.

MISSING IN BIG STORM

Logger-Prospector Discoverer Of Privateer Mines and Two Sons May Have Perished in Victoria Storm

VICTORIA — Joe Pedneault, aged 46, who, with his brother, Louis, forsook logging to discover the rich Privateer mine on the west coast of Vancouver Island, is missing with his two sons, Philip, 13, and Eugene, 10. Police say that Pedneault and the sons left in their 32-foot pleasure cruiser Thursday morning for Pedder Bay, intending to return the same night. It is believed they may have been caught in the terrific wind and rain storm that lashed the island and lower mainland Thursday morning and part of the afternoon.

Fort Fraser Man Gets Dutch Award

Bronze Cross of the Order Nassau with Swords was recently conferred by the Netherlands government upon Pte. Joseph Michael Walton of Fort Fraser in recognition of services in connection with the liberation of Holland by the Canadian Army. Four hundred and thirty-five Canadian officers and men were honored by the Netherlands government.

CHINESE GOV'T FEELS ANNOYED

Resent Arrest and Deportation by French of Alleged Pro-Nazi

SHANGHAI — A spokesman for the French government in Shanghai has defended the arrest and deportation of a suspected French pro-Nazi. The arrest was made by French officials in Shanghai and the action roused the ire of the Chinese government. The French official stated today: "We cannot let China interfere with what we consider our extra-territorial rights."

Canada, Britain and the United States relinquished their extra-territorial rights in China in 1943 but France did not join the movement at that time, a fact which rankled Chungking. The suspected French pro-Nazi is Paul Tosoli, now on his way to French Indo-China aboard a French cruiser.

Local Navy Men To Be Welcomed

In the first "welcome home" affair to be held expressly in honor of veterans returning from the war, the local Ladies' Auxiliary to the Navy League of Canada will entertain the men of the Navy next Friday night in the Oddfellows' Hall. A surplus of funds left over from the ladies' war work will be extended in connection with the affair of which the convener is Mrs. Robert Murray, assisted by Mrs. J. R. Elfert, president; Mrs. A. L. Holtby, secretary, and all the other ladies. DeCarlo's orchestra has been engaged to provide the music. It is estimated that about 100 men who served in the Navy have already returned home to Prince Rupert.

BEAU JACK TO MEET GRECO

Welterweight Title Bout Scheduled for Garden February 8

NEW YORK — Beau Jack has signed to meet Montreal welterweight Johnny Greco in New York's Madison Square Gardens February 8. Jack placed his name on the dotted line last night after scoring a slam-bang four-round knockout over Morris Reif in a Gardens bout. The February ten-round feature will be the first appearance for the Montreal boxer in New York since he won a rubber decision from Tony Janiro of Youngstown, Ohio, several weeks ago.

The Moscow Talks . . .

The text of the series of agreements reached at the Moscow Conference has now been published. There are no secret agreements and the results of the Conference are there in black and white for the world to judge. The United Kingdom press of all shades of opinion has unanimously passed judgment that the Conference may be reckoned as a successful diplomatic enterprise. London commentators observe that the three Foreign Secretaries set out primarily to attain two aims, one psychological, the other practical and specific. The first aim was to recreate the atmosphere of mutual confidence which had faded since last September. The second aim was to reach agreement on the control of atomic energy. As regards the first aim, this could only be attained by the three parties

giving immediate tangible proofs of their goodwill. It could not be attained simply by ornate phraseology. It was therefore necessary as a preliminary to solve the deadlock of September which had marked the turning point in the dimming of mutual confidence. The deadlock has been solved and the doors opened to a frank and friendly approach to the two areas with the conduct of affairs in which one or the other of the parties to the Conference had expressed dissatisfaction. These areas were Japan and the Balkans for the administration of which accord was reached. As for atomic energy, Mr. Bevin and Mr. Byrnes secured M. Molotov's adherence to the Truman-Attlee-Mackenzie King proposal for control through a commission of the United Nations Organization. Russian co-operation is vital to this Washington plan and it had been feared that Russia might look askance at a scheme elaborated by the U.S., Britain and Canada alone. It was agreed in Moscow that the terms of reference of the Atomic Commission should stand as drafted in Washington. A nice balance was maintained between the Security Council and the General Assembly and this proposed solution of the atomic problem is generally hailed as the crowning achievement of the Moscow Conference.

FIGHTING UNEMPLOYMENT

Daily News.—I feel sure the organization I represent, composed in the main of persons already unemployed and some actually destitute, will welcome the announcement by the executive of the Prince Rupert Labor Council pressing for joint action by their council with the Trades and Labor Council to do something about the situation in which many of us find ourselves.

As yet, we have no definite intimation as to when our building will cease to operate its normal program and services. Until such time as we are notified by our headquarters in Vancouver of an official closing date, we will continue to render a maximum service to all military and ex-service personnel in the Prince Rupert Area. We can still utilize the assistance of volunteer workers and hostesses in the various activities and are deeply grateful for the work that they have performed for us in the past. When a closing date for the Y.M.C.A. War Services Building is given, we will not hesitate to let this information become known to all. Thanking you for your courtesy, HARVARD P. Meanwhile my group will continue to fight on the issues it is already taking up, such as reduction of Staff House and Wartime Housing rents for laid-



BUY MORE WAR SAVINGS STAMPS

Waterfront Whiffs
New Boats Being Built Here—Troller Stalin Is Latest—Resumption of Fishing Season Soon.

A 46-foot trolling boat with an illustrious name was launched at the Cow Bay boat shop of Ole Wick Friday afternoon and, in spite of initial difficulties, the vessel promises to be one of the finest of the Prince Rupert trolling fleet. She was the vessel Stalin, built for Frank Amstutz, formerly of Butedale. Named presumably after a man in Russia, the Stalin, nor her owner or builder, need have any apologies for her difficulties in achieving her intended element for, after all, Uncle Joe himself suffered a few tribulations before he got into his stride.

Smacked on the stem by a bottle of genuine champagne (large size) wielded by Mrs. Amstutz, wife of the owner, the Stalin made excellent progress toward the water until half her length had passed from the supports. Then the tip of her stem caught on a rafter of the boat shop and she stopped.

Spurred by the threat that the fast-falling tide might leave the vessel stranded, workmen rushed with pry-poles and jacks to push the Stalin free and, with assistance from a truck which gave a tug astern from the Cow Bay bridge, the vessel bounded into the water shortly after 2 o'clock.

Except for that portion which will be disposed of by agreement between the Canadian and British governments, British Columbia's canned salmon pack will be sold on the open market this year. Gone will be the marketing controls which channelled it into overseas food baskets as part of the war effort. Predictions are that the remainder of the B.C. salmon pack will be sold, with other canned fish, on the open market. No trouble is anticipated in selling B.C.'s canned herring pack on the European continent.

showing up within the month. Herring seining began in this area in January last year.

First issue of the Department of Transport's list of Canadian Shipping issued to the public since the start of the war has been made recently available to the public. Published annually during the war, the volume has been restricted for official use because it contained an up-to-date roster of newly-built Canadian ships.

The keel of a 40-foot semi-v bottom troller was recently laid at Kaien Industries' Cow Bay boat shop and the boat will be ready for service in the spring. It is being built for Vincent Ubbelle, veteran troller, who was formerly a partner in the boat Horizon. With a transom stern, the new vessel will have a length of 40 feet, a beam of 13 feet, and a draft of 5 feet. Her broad beam and semi-v bottom, her builders aver, will eliminate the need for large quantities of ballast, and yet give a fast, substantial boat. It is expected that she will be powered by a Chrysler 110 h.p. Crown gasoline engine, and swing a 28-inch propeller with a 20-inch pitch.
