The Root of Conflict

A HILE THE ACCENT OF LATE has been on differences between Soviet Russia on the one hand and Great Britain and the United States on the other, it is not to be forgotten that there are economic differences almost as fundamental in the national policies of Great Britain and the United States. One is embarked on a great experiment in domestic nationalism or state socialism. The other is tending toward the right in the direction of economic imperialism. Great Britain and the United States are both looking toward world trade for their domestic prosperity with Great Britain making the greater sacrifice for the time being at least to develop that world trade.

Economic problems have been at the root of almost all wars of the past. While we talk of disarmament and the control of the weapons of war making, it is of the primary importance that the economic causes of war should also be brought under control by mutual understanding and forbearance. In the final analysis, survival is man's principal concern in life. If there is to be survival there cannot be predacity. There is no need for predacity one human of another because there is plenty of goods in the world, developed or possible of development, to ensure the good livelihood and happiness of all the world's peoples. To effect such insurance is the elementary and the collossal problem which faces mankind.

VOTING NOT ENOUGH

THOSE WHO VOTE at the civic elections on Thursday, December 12, can feel the satisfaction of the citizen who exercises the primary privilege of a free man.

Marking a ballot at election time serves, however, only one of the purposes of good citizenship, as honest, just and intelligent government is a partnership affair, more so in the intimate basic unit of government represented by civic elections than any other.

It is not sufficient that we complacently elect to office a mayor, five aldermen and five school trustees, and then rest content that our obligation has been met.

Just as the religious man does not fulfill his purpose by going to church once a year, no more does the citizen meet all the obligations of good citizenship by filling in a ballot form.

Such obligations include the need of not only keeping informed, but of expressing and keeping in the fore the qualities desired by ratepayers of their representatives.

It means encouraging of publicminded citizens to volunteer their services in the interests of the city.

Nor should this encouragement develop only toward nomination day, on December 9, but should be extended during the year, that candidates may be groomed for office and become known to their fellow citizens.

Voting is no enough.

FALSE ECONOMICS

YOUNG HOODLUM heaves a brick through the window of a baker's shop. A crowd gathers; several of its members state that the misfortune has its bright side: it will make business for the glazier. The glazier will have \$50 more to spend with other merchants, and these in turn will have \$50 more to spend with still other merchants. Therefore, they say, the smashed window will go on providing money and employment in ever-widening circles.

Now let us take another look. The act of vandalism will mean more business for the glazier, but the shopkeeper will be out \$50 he was planning to spend for a new tailmade suit. Instead of having a window and \$50, he now has only a window. The glazier's gain of business is merely the tailor's loss of business, so no new employment has been

KING'S APPEAL

TOO LITTLE WORK and too little enthusiasm within the party was candidly ascribed by Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King, speaking in Quebec at the end of the week, as the cause of unexpected and unnecessary reverses which the Liberal party has suffered in recent byelections. Party organizations have been allowed to languish in districts and communities. Strong individuals who kept party spirit and organization alive have in many cases passed on or become inactive with no provision made for carrying on. There has been lack of interest on the part of the younger people who have been too busy in the pursuit of business or pleasure. The political enthusiasm that used to fire people seems to be gone—at least as far as the older parties are concerned.

One political party in the Dominion, at least, has been able to command and sustain a modicum of interest and enthusiasm through persistent preaching of the gospel and the development of personal and social contacts. For some fifteen years now it has been active and industrious in the field of organization in season and out. The two other parties-and the government party particularly-have been content to hibernate between elections. It would be interesting to know just how many people in this country today have the foggiest idea of any of the fundamental principles of Liberalism and Conservativism or between free enterprise and straight socialism for that matter. Certainly the great majority of younger people neither know nor care for one reason because no effort has been made to instruct them.

If Mackenzie King's party is faltering today, and Mr. King himself appears to admit that it is, it has nothing but itself to blame. It has failed to keep its political fences mended. Within communities and by individuals no work has been done and no interest has been shown. The party, so long in power, has been much to passive these last several years and Mr. King himself realizes it when he says there should not have been defeat in Portage la Prairie, Pontiac and Parkdale for that matter. Mr. King's call to Liberals to save themselves as a party is as applicable to Prince Rupert as anywhere-perhaps more so.
