

PARIS - The second anniversary of D-Day was quietly observed in France today with more especial celebrations at Caen and elsewhere in Normandy where the turning point of the European war began with the epic landings on June 6, 1944.

FIRE DEAD IS 58 CHICAGO-A series of official investigations began today in the disastrous LaSalle Hotel fire while friends and relatives were completing positive identification of 53 of the 58 dead. Still remaining unidentified are the bodies of two women, a man and a torso of undetermined sex. All phases of the terrifying flash fire which routed guests from the Loop hotel on Wednesday are under scrutiny.

It is much better to leave the small amount in the pitcher and store it closely covered.

Even with the best of care ilk sometimes turns sour before it can be used. Sour milk is not a spoiled food but a different ood. It should never be wasted. good cooks prefer sour in biscuits, scones and cakes. It gives a softer, richer texture. Soup made with sour milk is a favorite in many European countries and could well be used more often on Canadian

Sour milk is also used successfully to make tough cuts of meat tender. A cup of sour milk added to beef or veal stew not only makes the meat tender but adds a delicious flavor.


