



## Molotov Reasonable...

RUSSIAN FOREIGN COMMISSAR V. M. MOLOTOV has made out a strong case for world disarmament before the United Nations and, incidentally, there seems to be no reason why his good faith in the matter should be questioned. Of course, in calling upon the nations "to put an end to the arms race which has begun," he implies that it is not Russia but the western powers, and particularly United States, that are responsible for the arms race. Then he proceeds to speak about the atomic bomb the secret for the making of which, as far as the world knows, United States is still in sole possession. Reasonably enough he proposes that the atomic bomb be outlawed and that the United States dispose of its stock of these terrible weapons.

Certainly the use of the atomic bomb in warfare cannot be permitted to go on, else the whole world might be destroyed.

If the situation were reversed and Russia had the atomic bomb and we did not, we could not be expected to disarm, much less abandon measures to combat the atomic bomb with all the strength at our command. We would certainly be in an arms race then.

Thinking people do not need to be told that world peace cannot be assured or that disarmament can be agreed upon if any one nation exclusively holds great power over another. World peace can only be assured by international arrangement and agreement on control of the instruments of war. And the atomic bomb is the major instrument of war now.

### A BANK REPORTS

MAINTAINING the modern trend in bank statements which it initiated a year ago, the Bank of Montreal today publishes its annual report covering financial transactions with more than 1,500,000 customers in the form of a well-illustrated and readily-understandable story of 1946 operations.

The story, told simply and clearly, is one of record-breaking deposit figures, all-time high resources and an indication of the general prosperity of Canadians during the year. As the Bank of Montreal puts it, the annual statement shows the "Human Facts Behind the Figures" in ex-

amples of individual transactions that make up the statistics of a record year of financial operation.

In many ways, this report of one of Canada's senior financial institutions reflects conditions as they exist in Canada today. Deposits in the Bank of Montreal, for instance, now stand at \$1,736,000,000, the highest in its history and more than \$100,000,000 above the figure of last year. While indicating that Canadians generally are better off financially than they have been for a number of years, the same increase provides reassuring proof that the citizens of the nation are themselves wisely safeguarding against runaway inflation through their personal financing.

The highway situation came in for considerable discussion which culminated in a resolution asking the provincial government to assume responsibility of maintenance in a general way and to take steps to obviate tie-up by snow conditions such as occurred last winter as a result of the big slide at Kwinita. Clearing up of the question of the use of the right-of-way of the railway along the lower Skeena is also advocated so that the matter of jurisdiction may be settled once and for all.

Another resolution protests at the change in income tax exemption for married women which has had the effect of practically driving married women out of

work in fields where they are badly needed.

A letter of appreciation was ordered sent to Former Premier T. D. Pattullo, for many years M. L. A. for Prince Rupert, acknowledging his long record of service for the riding and the province and extending to him best wishes for many happy years in retirement.

A vote of thanks was passed to the retiring president and it was decided to have a mixed business and social meeting late in January.

In the bulletin the board really "lets down its hair," and tries to answer the many questions asked by consumers.

**SHORT SPORT**

Don Bradman, world-famous Australian batsman, signalized his return to first-class cricket after an absence of eight years by hitting up a century in his second match at Sydney recently. Illness kept the 38-year-old player out of the game, but he showed all his old-time skill in scoring 100 runs for an Australian eleven against the touring M.C.C. team early this month. Playing for South Australia against the Englishmen at Adelaide in October he scored 76 runs.

Bradman, who visited Canada with the 1937 Australian Test Team which played in England, lives in Adelaide, where he has a stockbroking business. He will play for Australia in the Test matches against England which begin late in November. He was Australian captain on the 1937 tour and, as one of Australia's three Test selectors, and a member of the Australian Board of Cricket Control. He is expected to captain Australia in this season's Tests.

Bradman's re-appearance on

the cricket field has been greeted with delight all over Australia, where Bradman has been a sportsman's idol for 18 years. He has made 94 centuries in Test matches, including 15 against England. Of his 94 centuries, 35 have been double centuries and he scored more than 300 and 400 in one inning. Newspapers, which for months have been speculating on his future, have given his re-appearance front-page prominence.

## CORRECT SPEECH TAUGHT ON STAGE

Ottawa Children's Theatre Banishes Shyness in Curing Speech Defects

OTTAWA (P)—Not every little boy and girl wants to go on the stage, but sometimes acting teaches children self-confidence, correct diction, and cures speech defects, says Jewel Logette, organizer of Ottawa's Children's Theatre, believed the second of its kind in Canada.

Love of children and a desire to see this new generation become speech-conscious led Mrs. Logette, a former professional actress in both Canada and Great Britain, to open the first Children's Theatre which flourished in Montreal for several years.

"Inculcate correct speech at the beginning and it stays with a person right through life," said Mrs. Logette.

Acting is an ideal method of eliminating self-consciousness especially with the only child who is shy through lack of having youngsters his own age with whom to play.

Such speech defects as lisping and stuttering are the result of lack of confidence, and stage-training is an ideal cure.

Children between the ages of three and 16 are accepted into the theatre but are grouped according to their ages and put in suitable playlets.

Mrs. Logette hopes eventually the theatre will go into real production. She foresees the day when a group of her children

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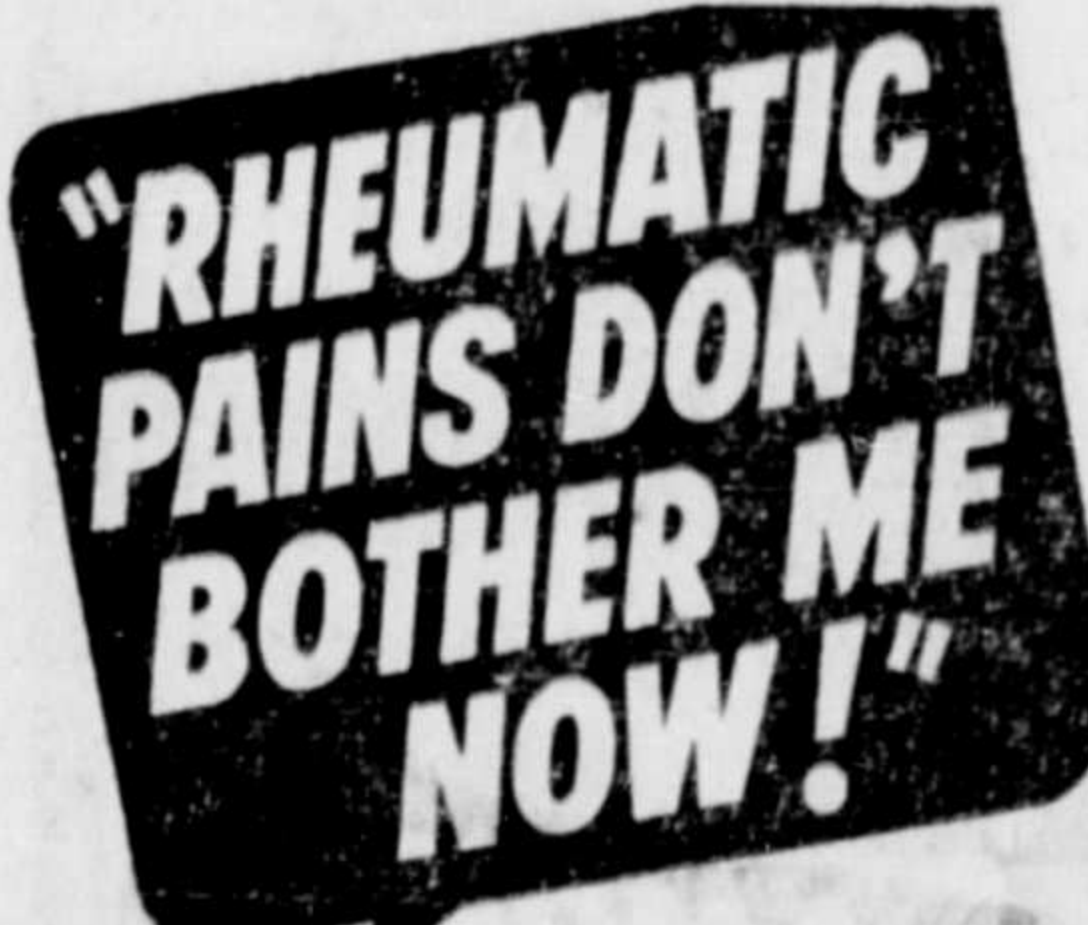

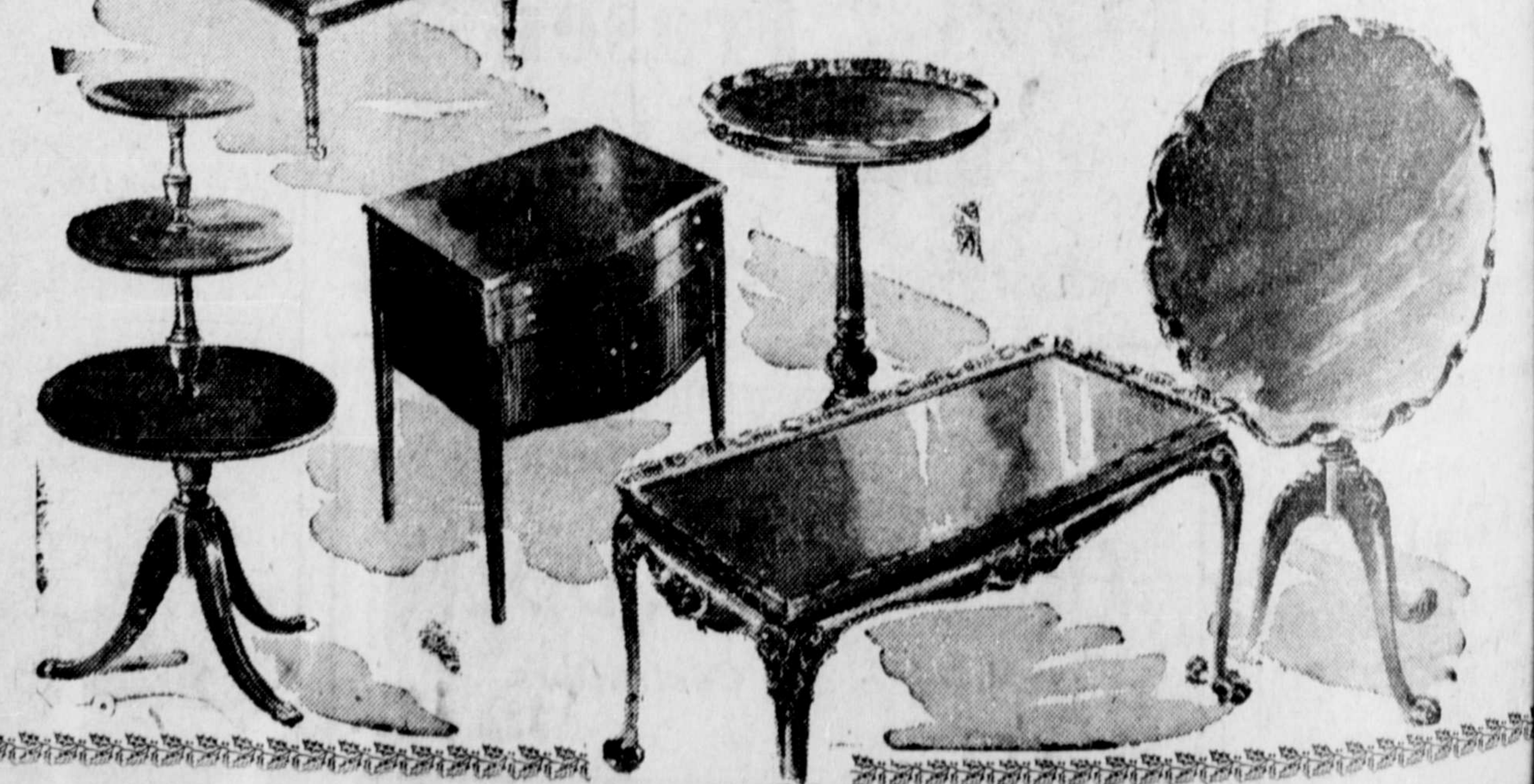
