DENVER (CP) - Army vehicles bucked huge snowdrifts today to get food to hundreds of families and thousands of head of livestock as Red Cross headquarters were set up to relieve suffering caused by southeastern Colorado's worst blizzard in years.

Planes are ready to fly hay to snowbound cattle and sheep which cannot be reached by Army vehicles that plowed drifts, some of them ten to eighteen feet high.
