# MILESTONES AND ANNIVERSARIES IN CAREER OF STATESMAN

On Monday next, Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King will enter upon his twentieth year as premier of Canada, a record now exceeded by only one Prime Minister in British history-Sir Robert Walpole in the Seventeenth Century.

Mr. King was chosen leader of the Liberal Party of Canida on August 7, 1919 and was sworn in as Prime Minister of Canada on December 29, 1921 after the return of the Liberal Party in the election of December 6, 1921.

Mr. King has been returned to office as Prime Minister f Canada at six general elections.

On Monday he will have held that office for a longer period of time than the head of any other government in the world today has held similar office.

AND any employer operating a RETAIL STORE having three or more employees (other than members of the family of the employer) employed.

Such employers are now required to register with the Board by submitting an estimate of their payroll expenditure from July 1st to December 31st, 1946. Forms for this purpose may be obtained from this office, together with such other information as may be required.

The Workmen's Compensation Act provides that an employer who has not registered with the Board may be held liable for the cost of an accident occurring prior to such registration, in addition to the regular assessments. Address inquiries to:
