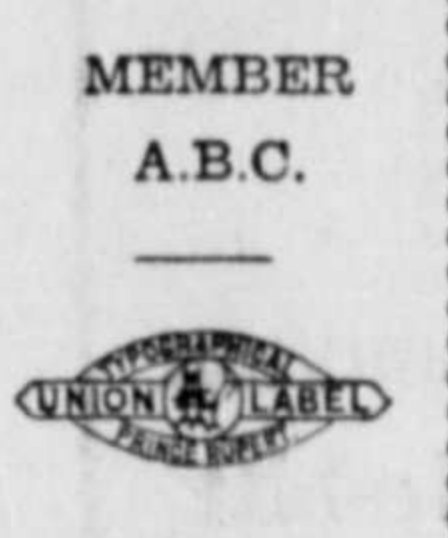

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Take Over the Air Base

As the opening up and development of north and central British Columbia proceeds in the post-war era, civil aviation will, doubtless, play an increasingly important part. Possibly, Prince Rupert people do not fully realize the vital necessity of permanent aviation basing and servicing facilities being established here.

Heretofore, the occasional commercial planes that have come here have been able to land and gas up at some oil station or marine float. With the larger planes of today and more modern equipment, that will no longer be good enough.

It is most important in considering our development as the business and trading centre of northern and central British Columbia that we should be looking very seriously to the position we may occupy on the air map. Very definitely if we do not take some steps to equip the port for the handling of commercial aircraft, we will be left off that map. Commercial air service, for which we

have long expressed a desire, will come here the much sooner if there are the facilities to accommodate and service it.

We have talked about the need of an airport here. There may be some difficulties in that regard but shortly there will be offered as a surplus war asset the Seal Cove seaplane base of the Royal Canadian Air Force, one of the most up-to-date and finest equipped terminals of its kind in the country. It can probably be had for a song, at least as far as a greater portion of the installation, which cannot be moved anyway, is concerned. The suggestion made yesterday to the Chamber of Commerce by an expert on civilian aircraft servicing that the city of Prince Rupert should exercise the priority which would fall to it if the Dominion abandons the air base and declares the property surplus is a timely one. If we can get an air base for little more than the asking, we certainly should have no hesitation about that asking. Thus we can take the first step towards making Prince Rupert the real centre of this part of the country at least for amphibious and sea-going aircraft which will, doubtless, be a factor of utmost importance in transportation back and forth among the abounding waterways of the northern hinterlands.

If the Dominion government could be induced to maintain the air base here that might be the best way but failing that it would appear most desirable that the city should acquire control of it.

AIRPORT HERE IS CIVIC NEED, AVIATION MAN TELLS CHAMBER

Chamber of Commerce Impressed and Decides That Matter Should Be Followed Up

"Airport development for post-war activity is a community must," said E. R. Carswell, aircraft servicing expert for the Standard Oil Co. of British Columbia, in urging before the council of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce yesterday afternoon that the Seal Cove air base of the Royal Canadian Air Force which is about to be declared a surplus war asset be taken over by the city of Prince Rupert with a view to becoming established as a base for civilian aviation use.

"Just as the automobile early in the century turned the black smith and buggy shops into garages and auto sales organizations employing hundreds of people, the airport will bring a brand new business into the community. Without it you will eventually find yourself off the travel routes of the world."

"No thriving community can afford not to have its air base which to the airplane is what the service station and the garage is to the automobile. Would any community today consider it wise not to have these service centres?"

"All authoritative sources concede that a prosperous community of today will lose that pros-

portunity if it did not see that it was retained.

Continuing his case, Mr. Carswell suggested that the existence of an air base here for commercial purposes would open up new business opportunities here, particularly for young men who had served in the air force during the war and were highly trained for aircraft servicing work.

The council of the Chamber gave its blessing to Mr. Carswell's ideas and asked him to submit the case for the taking over of the airport to the city authorities here. The transport committee of the Chamber was instructed to follow the matter up and give such assistance as it could in the advocacy of the city taking over the Seal Cove air base.

CANADIAN-SOVIET FRIENDSHIP

Editor, Daily News:

I have just seen your issue of March 27, which contains a letter from August Wallin announcing the discontinuance of the Prince Rupert Council for Canadian-Soviet Friendship. This is the first information that the National Council has received of such a step and for that reason I should like to comment on one or two of the points raised in Mr. Wallin's letter.

I know there has been some difficulty in getting in touch with the people of Nogaik, the Soviet city adopted by Prince Rupert on April 5, 1944. The resumption of regular mail services in completely devastated areas is no over-night job and, in some cases, has taken longer than we foresaw. In most cases of adopted cities there has been a full and free exchange of correspondence between individuals and organizations in the Russian adopted city and their opposite members in the Canadian adopting city. There is no question as to the messages from Canada being "permitted" to reach their destination or about the interest of the people in Russia in the help they have received from Canadians. It would be a great pity if difficulties in communication were allowed to prevent

the growth of friendship between Russians and Canadians.

At this time, when international relations are so disturbed, the National Council for Canadian-Soviet Friendship feels that its work is more important than ever. We plan to extend and expand our activities as much as possible, both along cultural lines and in the discussion of international affairs. I hope that at a very early date it will be possible to reconstitute the Prince Rupert Council for Canadian-Soviet Friendship.

I am also writing today to Mr. Wallin and to the Mayor of Prince Rupert to try to clear up any misunderstanding that has arisen.

CANNERY BUYS WAR BUILDINGS

Nelson Bros. Move Quickly to Replace Burned Port Edward Structure

Nelson Bros. Cannery at Port Edward has purchased three temporary apartment dwellings, formerly used by American civilian workers, to replace the large building lost by fire early Tuesday morning. The buildings, situated at the corner of Third Avenue and Eighth Street, were bought by tender from War Assets in a last minute move shortly before noon yesterday.

Tenders for the purchase of the buildings closed at noon on Tuesday and, shortly before the deadline, H. A. Robins, Nelson Bros. Port Edward manager, submitted tenders in the hope of buying the buildings to replace the lost one. The bids were successful.

A large quantity of beds, bedding and other effects needed to replace those destroyed in the fire were also purchased by Nelson Bros. from War Assets.

In consideration of the emergency, War Assets had waived its usual required time of two days between acceptance of the tender and signing of ownership papers. War Assets manager I. M. McKinnon said. The transfer was made yesterday, immediately after the bids had been accepted.

Northwest Construction Co. Ltd. has been awarded a contract to tear down the buildings from their Third Avenue sites, move them to Port Edward and re-erect them, it was learned from James Hutchison, president of that company.

The three buildings bought by Nelson Bros. yesterday are in addition to 29 Port Edward buildings bought by Nelson Bros. and B.C. Packers from War Assets last week.

The downtown buildings, demolition of which was begun Tuesday afternoon, formerly housed workers of Betehe, Price and Callahan, a construction company which did a large amount of work for the Americans here during the war.

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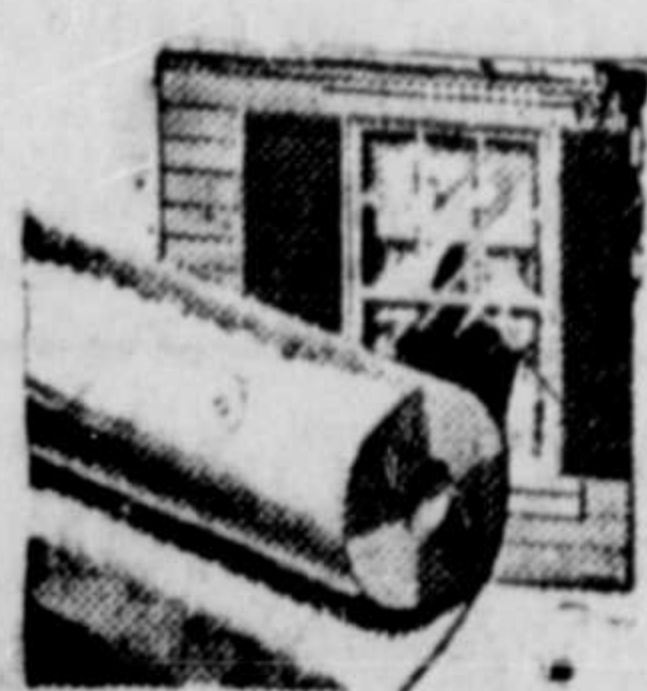

LEGION FIGHT CARD PLANNED

Attractive Looking Cauliflower Program Being Lined Up
What is expected to be as tidy a fight card as has been presented in Prince Rupert in recent years is in the making and is scheduled to be put before the city's fight fans on May 23 by the Canadian Legion. Net proceeds will be turned over by the Legion to Rup-Rec.

The Legion committee which is organizing the card has lined up some pretty fair local talent against which they hope to match some imported fighters, probably some welterweights from Vancouver and a native fighter or two from the nearby villages.
Meeting in the Legion Hall last night under the chairmanship of James Nicoll, the committee appointed Bob Houston, Ralph Smith and Art Murray to arrange for the hall and equipment. It is expected that the fight will be held in the Aeropolis Hill gym. Arrangements for a couple of welterweight fighters was left in the hands of George McGregor, Rup-Rec physical director, who wired Vancouver last night to learn what fighters would be willing to come to Prince Rupert.
Secretary of the committee is Syd Woodside and treasurer is Walter Smith. Jack Lindsay and Lee Gordon are the publicity committee.
For the main bout the boys are trying to line up an opponent for Len Hitchens, a handy resident of Prince Rupert just two years away from the welterweight championship of the Canadian Army which he won in Ottawa in 1944. Weighing 147 pounds, Len is 24 years old, and is said to be a spectacular laddie in the ring. The committee is trying to match him with a good welter from either Vancouver or Kelchikan.
Two other fighters, lined up for good spots on the card are Terry McCarthy, a lightweight, formerly of Port Alberni, who weighs 130, and Stan Church, a former Edmonton welterweight, whose fighting weight is 155. Both of these boys are now in Prince Rupert, and opponents are being sought for them.

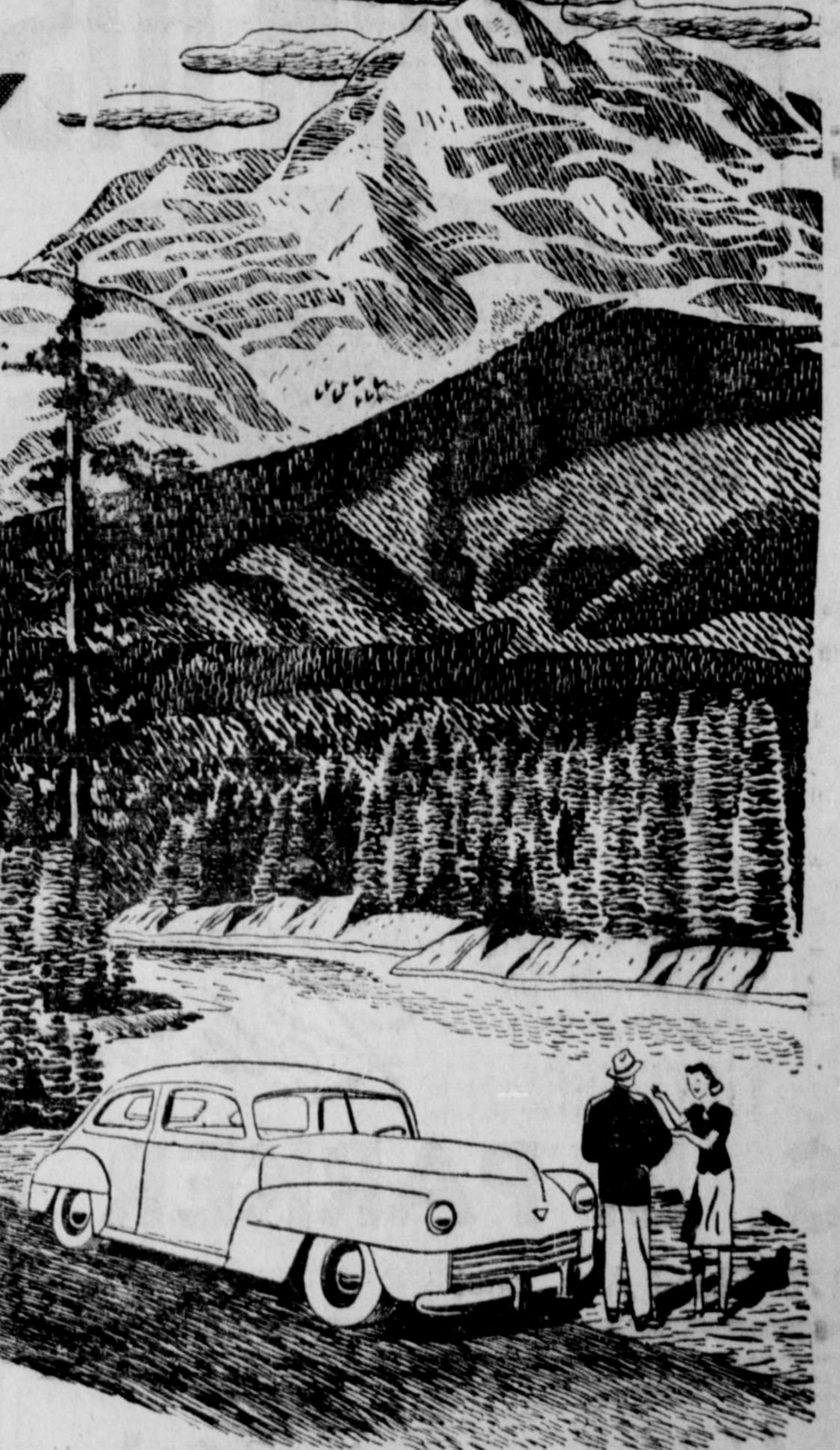

ACROPOPLIS BUILDINGS UP FOR SALE

War Assets Corporation's local office has been instructed to advertise 129 buildings comprising the former American Army cantonment in Roosevelt Park, formerly Acropolis Hill, for sale by tender, according to local manager I. M. McKinnon.

Mr. McKinnon leaves Thursday on the Prince Rupert for Vancouver on his way to Ottawa for a conference with leading officials of the Crown corporation. He expects to be back about May 1.

The buildings to come up for tender, according to Mr. McKinnon, comprise the whole cantonment—with the exception of the gymnasium which is still being left open to purchase by the City of Prince Rupert.

hydrant. They used the truck's 500-gallon pumper tank to cool the ruins with fog nozzles.

Constable W. W. Deans of the city police detachment discovered the partially burned pocket-book of Lysak where it, apparently, had been protected by Lysak's body as the latter lay on his bed, presumably fully clothed.

According to Dougaid Park, Lysak had apparently been in good health on Tuesday, and Park believes that the dead man made one, and possibly two trips to town on foot Tuesday morning.

"I saw him walking home about 11 o'clock as he went by my cabin," Parks said. "I think that he may have made another trip to town after that."

Park said that his partner, Jack Hendrick had first seen the fire sometime after two o'clock, and had called Park to look at the distant blaze to make sure that it was Lysak's cabin burning.

They then informed Ewasieuk who turned in the fire alarm.

Lysak, it was believed, was about 50 years old. He operated a small chicken ranch on the property, having a small area cleared for garden space. A former longshoreman employed by Empire Stevedoring Co. during the war, he bought the property from the city about two years ago.

His sole companion, his dog, crouched behind a nearby out-house while the firemen brought out Lysak's body from the ruins of his home.
