CHNGKING - China has accepted Russian plans to leave Manchuria by April 1. This was announced yesterday by China's vice-minister of foreign affairs

Meanwhile, unconfirmed dispatches state that the Russians have promised to withdraw from Manchuria's capital, Changchun, as soon as governmen troops arrive.

The Chinese foreign affairs official then declared that China has not received any assurances that the Russians will pay for any industrial equipment taken from Manchuria as war booty.

Truly this latest development in U.N.O., of which the world had hoped for so much, is grimly disturbing.


