MAN TO EASE FOOD SHORTAGE... VAPRA scheme Would Improve Rationing Wherever Necessary

ATLANTIC CITY—The UNRRA city committee at Atlantic City has adopted a sweeping program aimed at easing the world food shortage.

The committee, which represents all 48 member nations, recommends food rationing wherever necessary.

The program is still subject to approval by the UNRRA conference but, once all 50 nations vote in its favor, little change is expected in the final plan.

SECRET RUSS-NAZI TREATY IS TESTIFIED

NUERNBERG, © — Joachim von Ribbentrop's former personal secretary attempted to testify before the international military tribunal today that she had seen the original of a secret treaty allegedly signed by Russia and Germany in 1939 for the partition of Poland and the Baltic States but a quick objection by the Soviet prosecutor interrupted her.

The former secretary, Margaret Blank, had barely had time to assert that such a treaty had been signed by von Ribbentrop and Foreign Minister Molotov of Russia, when the Soviet prosecutor was on his feet, objecting.

The prosecutor said that the matter was irrelevant and the witness was not competent to testify concerning the alleged treaty thus posing one of the most delicate problems to be presented to the tribunal since the war crimes trial opened more than four months ago.

The tribunal recessed immediately to discuss the matter in private.

Withdrawal Agreement

China and Russia Complete Plans for Evacuation But Not For Booty Payment

CHONGKING—China has accepted Russian plans to leave Manchuria by April 1. This was announced yesterday by China's vice-minister of foreign affairs. Meanwhile, unconfirmed dispatches state that the Russians have promised to withdraw from Manchuria's capital, Changchun, as soon as government troops arrive.

The Chinese foreign affairs official then declared that China has not received any assurances that the Russians will pay for any industrial equipment taken from Manchuria as war booty.

Lunan Trial Now On List

Another Espionage Suspect Coming Up—Padlock Law May Be Revived

OTTAWA—Another espionage suspect will appear in court tomorrow when seven charges face Captain Gordon Lunan, who appears in an Ottawa court. This will be the first of at least seven individual spy trials.

One angle of the spy-probe has given rise to speculation that Quebec's anti-Communist padlock law may be revived. Two men charged with attempting to impede justice by circulating pamphlets were arraigned in a Montreal court yesterday. The pamphlets in question were in support of Labor-Progressive Fred Rose, who has been arrested on charges laid under the Official Secrets Act.

Importance Of City Interest In Hinterland Is Emphasized

A highway outlet for the Alaska Highway through the Groundhog coal country to Hazelton to link up with the Prince Rupert would be of utmost benefit to Prince Rupert and the central interior generally, declared Rev. (Capt.) J. E. Whittles, pre-war rector of the Anglican Church at Burns Lake, who spoke before the Prince Rupert Gyro Club yesterday. Capt. Whittles said that the people of the interior were much impressed with the agitation which had been going on among Prince Rupert people lately with a view to bringing about development of this port and the hinterland. They were gratified indeed with the new spirit of community unity which was being displayed here and which was being exemplified in various ways.

Capt. Whittles wondered if it was generally realized that such points as Smithers and Burns Lake were in close proximity to the exact geographical centre of British Columbia.

Interesting factual information which Capt. Whittles disclosed to his listeners was that there were no less than 100 sawmills operating today in the area around Burns Lake and towards Tweedsmuir Park. Pit props were selling at \$35 a cord and their production was constituting a very lucrative industry at this time.

The Army padre also spoke of a boom in the trapping industry with squirrel bringing from \$1 to \$1.35 whereas they had sold for 15c to 25c in pre-war days. Mink were up to \$40 as compared with \$8 while marten were bringing \$160 and the always valuable fisher up to \$205.

"That central interior country," asserted Capt. Whittles, "has tremendous possibilities and it seems to me that Prince Rupert's future depends almost entirely upon its development. But you must continue to bring pressure to bear to ensure that the development will be of such mutual benefit will actually be brought about."

"Before you can really boost, however, you must see the country for yourselves. Every Prince Rupert businessman should take time out to explore it thoroughly and investigate the possibilities of a great country."

The importance of a good highway outlet to the coast was emphasized by the speaker. Intelligent and mutual interest between city and hinterland could be best developed thereby. "It would be a shame and a crime," he declared, "if the highway built during the war were allowed to deteriorate to such an extent that it would be impossible to use."

ATTORNEY GENERAL OF BRITISH COLUMBIA DIES



HON. R. L. MAITLAND, K.C.

VANCOUVER, (CP) — Hon. Royal Lethington Maitland, K.C., Attorney-General of British Columbia and Leader of the Progressive-Conservative party in the province, died this morning in hospital here from influenza complicated by a heart condition. He had been quite ill for a couple of weeks but hopes had been entertained for his recovery. His passing, therefore, a shock to his many friends throughout the province and the Dominion.

Mr. Maitland had been Attorney-General since December 1941 when he joined with Premier John Hart in forming the coalition government of British Columbia. He entered public life in 1924 when he unsuccessfully contested a Vancouver seat in the Legislature. He was first elected in 1928 and was re-elected in 1937, 1941 and 1945. He had served as minister without portfolio in the Tolmie government.

Born in Ingersoll, Ontario, January 9, 1889, Mr. Maitland was 57 years of age. He came west with his family as a boy and was educated in Vancouver. He is survived by his widow, one son and two daughters. One son lost his life overseas while serving with the Royal Canadian Air Force.

**The Crisis Deepens**

The crisis in the United Nations security council has reached a state of intensity following the dramatic incident yesterday at New York when the Soviet delegation walked out after the Russian application for a postponement of consideration of the Iranian question had been all but unanimously denied. There can be no question now of the seriousness of the challenge that faces the United Nations Organization. That challenge has been thrown out

squarely by one of the nations, one of the most powerful of its members, which, even as the plot deepened, had been professing its good faith and support of the principles of peace and democracy and the maintenance of same.

It is bitter and distasteful to bring ourselves to even think that, in laying low one nationalist aggressor, we were only helping to raise another. It may not, we hope, be as bad as that but it no longer seems unduly fanciful to feel that way. Reason appears to be developing for the attitudes of the Churchills, the Edens, the Bevins.

To say the least of it, if Russia is really with us in furthering the aims of world peace and security, she is adopting strange ways to bring it about.

Truly this latest development in U.N.O., of which the world had hoped for so much, is grimly disturbing.

**Tells Story of Invasion**

Experiences of Nine Months on Western Front Related by Third Division Padre

Story of nine months of field campaigning on the Western Front from the invasion landing on "D" Day June 6, 1944, to the frontier of Germany in Reichswald Forest was unfolded graphically, the horrors and the hardships being intermingled with humorous incidents, before the Prince Rupert Gyro Club yesterday by Capt. J. E. Whittles, who went through the campaign as field chaplain with the Fortieth Field Regiment, Royal Canadian Artillery, Third Division.

Capt. Whittles told of the long months of waiting and the intensive preparations in Britain culminating in the assembly of thousands of barges in Southampton Water—then the crossing to Bernieres sur-Mer, a trip which occupied no less than two days through the roughest seas. Never had men been so seasick, asserted the padre, who believed that no small factor of the success of the invasion might have been the fact that those men were so glad, after the utter discomfort of the crossing, to get ashore that they were ready for anything.

The wild bedlam of gunfire off shore and onshore as the operation of invasion commenced, the utter destruction of the village which was the primary objective, the intense attack of the German aircraft, the great menace of the land mines were described but it was a success in spite of terrific odds.

"Caen was to have been our objective on the first day," Capt. Whittles disclosed "but it actually took us six weeks to get there. The stench of death at Caen—utterly ruined Caen—was something which I will never get out of my nostrils."

Moving on to Pas de Calais, the speaker told of the buzz bomb launching mechanisms, equipment for which was surprisingly simple. For curiosity, a sight had been taken on one and it was found to be aimed directly for the heart of London.

**WHAT Prince Rupert Needs**

(Being one of a series of suggestions by readers of the Daily News for the betterment of this city.)

This city has been established since 1906. In that time it has grown and developed greatly. The late war increased the population of Prince Rupert enormously, now it has been reduced to its original numbers. Why is this? Because it was only a transient population—an army population. During the war the work of our shipyards boomed tremendously. Now they lie more or less in idleness. We must make use of our natural harbor, our dry dock. Contracts for building ships have slipped through our fingers. We need to be more demanding in our policy—to push

The padre's narrative moved on through Calais and Boulogne and on to the Scheldt estuary where the Canadians had made their great stand. There men from Prince Rupert had been "right at home" with the "Water rats" in a type of fighting that, withal, was worse even than "D" Day, principally because it was done practically on sea instead of roads.

Some idea of the terrific losses of the campaign was given by the padre in disclosing that the Third Division of the "light blue patch" had required no less than 80 per cent replacements, only 240 of his own original unit of 1000 having come out of the campaign.

President W. D. Lambie presided over the luncheon and guests included S. C. Mapson, and Sam Joy of Vancouver and J. H. Black of Prince Rupert. Alf Rivett, one of the ex-service members, was welcomed back following his return to "Civvy Street."

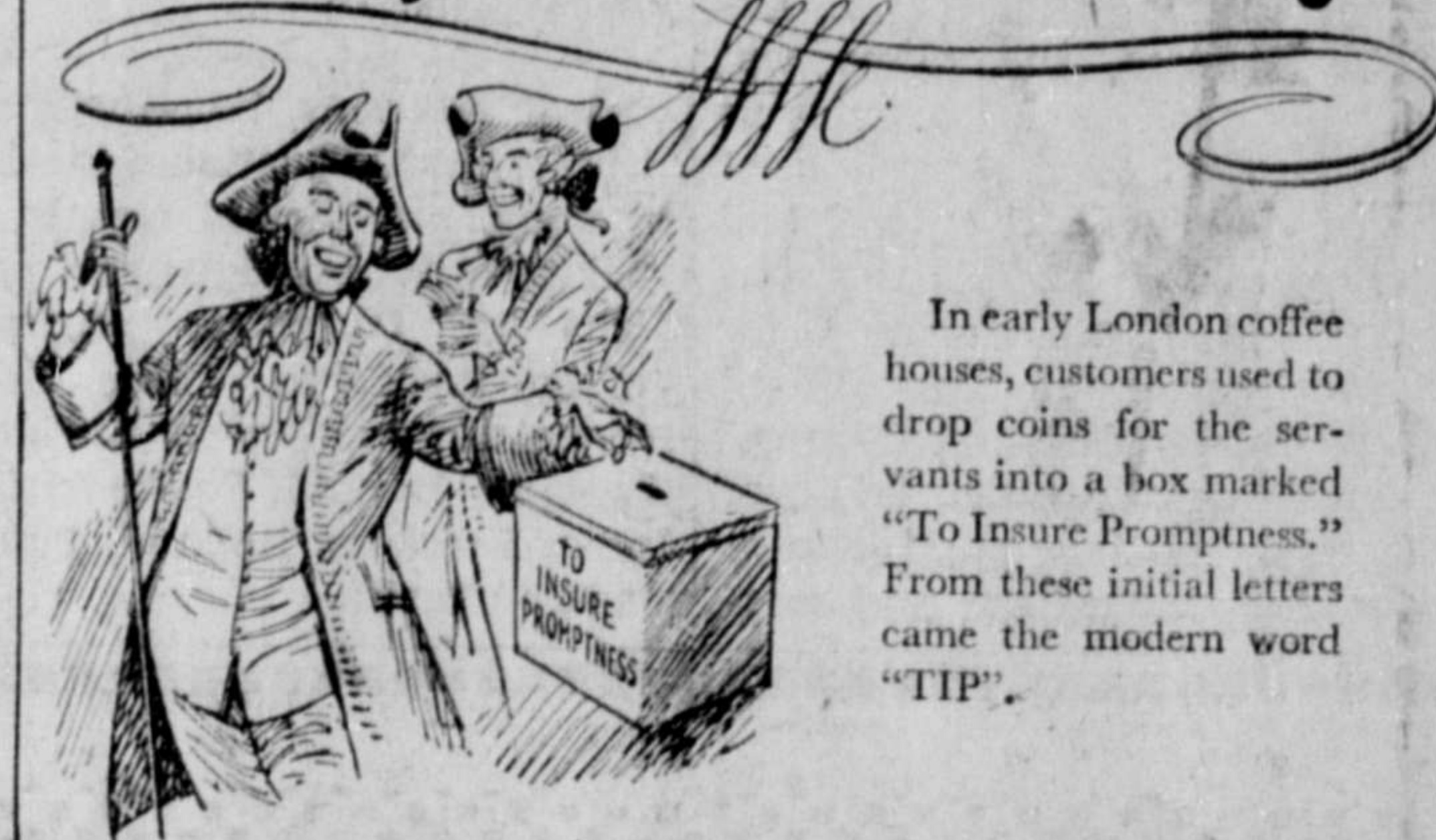
