

KOREA HAVING BLOODY RIOTS

Demonstrations Against Allied Trusteeship Are Being nenewed

SEOUL, Korea-Bloody rioting flared in Seoul today as right wing Koreans renewed demonstrations against Allied trusteeship for their country. Two Koreans were killed and many were injured in armed battle between civil police and more than 200 persons said to be members of the Korean Students' League which started the demonstrations. Korean police, handling their first big job without assistance, arrested 119 Koreans.

Decapitated In Hanging

"Unfortunate" Incident When Peace River Killer Executed at Okalla Last Month

VICTORIA. (P - Attorney General R. L. Maitland, in a statement Friday night, said there was no object in holding a public inquiry into the decapitation of Byron Bruce Potter who was hanged at Okalla January 10 for the murder last summer of Mrs. Edna Ina Rogers at Dawson Creek. In a statment Mr. Maitland said that "the usual practice was followed but, unfortunately, instead of the fall breaking the man's neck in the ordinary manner, it decapitated him. The occurrence in the opinion of the warden was the result of an error in judgment on the part of the executioner."

Thomas J. Hurley, counsel for Potter, asked for an investigation into the decapitation. He was not available for comment Friday night.

For patriotic reasons as well as making the most of food, housewives should contrive ways to make every scrap of fat useful, so use every bit of fat that is left-over. The fat that settles on top of a pot of soup, is left over from a roast, or accumulates in small amounts from the chops or steaks. Flavored drippings such as bacon, sausage, ham, and also extra fat | Mix in flour sifted with baking from stews, may be used on vegetables, to fry eggs or pota-

toes, or in gravy or sauces. Unflavored, rendered poultry is excellent for carres. cookies and pastry. The fat from the roasted birds should be kept for sauces because of the flavor from the dressing.

One important fact to be noted is that over-heating causes rancidity. This may also be caused by exposure to air and light. Fats absorb odors from highly flavored foods. If meat juices are present in the fat drippings, they may cause spoilage. Drippings should always be strained and kept covered in a dark cool place. Fat is a necessary ingredient in the preparation of many foods. Remember fat is a precious commodity, none must be wasted.

Sift dry ingredients. Combine egg, milk, vanilla and melted fat; add to dry ingredients and mix thoroughly. Add rolled oats, blending well. Drop by teaspoons on a lightly greased cookie sheet. Bake in a moderate oven, 350 degrees F., for 15 to 20 minutes. Makes 41/2 dozen cookies.

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
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
