

# Acted Directly Under Instruction of Moscow

Four Accused Are Identified—One Has Pleaded Guilty-Two Men, Two Women

OTTAWA (CP) — The government announced today that four civil servants have communicated, directly or indirectly, "secret and confidential information" to representatives of Russia in violation of the Official Secrets Act of 1939. The announcement was made by Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King who identified the four persons as:

Mrs. Emma Woikin. Capt. Gordon Lunan. Edward Wilfrid Mazerall. Kathleen Mary Willsher.

The names were given in an interim report of the Royal Commission probing the secret espionage ring in Canada.

Mrs. Woikin, cipher clerk in the External Affairs Department, communicated to the Russians contents of a secret telegram.

Lunan, member of the Canadian Information Service, was described by Mr. King as "head of a group of agents" acting under personal direction properties over to the local selfof Lieut.-Col Rogov, assisiant military attache to proclaimed outonomous governthe Russian embassy here.

The interim report said that "evidence indicates that, in addition, many other agents were active and information more incrinsically important has been disclosed.

"We are not, however, as yet in a position to report with regard thereto as the evidence has not been fully developed," the Prime Minister said.

The Commission said it was reporting four persons' names because the investigation into their part of the spy ring had been concluded.

The report made no reference to charges which might be laid against the persons named nor did it refer to nine other persons known to have been in custody since the investigation was made public February 15.

Later, however, Mrs. Woikin was arraigned in magistrate's court and pleaded guilty to providing information to Russian agents. The other three did not enter pleas or elect how they wished to be

The report said that the evidence established "a network of undercover agents has been organized and developed for the purpose of obtaining secret and confidential information, particularly from employees of departments and agencies of Dominion government and from employees of the office of the High Commissioner for the United Kingdom in Canada."

It is disclosed that these operations were carried on "under direct instructions from Moscow" by "certain members of the staff of the Soviet embassy in Ottawa."

The information had to do with atomic energy, radar and troop movements.

"The government's handling of the current spy scare is nothing more than a cold-blooded political manoeuvre designed to detract attention from the Soviet Union's indictment of imperialism at the UNO meetings and to lay the basis for a witch hunt in Canada at a time when the labor movement is uniting to fight Canadian big business for a living wage for Canadian local Labor Progressive leader, workers." ## IRAN BEFORE U.N.O. AGAIN

Sure to Be Brought Up At Next Session

LONDON (P-A British newspaper, The Times, says the Iranian situation likely will be brought up again before the next meeting of the U.N.O. Security Council on March 21. The article terms the Soviet delay in withdrawing from some Persian provinces "the most serious crisis since the war." It adds that Russia may either stay completely out of the next council session or send a less-important representative than Foreign Commissar Molotov or Vice-Commissar Vishinsky.

The Iranian political undersecretary of state, Prince Firouz, says Soviet troops are staying in troubled areas of his country as a "friendly gesture." He points out that in Azerbaijan there is no central government official to accept the Soviet installations and, says the Prince, the Russians can not turn the ment without recognizing that

Automobile Association Surveys Highway Situation and Expresses Ideas

As an immediate solution to the snowslide trouble which has tied the Prince Rupert High way outside a railway tunnel just west of Kwinitsa during the past winter and which also caused interruption a year ago, a reconnaissance committee of the Prince Rupert Automobile Association, headed by President J. Harry Black, which visited the scene yesterday, believes that a trestle should be put in to skirt the snow slide area on the outside. The permanent solution, however, would be by moving the road out by means of rock fill and heavy cribbing. This was stated by Mr. Black this morning following the trip.

The party went out on the boat Chief Tapeet from Prince. Rupert to Port Essington, crossing the river in the small boat Kinky to skirt the highway from Tyee to the slide. They found the road almost bare of snow from Tyee to the slide except for a few small patches and a couple of slides, one 100 feet long and 10 feet deep.

As for the big slide about a mile and a half this side of Kwinitsa, it is about 500 feet long with a maximum depth of 75 feet and an average depth over the length of about thirty largely of soft, wet snow with little debris visible and only slight evidence of rock, reports Mr. Black.

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#### Keep to Objective

Negotiations looking to the acquisition of the Y.M.C.A. war services building here as Prince Rupert's civic centre appear to have reached a critical stage. Maybe, in our enthusiasm, we had been moving too fast.

The whys and wherefores of the situation which has arisen, it is to be hoped, will not be the source of too much recrimination. In the disappointment we all must feel over the frustation of the immediate materialization of our plans we should not get too downhearted or disgust-

Mistakes may have been made and too much taken for granted but it is well that what has occurred should guide rather than confuse in new and further efforts towards the achievement of our ultimate objective. The civic centre is still the thing and our continued discussions and endeavours should be directed toward bringing it about as safely and speedily as possible.

\_Under the present circumstances. it would be easy enough to reach a position which would face the whole project with undue delay or complete collapse. There is no need for that, however. After all, we have not lost anything as yet-not even the war services building-but careful and considered steering will be needed henceforth.

We may have to go quite a long way back in our dealings and plans but, if we continue to work together without backbiting and with unity of purpose, there can yet be a successful culmination in the full realizaished and planned-

Such mistakes as have been made were in the enthusiasm for the project and it is very important that nothing should be done now that would dampen that enthusiasm.

#### Would Be Welcome Here

It is interesting to hear that the University of British Columbia, feeling that its extension activities might be more efficaciously carried out and made more far-reaching in their benefits to the people as a whole, is considering the advisability of setting up an office in Prince Rupert from which courses and classes for this city and district could be organized. All that the University would like from this end is an expression of local interest and, given this, we are informed is ready to establish a field headquarters for the purpose of organizing programs of cultural and educational activities along broad and varied lines, the

Now is the time for the presentation of all possible ideas and the full and patient consideration thereof. Once we have our civic centre, we will have assumed a large and permanent responsibility and it is well that we should give careful consideration to all the terms and circumstances and their effect upon the carrying through of the undertak-

To those who would criticize now and were not bold enough to do so before when criticism might have been more timely, we would suggest that they forego such criticism unless it be along useful and constructive lines containing something more than the mere possibility of making the more difficult an already embarrassing situation.

The need of a successful and workable outcome of our civic centre ambition is still our main concern.

On the face of it, we would venture to suggest that a joint operation of the Y.M.C.A. war services building as a combination of armory and civic centre under an arrangement of prior control of the Army would not work out so well. Talk of the Army being an essential part of community activity notwithstanding, it is difficult to imagine that there would not be continual conflict of interests with the two activities endeavouring to share the same house. We are not minimizing the importance and necessity of military training but the Army would have to be changed a lot, we are convinced, if it were to be wedded in this manner to the activities that would be carried on, a great deal of them for children and the youth, within the purview of a civic centre.

It might be better to let the Y.M. C.A. building go altogether as a civic centre than endeavour to operate under such conditions.

principal concern being that they are as interesting and useful as possible in their relation to local desires and requirements.

There need be no hesitation in assuring the University that Prince Rupert is sadly lacking in these very sort of things and that their provision here would be most welcome, particularly at this time when questions of rehabilitation, adult education, youth welfare and social relationships are commanding so much attention.

So let us accept the hint which the University itself extends and take the steps necessary to embrace this opportunity to improve our community lot.


